JEALOUSY MURDER CAUSE

"Slave." Known as Chol San, Now Sought by Police-Portland Expressman Who Took Trunk to Depot Found.

That Seid Bing, nephew of Seld Back, wealthy Portland Chinese, whose nutilated body was found in a trunk resterday in Seattle, was murdered in a dingy room on the second floor of a chinese hovel at 107 Fourth street, this Chinese hovel at 107 Fourth street, this city, by a 18-year-old Chinese girl named Chol Sin and a tall, thin Chinaman, whose name has not been learned, is the apinion of the police, detectives and others working on the mystery. The evidence against the girl is so strong that photographs and descriptions are being sent to every city on the Coast in hope that she will be apprehenced.

While detectives here, in Seattle and San Francisco are working on the case, members of the Seid family have left for these points to search the Chinese quarters and to look at the Chinese passengers on all outgoing and incomng trains and steamers.

Robbery Believed Cause.

Robbery is given as the most probable cause of the crime, although a jealous fight between Seld and the unitantified Chinaman, it is said, may have led up to it. Choi Sin came to Portland two years ago from San Francisco, where she is said to have been driven away from home by her parents. It is said she was one of the "slaven" of the Chinese underworld and lived in one of the dens of that class of Chinese women. It is asserted here that Seid Bing often visited her and finally adopted hyras his "slave." This circumstance is said to have been the cause of a quar-rel between Seid and the girl about December 15. The supposition is that the unidenti-

fied man was in the girl's room on the evening of December 20 when Seid called. That the murder was prearcalled. That the murder was prear-ranged seems almost certain, because of the fact that the body was packed in rock sait, cotton, flour sacks and sawdust. When last seen Seid had \$509 in money and wore diamonds worth \$200, all of which are missing. Selds Prominent Here.

Seid Bing was a member of the Seid family of Chinese, which includes aome of the wealthlest Chinese in Portland. Among them is Seid Back. The Seids held a meeting soon after the facts of the crime became known and decided to assist in every way possible to capture the murderers. 



The victim had been dressed in the height of American fashion with a soft brown hat, gray suit of good quality and a light brown cravenette. His underwear was of silk and he wore allk socks. In dismembering the body none of the clothing was removed ex-
