BALTIMORE, April 14 .- The trend of American Judaism and its use in the preservation and growth of the religion of Israel constituted the message given today to the Central Conference of today to the Central Conference of American rabbles here by its president, Samuel Schulman, of New York, Rabbi Schulman praised the Government at Washington for what it had done on the Russian passport question. Rabbi Schulman sa'd "As the religious leaders of the

synagogue we naturally take this op-portunity to congratulate the National Government and through it the American people upon the clear enunciation of the principle that the United States cannot allow any discrimination to be made by any government in American citizenship because of distinctions of race or creed. We congratulate them upon the act which told the Russian government that the United States expected every government to honor an American passport in the hands of an American citizen irrespective of race American citizen, irrespective of race

Christian Science Criticised. "Conscious of its liberality, and at the same time of its duty, the synagogue should watch jealously sible undermining of its integrity from within. NEW ORLEANS, April 14.—Eugene P. Bahler, president of the Teutonia Bank & Trust Company, of New Or-leans, and Joseph H. Comila, a director, were arrested here today charged with making false statements to the bank examiner and concealing the true con-

dition of the bank.

Frank J. Braud, a former assistant cashier of the same bank and now a public accountant, was arrested at the same time, charged with embezzing \$6000 of the bank's funds. The arrests

see made after an investigation by District Attorney St. Clair Adams. The bank is a state institution.

A committee from the New Orleans Clearing-House has investigated the bank's securities to determine what steps should be taken if assistance is needed. Ex-Assistant Cashier Braud severed his connection with the bank more than a year ago, and it is charged that President Bahler and Director Comila attempted to cover up his alloged shortage when the bank was examined some time ago by the State Bank Examiner.

President Bahler is prominent in local financial and social circles. He is president of the Teutonia Loan & Building Company, and a director of a local insurance company. The Teutonia bank has a capital stock of \$200,000, with \$77,220 surplus and undivided profits.

FLOOR BREAKS, TWO DIE

MORE THAN 20 HURT IN ACCI-DENT IN CHURCH.

Nearly 300 Persons Precipitated to Basement of Edifice at Harrington Park, N. J.

Men, women and children were caught and many were crushed hadly. Nicholas Ottingen and Mrs. E. Hoelkern were injured so badly that they died within a short time. About a dozen persons were taken out unconscious and several sustained fractures of legs
