

USBRIDGE FAILS High Seas Beat Stranded Vessel; Engines Useless.

RESCUERS FACE PERILS

Second Attempt Is Frustrated as Line From Jetty Breaks—Third Try Will Be Made This Morning—Engineer Is Scolded.

RAY CITY, Or., May 6.—(Special)—With high seas raging throughout the day and a stiff wind from the north west making the Herculean efforts of the rescue parties to pull the steamer George R. Voeberg off the spit, at the entrance of the Nehalem River, exceedingly dangerous, another attempt will be made Tuesday morning at 2:45 o'clock to pull the damaged vessel into deep water.

Death was all but dealt out to several members of the rescue party today, when the line from the end of the Jetty broke just as success was within grasp and it seemed as if the high tide would release the stranded steamer.

High Sea Floods Engine-Room. During low tide the crew of the Voeberg had patched the hole in the hull with the hope of using the engines when the attempt at rescue was made. The sea ran so high, however, backed by a stiff northwest wind, that the patch was torn off and the engine-rooms flooded and made useless. The vessel was cleared only by a long siege at the hand pumps.

With oil bags attached, the vessel has been driven 15 feet higher on the bar, but tomorrow morning at 2:45 o'clock, an effort will be made to pull her off. The tide at this time will be 1.4 higher than any time in the last 24 hours. It is believed this, the third attempt, will be successful.

Engineer Is Scolded. William Campbell, of Tillamook, second engineer, was scolded by a breaking steam pipe on the morning of the rescue party had close escapes, when a narrow plank on which they were standing broke in the center and precipitated them to the rocks.

EXPENSE BILL NOT FILED

Workmen's Political Club May Be Prosecuted.

If the Workmen's Political Club, which represented organized labor in the recent campaign, expended any money in support of any candidate, District Attorney Cameron plainly intimated last night he would proceed to prosecute the officers of the Workmen's Political Club has failed to file a statement with the County Clerk.

It is possible this organization did not expend any money in the campaign, said District Attorney Cameron yesterday. "I shall first ascertain if it has filed a report. If no report has been filed, I shall then inquire into whether or not the organization expended any money in its fight. If it did and a report has not been filed, the corrupt practices act has been violated and money will be ground for complaint. One thing is sure, the organization referred to got out a ticket, indorsed candidates and conducted a campaign in their behalf. The probability is that money was spent."

James Maguire, secretary of the club, was out of the city and Andy J. Macdonald, another active member of the organization, could not be found last night. This club actively supported the candidacy of a number of officers in the recent election, including Seneca Poston, one of three candidates who opposed District Attorney Cameron for another term. Maguire has been active in circulating the necessary papers and otherwise regarding the election.

HILL WINS WATER WAR

Rights on Clear Lake and McKenzie River Gained.

SALEM, Or., May 6.—(Special)—The Hill interests have apparently won their fight for control of the waters of Clear Lake and McKenzie River for power purposes.

Today the McKenzie Valley Irrigation & Power Company played the stroke against the Harriman interests, which, it is believed certain, will give them the power, so far as the State Engineer is concerned, a \$225,000 fee for filling on the waters of the lake and river. This is preparatory to the development of 44,261 horsepower and the expenditure of \$1,560,000 in improvements.

The Southern Pacific asked for 30,000 horsepower and promised to make improvements at a contemplated cost of \$1,600,000.

State Engineer Lewis said today that undoubtedly the proposition of the McKenzie Valley Irrigation & Power Company will be accepted and the filling approved.

"Inasmuch as the McKenzie Valley company asks for water for irrigation, and power development as well, it is practically as great a development as can be attained from the waters, and as broad a use as can be given. The McKenzie Valley company has a prior filling to that of the Southern Pacific."

With the Hill interests evidently winning out, it will mean that work on the enormous improvements contemplated must be started within a year and finished within five years.

SALEM DEAL IS RECORD

Top Price Is Paid for Down-Town Corner Lot.

SALEM, Or., May 6.—(Special)—What is, without exception, the top-notch price ever paid for Salem property is that in a corner lot situated today where John J. Roberts purchased from William McElhrist, Jr., the Vermont corner, at 1st and Liberty streets. The property is practically vacant, but being covered only by shacks, and has a frontage of but

13 feet. The consideration was \$48,000. Less than a year ago Mr. McElhrist purchased the property for \$28,000, marking a \$10,000 increase within that time.
