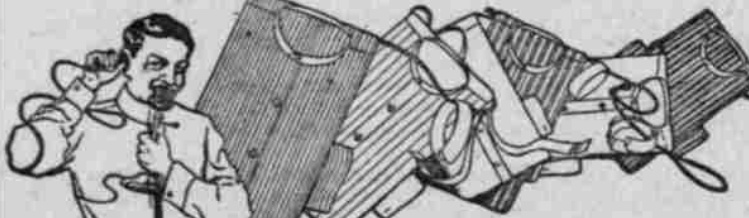

MOUNT HOOD LINE CLEAR
Service Restored After Delay Due to Several Landslides.

Passenger service on the Mount Hood Railroad, which was temporarily suspended by half a dozen severe rockslides between Montavilla and Bull Run, was restored yesterday. Freight also is being handled again. Officials of the road anticipated trouble and were prepared to handle it. The line cuts through several gravel banks that have not had time to settle

since the work was completed. In another year the loose gravel will have settled and danger of rockslides will be at a minimum. In the recent rainy period four slides, either of which would have blocked traffic, occurred within one mile. A steam shovel was kept on hand to clear the tracks.

La Grande to Have Moose Lodge.
BAKER, Or., Jan. 18.—(Special).—Nearly 300 members of the Baker Lodge, Loyal Order of Moose, will go next Sunday to La Grande to install a new lodge in that city. The lodge will have about 300 members.

ELKS AND SOCIETY JOIN
Sweet-Pea Enthusiasts to Hold Show During Convention—Prize Up.

The Oregon Sweet Pea Society's annual show will be held the same time as the Elks' grand lodge convention, July 3 to 12. A large room in the business district will be tented and all visitors will be invited to see the exhibit of Oregon sweet peas. In recognition of the plan to hold the show the same week that the Elks are here, the Elks' grand lodge convention

commission will give a gold and silver cup valued at \$30 for the best display of purple and white sweet peas—those being the Elks colors.

Thomas J. Baugham Dies.
EUGENE, Or., Jan. 19.—(Special).—THOMAS J. BAUGHAM, pioneer of 1847, died last evening of apoplexy, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. J. Shumaker, aged 82 years. Mr. Baugham was born in Huntington, W. Va., in 1830, and settled near Coburg, where he lived until his death. He is survived by his widow and a number of children.

101-FOOT LETTER SENT
Portland Grocer and Friends Join in Writing Long Epistle.

A letter 101 feet long was mailed by Ed Gottacker, a grocer living at 154 Grand avenue, to Richard H. Hune, of Tipton, Kan., yesterday. Gottacker recently received from Hune, his brother-in-law, a letter 32 feet long. "They can't skin Portland," he said, as he started out among his friends, to ask their help in writing the ten-foot letter. When he finally had it written

he wound it round and round a broom-handle, and enclosing it in a piece of heavy wrapping paper for an envelope, covered it with 50 cents worth of stamps, and put it in the mail.

Deschutes Road Cleared.
THE DALES, Or., Jan. 19.—(Special).—General Superintendent Bollons and Assistant Superintendent Coykendall of the O. W. R. & N. Co. returned to Portland today, having completed the work of clearing snow from the Deschutes Railroad. Regular train service has been resumed on the branch line.

FIRE LOSSES ENORMOUS
Liabilities Are Million Dollars Daily as Year Opens.

HARTFORD, Conn., Jan. 19.—In the first 15 days of January, the fire insurance companies of the country became liable for \$15,000,000 in losses according to statistics prepared by the Hartford Company. In the opinion of local underwriters there never has been such a severe and steady drain on their resources in one month as the statistics for January will show.
