

BOAT TO BE LIBELED

Western Steamship Company Asks \$28,450 Damages.

RIVER ACCIDENT RECALLED

Crew on the W. S. Porter Accused of Negligence When Steamer Westerner Was Struck and Sank.

Damages in the sum of \$28,450 are asked by the Western Steamship Company, controlling the steamer Westerner, of the Oregon & Malibu Coast, at the Associated Transportation Company, the marine branch of the Associated Oil Company, for injuries sustained by the Westerner the night of November 12, 1911, when she was struck by the steamer W. S. Porter, and sank near Pillar Rock, on the Lower Columbia.

The action was instituted yesterday in the United States District Court, and while the Porter was not in the river, she will be formally libeled by United States Marshal Scott (an) on arrival from the soundings. It is recalled that the Westerner's actual damages were \$19,150, but the delay necessary to make repairs, discharging her lumber cargo and general losses suffered increased the sum by \$9,300.

The Western Steamship Company places all responsibility for the accident on the Porter. The complaint sets forth that the lights of the Westerner were plainly visible, that there was an abundance of space in the channel for the Porter to have cleared her course, and that her crew was guilty of negligence in not maintaining a sufficient watch forward.

Both vessels were headed downstream, the Westerner laden with lumber for San Francisco and the Porter in ballast for the South to load fuel oil. Near Pillar Rock, which is about 14 miles above Astoria, the Westerner took a sheer, the cause reported being the starting of her wheel ropes, and the Porter, which was close astern, crashed into her. Captain Short was pilot of the Westerner and Captain "Billy" Patterson served in the same capacity aboard the Porter.

The crew of the Westerner, who was on the forecastle head at the time, evidently was precipitated into the river by the shock of the collision and drowned.

CALMS DELAYED SHIP KILLO

Vessel Lost 20 Days Waiting for Breeze on Coast. Claims were experienced for 20 days on the coast from Callas by the German ship Killo, arriving Thursday at Astoria, otherwise she might have cut a few days from the season's record for the river, which was 23 days. The skipper of the Killo has related at Astoria that the vessel was favored on the voyage as far as 20 north, where a series of calms were met with and she passed 20 days trying to get out of the zone.

MORE FLOUR TONNAGE SOUGHT

Exporters to Load Second Tramp for Oriental Harbors. At least one more tramp will follow the Japanese steamer Unkai, which today from Victoria, to load flour for the Far East. The determination of the Waterhouse line to increase the rate on that product from Portland 50 cents a ton during June, with prospects that it will be raised on July shipments, has attracted exporters and negotiations are under way for fixing an additional carrier so at least some of the flour will be routed cheaper.

The arrangement also will afford an outlet for more than would move with only the regular service on which to depend. The Unkai Mars will be in the harbor today and is to load at the Portland Flouring Mills Company's plant. The flour will carry about 3500 short tons, as some of her space is reserved for coal. Unless a direct steamship line is inaugurated during the present year, a continuation of the heavy demand for flour from abroad no doubt will result in other tramp carriers being fixed if rates are reasonable, as the proposed tariff fixed for the summer will be added to September 1 on the general rice agreed on of \$1 a ton.

PORTLAND'S RECEIPTS LEAD

City is Ahead of Seattle 5819 Cars of Wheat This Season. Wheat receipts at Portland for March already have exceeded 250 cars and for the season to date 11,167 cars have been received. The city leads Tacoma by 1182 cars and is ahead of Seattle 5819 cars. For March Tacoma has received 223 cars and for the season 10,025 cars, while Seattle's business for March is 174 cars and for the season 2533 cars.

Earlier in the season Portland did not make such a good showing against the northern ports, because the application of the same rail rate from the wheat belt over the mountains to Puget Sound as was in force in Portland increased the cereal movement northward. Portland is far ahead of the Sound district in wheat exportation for the cereal year and only an unprecedented spurt in the north could lose for her grain on the coast. The cereal moving north is largely ground into flour, while the bulk coming to Portland for shipment moves in the original state to California and the United Kingdom.

HERTHA DOLBEER IS SOLD

Scottish Lacks, Selene, S. Celeste and C. Margherita Change Flags. Of recent sales in the marine sphere the latest transaction on the coast dealt with the transfer of the schooner Herta Dolbeer, which has been laid up at Eureka since a year ago in January, by Dolbeer & Carson to the Pacific States Trading Company. She was launched in 1881 at Fairhaven, Cal., and was formerly well known in the coastwise trade.

Sales reported from abroad include that of the British ship Scottish Lacks, which will hereafter fly the Norwegian flag. She was known among the grain carriers, as was the German bark Selene, which has likewise been sold to Norwegians. The Scottish Lacks was built in 1883 at Southampton and the Selene took the water at Rostock a year later. The Italian ship S. Celeste, which was one of the trimmest of her

Wheat Reserves Only 10 PER CENT OF CROP. Unsold Stocks Smaller Than in Recent Years—Holdings of Corn Are Small.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The March crop report of the United States Department of Agriculture, issued at 2:30 P.
