Serious Condition in Missouri Wheat Counties.

OTHER NEWS ALSO BAD

Total of Seven Million Acres Reported to Be Abandoned in the Central West-Highest Prices of Year at Chicago.

Cificago, April 19.—Unexpectedly adverse crop estimates for Missouri and a revision upward in the total abandoned acreage of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois helped raise the price of wheat today to a new high point for the year. In provisions, the outcome varied from 74c decline to 24c advance.

outcome varied from Tipe decline to 2 is advance.

A big buil market in wheat followed reports that Missouri would raise only half a crop. One leading expert sent dispatches that the river counties north of St. Louis had given up hope for 10 to 60 per cent. of the heids and that in the big central counties north of the Missouri River. 30 per cent. of the acreage had been put into oats. South of that section he figured the condition as not above 73. Another authority calculated the number of lost acres to 1.000.000 in Missouri; 1.000.000 in Kansas 4.000.000 in Missouri; 1.000.000 in Kansas 5.000.000 in Hinols, Indiana and Ohio together, and 1.000.000 in all other states. Spirited fighting took place in the corn trade, an attempt being made to break the May price by an attack on the September delivery. The buil leader, however, bid continuously for 100.000 bushel lots and, alted by wheat strength, maintained the upper hand, although the market proved a nervous and irregular affair all day.


