





> Climb Falls, Given Opportunity to Recuperate Energy.

COMMISSION ORDERS NETS TO

Following a visit to Oregon City or Sunday, when they inspected the river in the vicinity of the falls, where salmon collect in large numbers, three salmon collect in large numbers, three members of the Fish and Game Com-mission, J. H. Hughes, of Gold Hill: M. J. Kinney, Portland, and G. H. Kelly, Eugene, at their meeting yesterday is-stored an order that the deadline at Ore-gon City for not fishermen shall be brought down 1000 feet, or to a point on the river from the O.-W. R. & N. dock to a pier on the west side of the river.

This order will go into effect on May This order will go into effect on any i, or the date the present order clos-ing the Willamette River to commer-cial fishing expires. The effect of this order will be that the salmon which collect in large numbers around the fails on their way up the river to the spawning grounds will have a larger area in which to rest than ever before. Mambers of the commission were left Members of the commission were led to the decision believing that it is in the best interests of the fishing in-dustry. They contend that the benefits derived from having the deadline at a distance of 600 feet from the falls, as

distance of 600 feet from the fain, as heretafore, accure to a group of fisher-men numbering hardly more than half a dozen. Members of the Commission spent Sunday in inspecting all the inlets for some distance around the fails and they were thus enabled to judge of the advisability of increasing the restricted area.


