# DEMOCRATIC PARTY MAY LOSE RIGHTS

25 Per Cent Vote for Representative Required for Use of Direct Primary Law.

LEADERS URGE INTEREST

With No Candidates in First and Third Congressional Districts Fear Is That Organization May Not Exist as Political Party.

Seriously thinking Democrats are be-ginning to realize that the wholesale practice of members of their party in registering as Republicans and par-ticipating in Republican primaries, complet with a constantly increasing Socialist vote, will eventuate in deny-ing to the Democratic party the priv-lege of nominating candidates under the provisions of the direct primary law.

law.

By registering as Republicans, Democrate age contributing materially to the disorganization of their party. The ranks of the Democratic party are being further depleted by desertions fo the Socialist cause. Between these two democratia are becoming convinced that the time has arrived, not only for taking stems to preserve their party organization, but to recruit its mambership as well.

25 Per Cent Vote Required.

One section of the direct primary law defines a political party as "an affiliation of elections representing a political party or an affiliation of elections representing a political party or organization, which, at the next general election preseding, polled for its candidate for Representative in Congress at least 25 per cent of the entire vote cast for that office in the state. Every such political party shall nominate all its candidates for public office under the provisions of this law and not in any other manner.

In other words, when the Democrats fall to cast 25 per cent of the total votes cast for Representative in Construct, it will cease to be a political party, as recognized in the direct primary, and no longer can nominate its candidates in that manner. Socialist Vote Growing.

Shipment From Deschutes Valley Sells for \$6.95.

I. Nichols, superintendent for the Baldwin Sheep & Land Company, of Hay Creek, who brought into Portland Thursday a carload of 194 hogs, the first ever shipped into Portland out of the Deschutes Valley and which topped the market for the year at \$6.95 per hundred pounds, declares that his trip to Portland is merely the fore-runner of a new order of things in the Deschutes Valley and represents the beginning of the change from ex-tensive to intensive and diversified

farming.

"People in the section from which we brought the stuck," he said, "have not yet swakened to the possibilities of hog-raising for the Portland market. We brought this carload here chiefly to prove to them that it is practical and profitable. Hogs are not now raised by farmers about Princylle and neighboring sections except for local consumption. Once let them comprehend the possibilities of raising for the Portland market and I believe that the Deschutes Valley country will become one of the finest hog-raising countries in the state."

The carload of hogs which Mr. Nichola brought to Portland to break the year's record for price in the local market were raised on sifalfa, with wheat to finish off. Mr. Nichola estimated the total cost of raising them at 3½ cents per pound. Shipped to Portlad the carload sold for \$6.95 per 100 pounds.
