

ALLEGED BOMBMEN TO BE TAKEN TODAY

Only Few of Those Indicted
Live West of Salt Lake
City, Is Belief.

54 ARE SAID TO BE IN NET

Indianapolis Ironworkers Discuss
Reported Pending Arrests of
Officers on Charges of Dynamiting—Prosecutor Mum.

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 12.—On the eve of the arrest of the men indicted in the dynamite conspiracy case it was reported tonight that the number of defendants would be 54. The arrests may take place tomorrow.

Many officers in one labor union and one officer in each of two other unions are believed involved. It is understood that the defendants west of Salt Lake City include only those whose names already have been mentioned in connection with the prosecutions or indictments found on the Pacific Coast and that no individuals west of Salt Lake City not heretofore involved are under indictment here.

Many cities in the East and Ohio, Illinois and Missouri are said to be the points from which the Federal authorities expect to receive reports of arrests.

Nearly All Within Reach.
Almost all the defendants whose names have been kept secret, but who have been under Federal espionage since the indictments were returned a week ago, are reported as now being within reach and as the capias for the arrests have been delivered to United States Marshals, it is believed the apprehension of the men will take place within a few hours after word has been sent by telegraph for the authorities to act. Probably a number of the defendants will be beyond immediate serving of the capias, but the plan is to take as many as possible into custody on the same day.

A labor leader in Boston, several each in New York, Cleveland and Detroit, at least five in Detroit, one each in St. Louis, Kansas City, Mo., New Orleans, Philadelphia, Milwaukee, Hartford, Conn., Buffalo, Cincinnati and about five men in Indianapolis are believed to be among those indicted. Six indictments are said to pertain to men living in Salt Lake City and west of there.

Ironworkers Hold Confab.
Whether the arrests would take place tomorrow, United States District Attorney Miller refused positively to say, but it was learned that such was the plan mapped out by the Government tonight, and that it would be carried out unless an unforeseen obstacle developed.

Frank Ryan, president of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers, was at his headquarters tonight discussing with his officials reports that members of his union were included among those indicted. John T. Butler, of Buffalo, first vice-president; Herbert S. Hockin, of Detroit, second vice-president; and Fred Sherman, business agent of the union in Indianapolis, are among those who have consulted with Mr. Ryan. Mr. Hockin succeeded J. J. McNamara, the convicted dynamiter, as secretary-treasurer of the union.

OFFICERS READY IN CHICAGO

Ten Labor Men Said to Be Wanted
There to Answer Indictments.

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—Copies of ten indictments returned by the Indianapolis Federal grand jury against Chicago labor officials, it was said here tonight, are in the hands of Government officers for service.

Two high labor officials and eight minor officers, it was said, are named in the indictments. It is intimated that the two leaders will be the first to be placed under arrest. Of the minor officers several are business agents. Two of the men named in the indictments, not leaders, have disappeared and Government agents are reported to be searching the country for them.

PIONEER WOMAN IS DEAD

Mrs. Mary J. Sutton Passes Away at
Klamath Falls.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special.)—After living in Oregon for nearly half a century, Mrs. Mary J. Sutton, mother of the late George Chastain, ex-County Clerk and now Deputy County Clerk, has passed away at the Chastain home here.

Mrs. Sutton, nee Shook, was born in Ripley, Ind., moving to Iowa in 1847 and to Oregon in 1864. The family on coming to Oregon settled in Jacksonville, where in 1867 Miss Shook married James Sutton, first editor of the Jacksonville Post. Some years after the Suttons moved to Ashland, where, in 1871, Mr. Sutton started the Ashland Tidings, a periodical which is still conducted in that city. He died in 1878 and in the winter of 1880 the widow came to Klamath County, acquiring a ranch near Bonanza, later making her home with her brothers, who are prominent ranchers in this county.

Name Wanted Reserved.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special.)—Complaining that the name Orpheus Club conflicts with the name Orpheus Male Chorus, William K. Lowrey, of Portland, has written to Secretary of State Olcott asking that steps be taken to revoke the license of the Orpheus Club to do business in the state, owing to the similarity in names. Secretary Olcott has replied that he has no authority to revoke the corporate charter of any company, but that the Governor is empowered to bring suit to do so, as was done in the case of the Bachors' Club at Woodburn, and suggests that the case be taken up with the Executive.

Seventy-Five Jurors Called.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Feb. 12.—(Special.)—Seventy-five jurors have been drawn for service at the March term of the Lewis County Superior Court. The most important case to be tried is that of Del Clark, charged with first-degree murder in killing L. Bar, the Centralia banker, on the night of December 30 last.

Henry Aust Is Dead.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Feb. 12.—(Special.)—Henry Aust, a well-known resident of Klabs, died yesterday, aged 61 years. Mr. Aust leaves a widow and family of grown children. He came to this country from Austria 20 years ago and made his home on the hill lands between Bolstford and Pe Ell.

FILMS MADE IN AIR

Moving Picture Machine Operated in Hydro-Aeroplane.

FLIGHT IS ACROSS HARBOR

Aviator Coffey and Adrian Duff

HILL'S ASSOCIATES PROFIT

The steel corporation got it paid \$1.55 a ton for ore and transportation.
"Did it under that lease?"
"Yes, for the first year, and 4 cents 8 mills per ton additional every succeeding year," said Hill.
"That was for 59 per cent metallic iron ore."

Purchase Is Explained.

Hill explained more in detail the original purchase of the ore. He said a nearby railroad owned about 25,000 acres of ore land. This was a lumberman's road that had connection with his road.

"By appointment, I met the owners in Chicago. I bought then about 25,000 acres known as the Wright and Davis property. My son added to it by lease and purchase about 2500 acres."

On this property, he said, were several mines, one, the Mahoning mine, which had been opened up.

"The Mahoning lease," Hill continued, "carried an estimated tonnage of about \$5,000,000."

"How many tons have been removed?"
"I should think about 25,000,000," said Hill.

"We acquired a fee to this mine, which was leased to the Mahoning Mining Company."

Under the "Hill lease," he said, the steel corporation got whatever ore was in the land.

"What did you pay for the railroad you got from Wright and Davis?"
"Four millions and fifty thousand dollars," said Mr. Hill. "I gave them \$1,000,000 and then a further amount, and a portion was left until they were in a position to turn it over."

"Wasn't the first \$1,000,000 taken out of the funds of the Great Northern Railroad?"

"Not a penny of it."
"Didn't you say before the Minnesota Commission that some of it came from the Great Northern?"
"I said that not a cent came from the Great Northern. Other lands turned over to the steel corporation were those

in which the Hills owned an interest. Other owners got the same prices as Mr. Hill. One firm was Longyear & Bennett."

Holding Company Told of.

"The steel corporation agreed, didn't it, that it would pay a certain amount per ton on ore?"

"They agreed to develop the mines and pay for what they took out," said Mr. Hill.

"The Lake Superior Company," he said, "was a limited company, holding several properties."

"Had the Lake Superior Company any interest in the ore region?"
"It was organized for the purpose of holding the iron I acquired on the Mesaba Range," said Mr. Hill. "I bought the stock of these mining companies and transferred them to the Lake Superior Company for the benefit of the shareholders of the Great Northern Railway."

"The stock of many of the other companies in this combination was owned by the Great Northern Railroad, among them the Great Northern Express Company."

DUMA UPHOLDS PREMIER

KOKOVZOFF, AS MINISTER OF
FINANCE SUSTAINED.

Urgency Interpellation That Jews Were Patronized by Bank
Loses, 104 to 74.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 12.—The Duma today rejected by 104 votes against 74 an urgency interpellation concerning alleged illegal actions committed by Premier Kokovzoff as Minister of Finance.

He is said to have permitted an extensive issue of patents of membership of the merchants' first guild of Jews in Kiev, giving them the right of residence there and exempting from the original segregation law which restricts the Jewish provinces and Little Russia.

The members of the Duma who introduced the interpellation asserted that the Kiev branch of the Imperial Bank of Russia was patronizing the Jews.

TONGUE MAY CAUSE STRIKE

STRIKE INQUIRY IS ON

GRAND JURY PROBES FIGHT OF
SHOP FACTIONS.

Nonunion Workman, Held, Alleges
He Was Set Upon First by
Strikers of the Union.

ROSEBURG, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special.)

—As a result of last night's clash between Southern Pacific employees and striking shopmen, F. Drullard, J. H. Wilkins and O. V. Beck, employees of the local shops, were arrested here today on charges of assault and battery. The men were arraigned immediately following their arrest and were held to appear before the grand jury which convened at noon today. In telling his story of the affair in the Justice Court today Drullard, a participant in the battle, denied that he was the aggressor and asserted that he was attacked by waiter Corley, a striker.

"Corley followed me about the streets Saturday night," said Drullard, "and exerted every effort in hope of inciting trouble."

"As I came out of the stockade last evening I simply asked him what he meant by following me about the streets, whereupon he struck me a blow in the stomach. I retaliated and knocked him down five times before he decided to stay down. It was at that time that other strikers took a hand in the affair and were put to rout by my companions."

The strikers, on the other hand, declared the shop employees came out of the shops with a prearranged plan to engage in a fight.

The grand jury began an investigation of the affair this afternoon and probably will reach a conclusion some time tomorrow. In all about 50 witnesses have been summoned to give evidence.

While the grand jury is working in utmost secrecy, it is rumored about the courthouse that an attempt will be



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made to indict the strikers on a charge of unlawful assembly to incite a riot. The citizens are stirred over last night's trouble and the officers were on hand this evening to guard against further demonstrations. Fully 500 persons assembled at the entrance of the Courthouse at 10 o'clock to be held March 4, when it may consider the subject.

Tropical Plants to Be Studied.
OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Feb. 12.—(Special.)—The department of horticulture at the Oregon Agricultural College has announced for the second semester a course in sub-tropical pomology. This course will deal with all the citrus plants; with dates, figs, pineapples and, in fact, all the fruits which are grown in the sub-tropical climates. The necessity for this course has arisen from the fact that a great many Southern California students are attending the College.

New Game Warden Asked.
