

SPECIAL CHARTER ELECTION DESIRED

Mayor Says Commission Rule Too Important to Go on Ballot With Other Things.

PROPOSED PLAN NOT READY

Rushlight Thinks City Attorney, Treasurer and Municipal Judge Should Be Elected Instead of Appointed.

"I promised the people of this city that I would give them every opportunity to decide whether or not they would commission government, and I will keep the promise," said Mayor Rushlight yesterday.

The Mayor favors submitting a charter that will not be too radical, but which will make it possible to facilitate business and avoid delays in its transaction, he said.

"I think the question of whether the city is to change to commission government is too important to be placed on the ballot with anything else," said the Mayor.

Appointive Offices Not Favored. "It seems to me that no good purpose would be served by making the positions of City Attorney, Treasurer, Auditor and Judge appointive," said the Mayor.

STREET WORK IS URGED

Steel Bridge Push Club Favors Hard Surface on Larrabee.

The Steel Bridge Push Club, at its meeting Monday night, passed a resolution asking that Larrabee street be graded and hard-surfaced from its intersection with the railroad company's grade to an intersection with Adams street and the new W. B. & N. Railroad bridge.

"Whereas, it behooves the City of Portland to keep open all streets and thoroughfares, in contemplation of the future greatness of our city, as well as its present needs, and that no thoroughfare heretofore or now being used within the City of Portland should be cut off, and

"Whereas, Larrabee street, on the East Side, extending from Killingsworth avenue south to Holladay avenue is a street fully two and a half miles in length, improved in first-class manner, carrying traffic second to no East Side street of the same length; and

"Whereas, the new railroad bridge is about to be completed, and the old Steel Bridge connecting Holladay and Adams with the West Side is about to be removed, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the said Larrabee street be extended from its intersection with the toe-line of the railroad company's grade to an intersection with Adams street, and that said Larrabee street be immediately improved with hard-surface pavement in such manner as the Common Council may hereafter determine."

GAME WARDEN MENACED

Prisoner's Brother Threatens Him With Pistol, but Officer Wins.

That the work of deputy game wardens frequently leads them into dangerous situations is shown by the report of District Warden Lewis, of Alameda Falls, Or. In reviewing an experience of J. J. Furber, Deputy Game Warden, the Game Commission had been aware that deer were being shot unlawfully. A family of the name of Connolly on the Klamath River had been known to be violating the laws. Furber watched the family during the winter, but was unable to obtain evidence against them until last Thursday. Furber then found that a deer had been killed, and followed the trail to the Connolly home. On searching the premises he discovered the head and the hide of a large buck, and arrested Connolly, but had to hold the prisoner there all night until morning. Connolly and his brother were the only members of the family at home. Furber told the two men to go to bed upstairs, that he would remain up. He placed the deer head in an adjoining room, leaving the door ajar. In the

morning the head was found to have been stolen, and upon requesting Chris Connolly to produce it, his brother drew a revolver and ordered Furber to leave. Furber sat down, and said that when he left the Connollys would go with him. Chris Connolly then surrendered and accompanied Furber to Klamath Falls, where Justice Graves fined him \$100 and costs.
