The defense will contend that the noise which Mr. Dorres heard was caused by Wortman, who weighed about 215 pounds, throwing Hicks, a much smaller man against the building. point Hicks remained standing in that position for possibly five or seven minutes, Mr. Dorres testified, and then started walking slowly toward the wit-ness. Hicks was within about five feet of him and the latter was about to afferess Hicks when a woman, a Mrs. Bingenhelmer, came down the street from the direction of Grand avenue and said she wished to pay Mr. Dorres some money on account.

Answer Held Unimportant. Attorneys for the state affect to attach but little importance to this evidence, saying that Hicks and Wort-man were moving about rapidly and that only the testimony of eye witnesses can establish what their posi-tions were with respect to each other when the fatal bullet left the revolver.
