

CHEMICAL TARIFF BILL UNAMENDED

Even With Some Democratic Support, Republicans Fail to Bring Change.

DEBATE GROWS FACETIOUS

Pleasantries Exchanged Over Increased Duty on Ingredients of Common Soap—'Progressives' Not Enthusiastic.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The Democratic chemical tariff revision bill was agreed to without change in the House tonight when the committee of the whole concluded work on the measure.

Members Facetious About Soap. Mr. Mann attacked the soap section and said that the Democrats had raised the duty on ingredients of common soap.

Representative Harrison of New York, who had charge of the measure for the Democrats, retorted that ordinary vanilla was raised from seven to ten cents a pound.

Representative Harrison replied that some Republican households were in need of soap.

The chief attack on the measure was based on the Democratic plan of raising the duties on raw materials and lowering the duties on finished articles.

Soda Fountains Detest Increased. It is our contention, Representative Harrison said, that the revenue should be taken out of the large profits of the manufacturers and that this should not be passed on to the consumer in the shape of a rise in prices.

Representative Harrison justified an increase in the duty on lemon juice and lime juice by saying these articles were used chiefly in soda fountain drinks.

"Ah, now you would drive the young man to drink in order to raise revenue, would you?" Mr. Mann said.

It is said that the bill will draw few Republican "progressive" votes because of the admitted increases in many items.

ENGINEER'S REPORT OUT

Centralia Hears How Much Water System Will Cost.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Feb. 20.—(Special.)—Frank C. Kelsey, the civil engineer recently appointed by the Centralia commission to prepare plans and estimate the cost of a gravity water pipeline from the headwaters of the Newaukum River to this city, made his report today.

The pipeline will be 16 miles in length, and the cost of a 16-inch pipe, sufficient to deliver 1,000,000 gallons of water a day, will be \$1,111,111. The cost of an 18-inch pipe, large enough to deliver 4,000,000 gallons, will be \$1,414,114.

BILL PROVIDES FOR TITLE

Coloradoan Would Let Water Charge Go as Lien After Five Years.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 20.—Representative Taylor of Colorado, today introduced a bill providing that homesteaders on Government irrigation projects shall receive patent after five years' residence and compliance with the homestead law, their unpaid water charges to be a lien against land until fully met.

ESTIMATE FELT TO BE HIGH

Cost of Bi-State Bridge Placed at \$1,250,000 by Vancouver Man.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Feb. 20.—(Special.)—That \$1,250,000 is much more than the proposed Pacific Highway bridge across the Columbia River can be built for, is the opinion of James P. Stapleton, chairman of the committee of 12 men, appointed by the Vancouver Commercial Club, to find ways and means of raising \$2,000,000, Vancouver's share for securing the preliminary surveys and plans, and to bring the matter to the attention of the Legislatures of both Washington and Oregon.

Mr. Stapleton says that the steel bridge built across the Columbia River by the North Bank road at this point, cost about \$2,000,000, but this is the greatest double-track steel draw bridge in the world, and has two draws and is much longer than the proposed Pacific Highway bridge will be.

FIGHT IN MISSOURI IS COMPROMISED

Delegates-at-Large to Democratic Convention to Have Half Vote Apiece.

CLARK IS CHOICE OF ALL

Candidate for Governor Loses Fight on "Gag Rule," After Which Platform Denouncing "Cannibalism" Is Adopted.

JOPLIN, Mo., Feb. 20.—After an all-afternoon fight on the floor of the convention caused by the effort of David A. Bell, of Bowling Green, candidate for the nomination for Governor, to oppose the convention slate agreed on by party leaders, the Democratic state convention today elected eight delegates-at-large to the Baltimore convention, each with half a vote.

The platform says in part: "The history of the Republican party is a tale of broken promises, violated faith and betrayal of trust. It denied popular government in the House of Representatives by a system of rules which vested arbitrary power in the Speaker. This power it employed in the service of the great special interests."

"It not only permitted the establishment of monopoly, but gave executive sanction to the destruction of the greatest trust on earth of its last potential rival. It promised in advance legal immunity to those who consummated the criminal conspiracy."

"In response to the demands of the monopolies and other great protected industries President Taft vetoed all these measures."

"We particularly express our admiration for Speaker Clark, whose wisdom, patience, fortitude and patriotism united our party in Congress and made possible the victories achieved."
