SOAPBOX ORATOR, ONE DAY OUT. RETURNS TO JAIL.

Theosophist, Pronounced Sane by Alienists, Again Tries to Break up Socialists' Meeting.

One day out of jail, with his sanity approved by an alienist, Christian F. Kraber, Theosophist of scap-box ora-Kraber, Theosophist of scap-box ofa-torical fame, was arrested again yes-terday in the Plaza at Fourth and Sal-mon streets by Patrolmen Butler and Madden, after he had resumed his tac-tics of trying to break up Socialist meetings by starting a counter-attrac-tion a few feet away. The policemen reported that they arrested Kraber to save his life.

Advance notices of the incident were given by Kraber earlier in the day, when he paraded down Washington street with an American flag and a cornet. Arriving at the Plaza, he sounded his trumpet and set up his rostrum close to where the Socialists were expounding to a large crowd. "He is hired by capital to break up our meetings," they shouted.

Kraber was relating his arrest Friday night and boasting of his "triumphant vindication," when Patrolman Butler tapped him on the shoulder, just as the patrol wagon rounded the corner. He offered ball in any amount, but was held, under the belief that if released he would repeat the disturbance at the evening meetings. He will appear in court today on a charge of disorderly conduct.
