NO NAMES PUT UP Pretty

Petitions Not to Be Circulated for Vice-President.

CHOICE TO BE WRITTEN IN

Both Parties Fight Shy of Complicating Campaign for Presidency By Introducing Issue of Unsought Office.

Republicans are so engrossed in the capilidacy of either Taft, La Follette or Roosevelt and Democrats are so enthuslastic in their advocacy of Clark, Wilson or Harmon for the Presidency hat neither party in Oregon has given my consideration to the matter of placing the name of a candidate on the primary nominating ballot for party's indorsement for Vice-President.
It is virtually assured that the voters

n both parties will express their preference for Vice-President by writ-ing the name of their choice for the office on the ballot.

The truth is to date there has been little talk of candidates as running mates for the Presidential nominee in

either party. Besides, the time in which a candidate for Vice-President could be regularly nominated and secure space in the official pamphlet expired March 5. Friends of such a candidate, however, have until March 29 to complete nominating petitions and have his name printed on the official primary ballot.

No Candidates in Field. Between the absence of an avowed andidate in sither party for this nom-Between the absence of an avowed candidate in sither party for this nomination and the trouble and expense of circulating the necessary nominiting petitions and obtaining the requisite number of signatures, it is assured there will not be any official nominations so far as this office is concerned. As in the case of Presidential electors, there will be sufficient space on the ballot for the elector to write in the name of his choice for either of the two offices. So far as Oregon is concerned, the voters in each party will follow this method in indicating their preference for a suitable running mate for the party's candidate for President. The man receiving the greatest number of his party's votes will receive the indorsement of his party for the office of Vice-President.

The Jemocrats are not ina strong combination for vote-gutting purposes. The Jemocrats are not indicating any choice, but are centering a divided strength in support of the candidacy of one of the three prominent men in the party. Wilson, Harmon and Clark, admittedly the most formidable candidates in the field for the Democratic comination.

"Section 2266. All nominating petitions and notices pertaining to state or district offices to be voted for in more than one county, and for the Judges of the Circuit Court and District Attorneys, shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State; for county offices and district offices to be voted for in one county only shall be filled with the County Clerk."

"It is very plain that those who have filed at Salem are wrong," said Mr. Shepherd last night. "I will, however, make no move to keep the names of the other candidates off the primary ballot, and I think the Secretary of State will allow them to take space of State will allow them to take space in the voters' pamphlet."
