Bugs Blank Colts, 7 to 0, and Straighten Out Curves of Two Twirlers.

In marked contrast to their diamond performance of Monday, the erstwhile Giants played errorless ball, while Cecil Thompson, ex-sacramento south-paw, produced such a repertoire of mystifiers that the Colts registered only three safe kicks, and succeeded in shutting off one equine as far as third base.

Klein Fitches Job Away. Lefty Klein, the Seattle discard, aspired to "show up" his former teammates, but worked himself out of a job instead. He lasted but two innings of the nine, but before he heaved over his final ball, celebrating his final appearance with a strikeout, five Bugs were sent across the plate.

With Barry back in the game and deporting himself in a manner to insure permanency, Raymond switched from short to second in place of Hoesa Sinar, victim of lumbago at St. Vincent's Hospital, and Chick at short, the Bugs presented an impenetrable lineup to the Nicka. The seven misuses of Monday had evidently rid the machine of holdover errors.

Only 38 Colts faced Thompson in nine innings, the record for 1912 baseball in Portland. Coltrin singled in the third but was forced at second base. Fries singled in the seventh, was trotted to second when Thompson walked. Strait, his only pass of the game, and Williams hit into a double play, breaking up the best chance to score the Equine lead. Moran hit to center for two sacks in the ninth, really stretching a single into a double by fast base running, went to third on Speas' infield out, but died there when Fries flied out to Mann in center field. 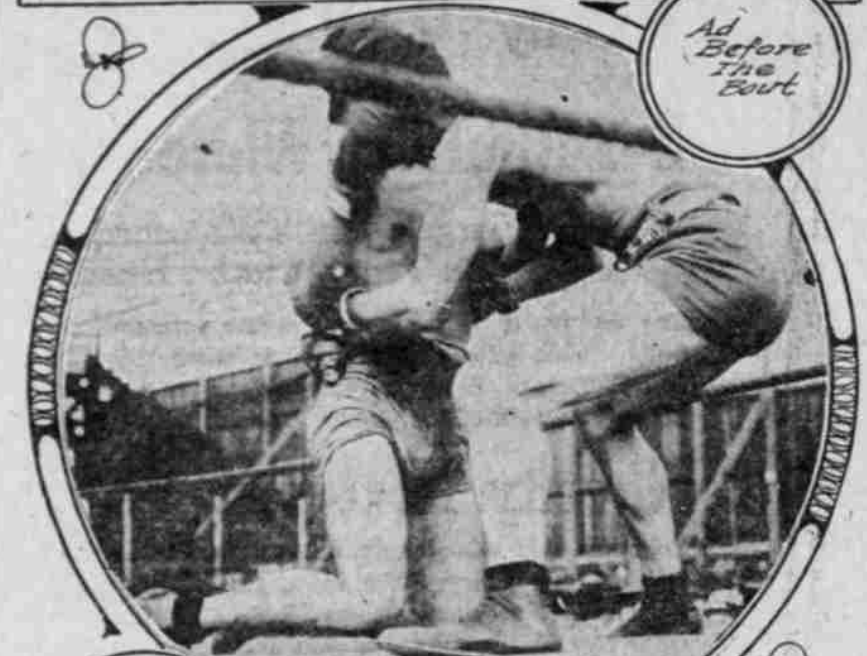
