STRIFE DEVELOPS IN MADDUX CASE

Tazwell Refuses to Dismiss Charge at Request of Collier.

THREATENS JUDGE

Patrolman and Associates Accused of Graft, Indicted by Grand Jury While Judge and Deputy Wrangle.

A spirited row developed between Deputy District Attorney Collier and Municipal Judge Taxwell in Municipal Municipal Judge Taxwell in Municipal Court yesterday afternoon when Collier, intent on not divulging his evidence, insisted on having dismissed the information charging Patrolman Clifford W. Maddux, Frank Reed and David H. Major with accepting a bribe of \$50 from Madge Morgan and the Judge insisted on holding a preliminary hearing. The upshot of the tiff was that Judge Taxwell threatened to fine Collier for contempt of court and issued a bench warrant for the witnesses whom the Deputy District Attorney

Not to be outdone Collier immediately drew up the necessary papers for an injunction against Chief of Police Slover restraining the service of the warrants by him or any of his subordinates.
