NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—After three long secret sessions, the football rules committee, which met here today to consider suggested changes in the playing of the game, tonight had come to no final decision, but it was said the trend of discussion was against any radical modifications.

Chairman E. K. Hall, who was re-elected head of the committee, and Walter Camp, of Yale, the secretary, announced after the meeting that no votes had been taken on the question at issue and no report would be made until after tomorrow.
