Several large apartment-houses near the bosiness district likewise have con-tracted with the Elks to accommodate some of their guests, but the demand for space continues. "I am advising everyone that we will

for space continues. "I am advising everyone that we will have snough room to take care of all who come." said Harry C. McAllister, secretary of the convention committee, yesterday, "but it will require the as-sintance of everyone in Portland to meet the situation. I am trying to get into communication with families that will be able to take strangers into their homes for a period of a week or 18 days and expect that in this way we will be able to place everyone com-formably. fortably

#### Homes Thrown Open.

"Many Portlanders have called me by "Many Portlanders have called me by islephone and others have written to me, saying they will accommodate some of our visitors. We are eager to hear from everyons who has rooms to rent in the city. Nearly all our in-quiries are for rooms with baths, but it is immaterial whether they are lo-cated in homes on the East or the West Side of the river." McAllister now has several hundred




