Mr. Ries-land said his candidacy was urged by friends, as was the case a year ago. These friends insisted that there was need for his election that "some new life and progressive ideas" might be introduced into the Board as it is now constituted, said Mr. Riesland. He said

Directors Beach, Fleischner and Munly, by their votes re-elected Superintendent Rigler, aver that they were not aware of any substantial reasons why Mr. Rigler should not have succeeded himself. Mr. Fleischner denied absolutely that he gave anybody to understand a year ago or at any other time that he would not support Superintendent. Rigler for re-election this year.

Rigier Declared Competent.
