Calder, a wealthy Portland timberman, representative of the Wallowa Timber Company, is at his residence at \$69 Sixteenth street, on Portland Heights, with two bones of his wrist broken, in an accident that was the result of another accident that happened exactly three months before, in which he sustained a broken ankle. His wife also is suffering from an injury which she sustained in an automobile accident about a year before. Three months ago, while cranking his automobile, the crank suddenly came off, causing Mr. Calder to fall and sustain a broken ankle. Mr. Calder was obliged to use crutches. A piece of W. C. A piece of glass became caught on the bottom of one of the crutches while he was walk-ing in the kitchen last Monday and Mr. Calder fell against the kitchen Mr. Caider fell against the kitchen stove. A deep gash was cut near his right eye and two wrist bones of the right arm were broken. Mr. Calder now is confined to his bed because of the accident. 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
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
