

### OPTIMISM SHOWN AT MEXICO CITY

Popular Demonstration of Loyalty on Sunday Encourages the Officials.

### CRISIS EXPECTED SOON

Life or Death of Revolution to Be Decided in Vicinity of Torreon in Next Few Days—Americans Gain Confidence.

MEXICO CITY, March 11.—A decided feeling of optimism pervaded the capital today, affecting foreigners and Mexicans alike. The popular demonstration of loyalty to the government yesterday has stiffened the backs of government officials and private citizens.

This fact was manifest today by a material increase in the number of enlistments for army service. Business men generally profess to see a great improvement in the outlook. Everywhere the opinion was expressed that the life or death of the revolution depends upon the developments in the next few days in the vicinity of Torreon. A sentiment of renewed confidence in the ability of the federalists to deliver a crushing blow to Orozco was shown.

Government officials say that in addition to the 2500 men already at Torreon, as many more can be equipped and sent there if necessary.

Foreigners here appear to consider remote the chance of harm befalling persons in the capital adopted by the War Department has been reflected in the Interior Department. Apparently a quietism is being kept upon publishers who from time to time have flooded the city with anti-government literature. With the exception of this class of publication, there is seen a noticeable change in the tone of the comment by the newspapers upon President Madero and his ministers. Two plants of publication were closed tonight.

Reports from the vicinity of Torreon are that volunteers are recently recruited in neighboring towns are receiving arms and being entrained from Torreon, where General Gonzales Salas is mobilizing his forces.

### ALBANY WOMAN IS DEAD

Mrs. Louisa Kroschel Born in Germany 78 Years Ago.

ALBANY, Or., March 11.—(Special.)—Mrs. Louisa Kroschel died at her home in this city yesterday morning. She was born in Brandenburg Province, Germany, August 10, 1833, and was married in Germany to August Kroschel December 29, 1855.

She celebrated her golden wedding in this city December 29, 1910.

Immediately after her marriage Mrs. Kroschel resided at Los Angeles, settling in Wisconsin, where they lived seven and a half years. They then moved to Minnesota and after residing there 2 1/2 years came to Oregon. They located on a farm in Benton County near Albany, and have since then lived in or near this city.

Her funeral will be held at the family residence in this city Wednesday.

### ESCAPED PRISONER CAUGHT

Jackson County posse expects to capture other fugitives soon.

MEERFORD, Or., March 11.—(Special.)—S. W. Blane, one of the three prisoners who escaped from the Jackson County Jail Friday night, was captured at Meersford, Wash. Blane was today by Sheriff Jones and a posse of nine men. Blane was without ammunition or food and made no resistance. He said that his companions left him Sunday, each man to shift for himself.

It is believed the other two men are in the vicinity of Falls Creek and their capture is expected. The authorities in Josephine County are closing in from the north and as both of the men have stolen rifles and food, a sharp fight is expected. Blane will be taken back to Jacksonville.

San Francisco labor leaders' hearing set for April 2.

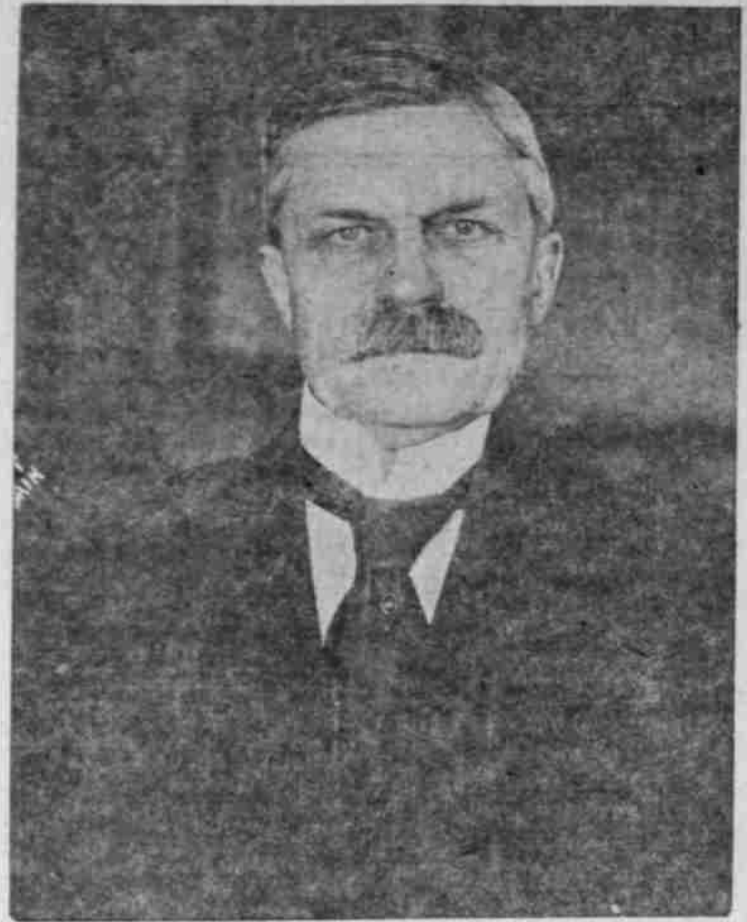
SAN FRANCISCO, March 11.—The hearing of the objections to the removal of Federal agents of Oat A. Twit, one and C. Gentry, local labor leaders, indicted on a charge of conspiracy in connection with the shipment of dynamite between states, was continued today until April 2 by mutual consent of counsel. Oscar Lawler, special counsel for the prosecution, was in court, and agreed to Attorney Schlessinger's delay. No specific grounds for the continuance were given.

The progressive spirit, instead of aiding to fulfill what has been promised solemnly in the name of the people, it is proclaimed that the initiative, referendum and the recall of officials, including judges, and of judicial decisions, small from now on be the test of progressive Republicanism.

"The pledges of that platform have been kept," declared Secretary Nagel. Further remedies were necessary, said the secretary, to make corporate control effective.

### TASK STILL UNFINISHED

"This task is still unfinished," said Mr. Nagel. "It were better that we apply ourselves to the practical performance of so important a pledge than to fill the public ear with vague promises for the fulfillment of visionary desires. The initiative, referendum and recall are advocated by men who are ambitious for national office and generally avoided by men who have to do with local affairs."

### CALIFORNIANS CHEER TAFT

Steps Taken at Los Angeles to Carry State for President.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 11.—(Special.)—Republicans of Southern California took the first step to carry the state for President Taft with a routing meeting, attended by 100 workers, at Symphony Hall this afternoon. It was the first step, because on Southern California depends the result, the north having shown itself for the President's renomination. The south is expected to clinch it.

Judicial Court, today issued an order of notice in the case, which is returnable Friday.

### CONFERENCE SET FOR TODAY

Strikers Try to Rescue Woman and Police Use Clubs.

LAWRENCE, Mass., March 11.—Proposed conference between representatives of the strikers and the American Woolen Company, looking toward early settlement of the textile strike, did not take place today, as a misunderstanding. It is expected that the conference will take place tomorrow.

A demonstration early today in front of the police station by several hundred strikers and sympathizers, including many women, threatened for a time to develop into a serious disturbance. The crowd assembled after the arrest of a woman, striker and became so menacing that the police had to use their clubs.

The police say that the woman displayed a revolver while engaged in picketing. On the way to the station house with their captives the officers were followed by a crowd of several hundred persons.

Guilano Bruno was sentenced today to the House of Correction for two months for striking a girl operative. Two women were fined \$25 each for attacking girls. They appealed. One male picket was fined \$100 for intimidating. Small fines were imposed on five other women.

### EX-BANKER JAILS SELF

H. M. BOONE, CONVICT, GOES UNATTENDED TO PRISON.

Failure of Friends to Obtain Pardon Causes Former Head of Institution to Accept Fate.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., March 11.—(Special.)—Finally convinced of the futility of his escape from serving the one-to-two-years' sentence imposed upon him for larceny, H. M. Boone, former president of the State Bank of Piquette, arrived here unaccompanied today and began serving his time in the penitentiary. Commitment papers were received at the prison Saturday, but Boone, who had been making his home at Hanford, did not arrive until this morning.

Interest attaches to the case by reason of the stubborn fight made by Boone's friends in Whitman County for clemency. Applications for a pardon were denied by Governor Hay and, on hearing this, Boone communicated with Warden Reed by long-distance telephone, notifying the warden that he was coming to Walla Walla to serve his sentence.

Boone was convicted of larceny by embezzlement in connection with the failure of the State Bank of Piquette, which closed its doors May 21, 1909. Before entering the prison Boone said: "Because of the horrors through which I have passed during the last two years I have at times doubted there being such a thing as justice in human affairs. But when I read and realize the joyful and steadfast friendship of my host of true and tried friends, both in Whitman County and throughout the state, whose faith in my honesty can never be shaken by jury or court of law, I take renewed hope and still have faith in God and humanity."
