Valley Land Owners Aid Plan to Expend \$3,000.000 on Bore Under Hills.

TUBE TO REACH CITY HUB

Promoters of Undertaking Sangaine of Success in Raising Amount Necessary by Pro Rata Sums on Land Value Basis.

Construction of a tunnel under Council Crest and a connecting subway tube under 15 blocks of the West Side to a point about the center of the business district, involving an expenditure of approximately \$2,000,000, will, from present indications, be undertaken this year by property owners of the Tualatin Valley, according to an announcement made yesterday.

Fred Groner, Frank Rowell, E. M. Breoks, C. E. Wickland and H. Coiller, of Scholls and Laurel, are the principal Washington County men supporting the project. They are among the largest landowners in the Tualatin Valley, the five men owning property valued at more than \$1,000,000.

Joining them are a large number of farmers and property owners who have tentatively agreed to subscribe their quota of the amount deemed necessary to construct the tunnel and subway. It is declared that fully 90 per cent of the ownership represented in 300,000 acres of rich land in the Tualatin Valley can be counted upon for the financing of the enterprise. It is estimated that

of rich land in the runatum valvey can be counted upon for the financing of the enterprise. It is estimated that there are at least 200,000 acres of addi-tional land which would be directly benefited by the tunnel that would provide another source of financial as-

Land Values to Be Pledged.

While the promoters of the project are not prepared to announce the details of the financial end, it was admitted yesterday by C. E. Wickland that a certain percentage of the values of the band in the entire district would be pledged to guarantee the cost of the bard in the entire district would be pledged to guarantee the cost of the bore. It is proposed to place these pledges in legal form so that they would be absolutely negotiable. According to this plan, it would require a bond of only \$15 an acre on the 200,000 acres, now virtually pledged, to pay the entire cost. It was announced yesterday that within 30 days sufficient pledges would be obtained to make the proposition absolutely sound and attractive to the financial interests that are expected in provide the ready capital for the construction of the tunnel and sulway. That property owners and the business interests of the West Side are enthusiastic over the plan of the Tualatin Valley farmers and land owners is indicated in the assurances given the propositions. 
