FILMS DEPICT TRIP

Diners See Pictures of Oregon First Excursion.

PRINCIPAL EVENTS SHOWN
Members of Portland Commercial Club Welcome Home Party Who Made Journey and Enjoy Camera-Caught Scenes.

Scenes from the Oregon First excursion party were shown at the selection of the site for the Oregon building at the Panama-Pacific Exposition were served to the members of the Portland Commercial Club, which were shown last night. Many of the members who had been unable to take part in the excursion brought with them a camera, and the big dining-room was assembled to welcome home the excursionists and see with them the review of the events that had transpired in San Francisco.

A series of stereopticon slides reproducing pages from the San Francisco newspapers published while the excursion party was in San Francisco was shown first, giving the guests an idea of the deep interest that was taken in the visit of the Oregonians by the press and the people of San Francisco.

Larson Explains Pictures.
Following this series of slides three moving-picture films, sent to the club through the courtesy of M. G. Winstock, of the People's Amusement Company, depicted the events of the trip and the site-selecting ceremony. J. Fred Larson, of the excursion committee, was constituted lecturer to explain the scenes, and a number of other prominent officials, and other prominent officials, were being shown.

The first film showed the arrival of the fair officials at Veneta to greet the incoming excursion, and gave pictures of Mayor Rolph, of San Francisco, Lieutenant-Governor Wallace, C. G. Moore, president of the exposition, and other prominent officials.

Scenes of the arrival in San Francisco were shown; the great automobile parade, where more than 1000 automobiles lined through the streets of the city and swept up and down the beach, the stirring spectacle of the dress parade at the Presidio, the honor of the city and raising of the flag over the Oregon site, and the transfer of the deed to Governor West by President Moore, Mrs. Rose Bloch Bauer singing the "Oregon Song" from the rostrum at the Oregon site, and the selection of the site for the Nevada building by Governor Odie, immediately after the Oregon site had been bestowed.

Excursionists Are Recognized.
Numerous moving-picture machines were at work at the ceremony of selecting the site, and the entire ceremony is presented from several points of view. Prominent men of the Oregon delegation are recognizable in the pictures, and these came in for a share of good-natured joking from their fellow club members as the pictures were whirled upon the screen last night.

Following this film the guests were taken via the moving-picture route on an excursion about the bay and a visit to the drydocks. In this film they were given an opportunity of viewing the Oregon site from the bay and judging of its merits. Prior to the exciting of the first carload of rock upon the seawall by Governor West, and the second by Julius Meier, chairman of the Oregon commission; the first actual work upon the fairgrounds after the selection of the two building sites.

BIG FUND TO AID STATE
Immigration Board Plans Booklet to Attract Home-seekers.

Oregon's plan for promoting and handling her immigration in future will be considered tomorrow at the first meeting of the immigration board since the release of the \$25,000 immigration fund appropriated at the last session of the Legislature. C. C. Chapman, state immigration agent and chairman of the board, appointed to succeed Leroy Parks, resigned, will preside at the meeting. Other members of the board are Thomas Burke, of Baker; A. F. Hofer, of Salem; W. E. Conan, J. M. Scott and M. N. Dana, of Portland.
