

KENYON DENOUNCES PURCHASE OF SEAT

Senator Says "No Use Mincing Words, Stephenson Bought Election."

CORRUPTION IS CHARGED

Iowa Condemns Attempt to Gloss Over What He Terms Debauchery of Electorate and Censures Majority Report.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Why mince words? Every man in this body knows that the election of Senator Stephenson was bought by the reckless, extravagant and wrongful use of money. You may gloss it over, smile about it, condone it, but the fact still remains—the seat was purchased.

Senator Kenyon, in a scathing denunciation of the methods alleged to have been used by the veteran Wisconsin senator in his campaign for his seat, made the foregoing statement to the Senate today.

The Iowa Senator, with Senators Capper, Jones, Keim and Lea, dissented from the majority report of the committee which investigated the election and held that charges of bribery and corruption had not been proved.

Debauchery is charged. "The election was the result of an organized riot of corruption, a debauchery of the electorate by treating employment, purchases, newspaper influence and other despicable methods," said Senator Kenyon. "Such practices should cease and cease now. Otherwise the number of corruptors will eat close to the heart of the republic."

"The only real danger that ever can threaten this Nation in the future is corruption in the body politic. It is the child of avarice and special privilege. It can exist only when the electorate is indifferent. They may be slow to be aroused, but when once aroused, the American people will drive the money-changers from the temple."

Investigation is Thorough.

"We at least," he continued, "have had an investigation as thorough as any that has ever been held. Men have been sickened by the foul odors that came from the cauldron of corruption. There is no divinity that guards a seat in this body acquired by such methods, no reason to talk in whispers concerning it, but boldly to brand it, as it is, a purchased seat."

"The minority offer no apology for their action. It has been an unpleasant duty but we have the consciousness at least of not voting to approve methods and practices in an election condemned by the majority as 'expensive' in violation of the fundamental principles underlying our system of government."

COAST MINT NOT INCLUDED

Kahn Finds House Committee Does Not Provide for San Francisco.

The Record will be continued as a weekly paper under the management of M. D. Tolk, a Boise newspaper man. The Inter-Mountain Farmer, the first number of which appeared February 1, will also be published here, although the business and business office will be maintained at Boise.

ALLEGED DEFAULTER FREE

Judge Allows Neil Turrell Liberty Pending Trial of Case.

On the promise of his attorney, Ralph A. Cook, that his client would surely appear and stand trial when wanted, Presiding Judge Kayser yesterday allowed Neil T. Turrell accused of embezzling \$2400 from a film company while employed as a bookkeeper, to go on his own recognizance. Turrell had been in the city a week, but District Attorney Cameron has refused to give any information as to where he could be found. To Deputy Sheriff Leonard, who held a warrant for his arrest. Yelling like a Plute Indian on the warpath, Lige Spencer, of Ozark County, Missouri, swung his team of mules out the Santa Fe trail into the main street of Waldenburg today and pulled up before a "wet" cafe with the announcement that he was the "Poet of the Ozarks" and the man who wrote the famous "Dawg Song."

A pishald coon dog had ambled into town ahead of Spencer and his team, and went to sleep in the roadway in front of the mules almost as soon as the team came to a stop.

"That dawg," and Lige pointed at the sleeping hound, as he unfolded his six-foot-two body to get down from his wagon seat, "that dawg was the inspiration of the most famous song that ever was writ, and further he is the best coon dog that ever chased a rascal into a scrub oak. 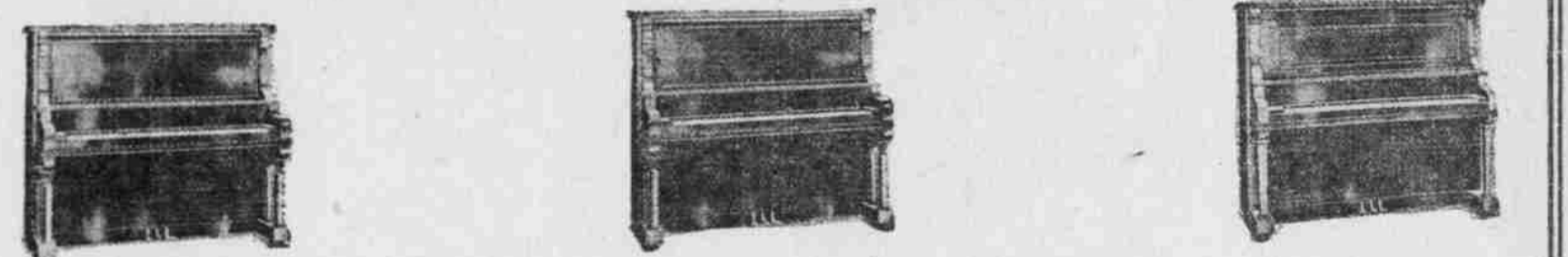

LABOR AGITATION MET

SAN FRANCISCO WOULD OFFSET FALSE ADVERTISEMENTS.

Declaration That City Has Surplus of Workmen Said to Be Wholly Untrue.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 4.—The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco called upon the city authorities by resolution today to take measures to counteract what were declared to be widely circulated and false advertisements proclaiming a demand for labor, especially skilled labor, in San Francisco. It was declared that the present surplus of labor here constitutes a grave situation.

James Rolph, Jr., Mayor, promised tonight to do all in his power to make known the real condition in this city. The resolution was given right of way over all business at the meeting of the Supervisors and was adopted unanimously. A priest of St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Cathedral, speaking in support of it, said that calls from skilled laborers for aid were more numerous in his parish than ever before.

The Panama-Pacific Exposition, work on which has not started, is said to have been used as the base for rosy reports about the labor situation, bringing hundreds of men here from Chicago, Pittsburg and the East. Members of the Board of Supervisors said tonight they had direct information that not more than 4000 men will be employed at any one time on exposition work and that 35,000 applications already are on file.
