

AWARDS ARE MADE IN AIREDALE CLASS

Judge Says Terriers Among Finest He Has Seen in Country.

WINNERS SHOWN TODAY

Champion Dundee Swasher Takes High Honors in Heavyweight Bulldog Class—Puppies Will Be Reviewed Tonight.

Although the most important awards of the Portland Kennel Club's show in the basement of the city building are yet to be made, many prominent dogs were judged yesterday. The big feature of the day was the awards to the Airedale terriers under the direction of the Northwest Airedale Futurity Show, which was held here in connection with the 13th annual show of the Portland club.

Dr. G. F. Laddix and G. F. Downer showed a number of dogs which Dr. Henry Jarrett, the judge, declared were among the best he had seen in the country. He has judged at the New York and Philadelphia shows.

Champion Dundee Swasher took high honors in the heavy weight division, with Rodney Merley, owned by McCarthy and West, second. Neither McCarthy nor Eugene West were there in time to show their dog, and as their entry is a little unwieldy when in strange hands, it failed to show up at best, the owners say.

The Northwest Club met in the morning in the rooms adjoining the show hall, the following officers were elected: R. Taylor, North Takima, Wash., president; Dr. Adix, Estacada, first vice-president; and James Keefe, Butte, Mont., secretary and treasurer.

A board of directors consisting of G. F. Downer, Butte; R. M. Palmer, Butte; N. C. Westerfield, Oregon City; W. B. Bailey, Auburn, Wash., and C. W. Reckers, White Salmon, Wash., was also chosen.

The features of today will be the judging of the variety classes, beginning at 3 o'clock, while at night the puppies of all classes will be reviewed. All the dogs that have won prizes will be on exhibition all day.

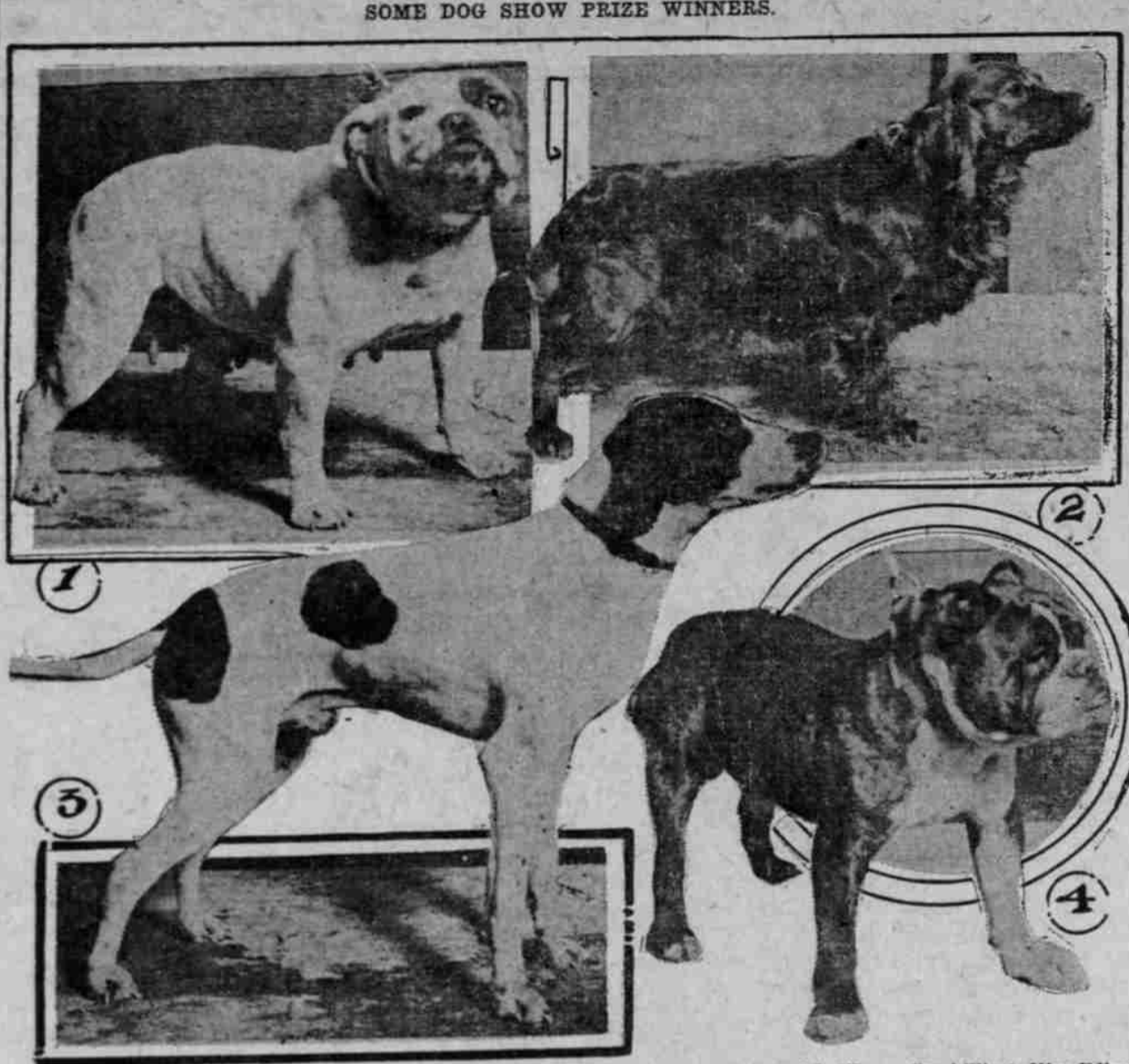

RIFLE RANGE SOUGHT

JONES ASKS FOR APPROPRIATION OF \$25,750. Land Lies Near Vancouver Barracks and Has Been Leased by Government for Several Years.

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Senator Jones today proposed an amendment to the sundry bill appropriating \$25,750 for the purchase of 220 acres of land near Vancouver Barracks for use as a rifle range. This land has been leased by the Government for several years, and the Army officers strongly urge the purchase.

Senators Jones also offered amendments to the river and harbor bill authorizing surveys as follows:

Columbia River, Vancouver to the mouth of the Willamette, with view to the joint project, half the cost to be borne by the Port of Vancouver; Columbia River, from and through Richey Rapids and Grand Rapids to the international boundary, with a view to open the river navigation; Nasal North and other rivers entering Willapa Harbor, with a view to snagging; proposed water way connecting Smilk Bay with Padilla Bay; also an amendment increasing the appropriation to the Columbia River between Bridgeport and Kettle Falls from \$25,000 to \$50,000.

Senator Jones also presented an amendment to the agricultural bill increasing the appropriation for wood experiments from \$165,000 to \$175,000, with a view to enlarging the investigations of woods supposed to be valuable for making paper.

"DRY" CAMPAIGN HOT ONE

Idaho Local Option Contest Will Resemble Pioneer Days.

LEWISTON, Idaho, April 4.—(Special.)—According to the oldest politicians in Nez Perce, one of the pioneer localities of the state, sharply political lines in county politics have been totally wiped out by the prohibition movement which has swept over this state during the past two years.

The local option question, and the struggle for supremacy in the local fight will resolve itself into a contest far bitter than has been witnessed in North Idaho since pioneer days.

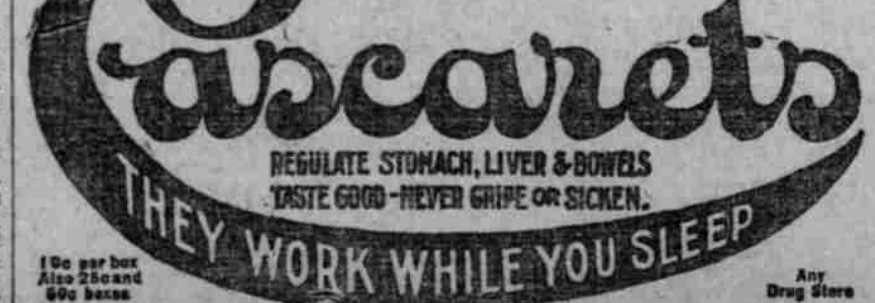
