GENERAL MARKET FIRM

Traffic Men Report Business Holding Up Well, but Congestion Results From Car Shortage. Advance in Call Money.

NEW YORK, April 1.—After a brief ifregular period and confusion in prices, the stock market today resumed its upward movement in the industrials.

Amaigamated Copper sold at its highest price and gains of from one to two points were made by Anaconda Copper, Utah Copper and Tennessee Copper, while American Smelting and United States Steel recovered some of the ground loss last week. It is noteworthy that railway stocks were far less conspicuous than the other group.

The further rise in the copper stocks was concurrent with another advance in the price of metal, which was quoted at 15%c to 16c per pound.

Weekly reports of the western traffic managers indicate that business is holding up well, although congestion has resulted from the car shortage.

An advance in call money to 3 per cent, together with profit taking, produced dullness and fractional recessions in the last hour, but the undertone was firm. The rise in money was a natural corollary to last Saturday's bank statement, in which actual reserves were all but depleted. It may be assumed that this condition will be rectified in a week, as a large proportion of the April 1 interest and dividend payments is certain to ge back into bank coffers.

The day's railroad returns for February included the Pennsylvania system, its eastern lines increasing about \$500,000 net, with those west of Pittsburg increasing \$500,000. The returns of New York Central were favorable, as also were Northern Pacific and St. Louis Southwestern. Illinois Central lost almost \$500,000 net and the Atlantic Coast Line decreased \$128,000. United States coupon advanced 'a per cent on call.
