FULL OVES SERMON

Famous Preacher Speaker at Taylor-Street Church. PATIENCE OF DEITY TOLD Beautiful Picture Drawn of Hope for Christians in God's Mercy in Address Filled With Passages of Noble Eloquence.

"It is the child who tomorrow dips up the seed he planted yesterday to see whether or not it is growing; and in this respect many of us are children of larger growth." So was the statement of Dr. John Wesley Hill, in his sermon at Taylor-Street Methodist Church last night. He took for his text, Rev. 1:9: "I, John, who also am your brother, and companion in tribulation and in the kingdom and patience of Jesus Christ, was in the isle that is called Patmos, for the word of God, and for the testimony of Jesus Christ."

PATIENCE A DIVINE ATTRIBUTE.

"When theologians draw pictures of God that stamp him with remorseless absolutism, when they represent him as occupied only with his own glory, seated in majesty, caring nothing for the endless agonies of the creatures he has made, burning with implacable wrath against little deviations of opinions, regarding weaknesses of character and mistakes of judgment as deserving in finite punishment; when they think of him as set forth by the genius of Michael Angelo in the Sistine Chapel, hurling from his burning hand 10,000 thunderbolts upon the crushed and tortured millions for whom Christ died in vain; when they say that God must be just and may be merciful and set themselves to parcelling out the divine nature into sections, drawing boundary lines with mathematical precision and then setting up standards of judgment and mercy to enquire upon truth and mercy, then they forget that all the great moral qualities are duly proportioned in the divine nature, that they include each other in a way that defies triangulation and that patience is the guardian of them all."

PATIENCE EXALTS CHARACTER.

"Not only does patience ennoble and exalt character, but it imparts to life its only true, abiding perspective. How can these things be? We often explain that they are a part of the unbreakable agonies by which human bodies are tortured for many years, the wrongs of oppression, pestilence, pest, flood, earthquake and famine. How can a merciful God permit such severities? Patience comes to the rescue and becomes the interpreter of the divine will.
