PEACE MISSION GOES SOUTH

Chihuahua General Urges That Fed-

eral Attack Be Prevented.

EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 2 .- Peace envoys were sent south late today, os voys were sent south late today, os-tensibly for the purpose of conferring with Federal leaders, encamped at Samalayauca, with several hundred troops, said to be from the Torreon garrison, en route to Juares. The peace mission left in response to a message from General Oronco, at Chihuahua, in which he urged his friends in Juares "to treat with the federals and, if possible, prevent an at-tack."

tack. Azelardo Anaya, chief of the Juarez customs guards and cousin of Orozco, was one of the three peace envoys. The exodus from Juarez to the American side continues and tonight the town is almost as deserted as it was prior to Madero's attack last May. Mexican federal property, including postoffice supplies, was moved to the American side and stored in Federal buildings

"I understand the revolutionists in-dorse the plan of Tacubaya, which de-

chared for me as President of Merico. I will not lead an armed force, for I am a man of ideals and not a man of arms." continued Gomes. "but I will accept the Presidency if it is offered me."

EL PASO WILL BE PROTECTED 14 DIE IN SUBMARINE

COLLISION WITH GUNBOAT IS FATAL TO LITTLE CRAFT.

Not One Person on Ill-Fated British Sea Fighter Comes to Surface Af-

ter Crash Off Spithead.

PORTSMOUTH, England, Feb. 1.— Another of the unfortunate class A submarines of the British navy, two of which had sunk previously and on board two others of which various members of their crew had been killed or injured in explosions, went to the bottom of the sea today at the en-trance of Spithead, with a loss of 14 lives—four lieutenants and the mem-bers of the crew. Not one of the ship's company escaped. The catas-trophe was the result of a collision with the British gunboat Hazard, which rent a hole in the side of the submarine A-3. The submarine was engaged with a

which rent a hold in the submarine A-3. The submarine was engaged with a flotilla of sister ships in practicing evolutions and was just coming to the surface after a dive when the Hazard, going at a good speed, struck her. The submarine filled and sank in-stantly. Pienty of assistance was speedily at hand by means of wireless calls from the Hazard, but there was no chance to save any of the men on board the A-3. Under admiralty regulations, only the bare official report of the sinking of the submarine is available and it is not known where the blame, if there

the bare official report of the and it is not known where the blame, if there be blame for the accident, lies. None of those who witnessed the disaster will be permitted to speak of it until after the official inquiry. Salvagers late this afternoon located the sunken marine lying on the sandy bottom off Spithead, some 60 feet down. Owing to the darkness, how-ever, they suspended operations for the night and tomorrow will make an attempt to raise the little vessel. 




