

BEAVERS TRIUMPH OVER SACRAMENTO

Thrilling Rally by Senators in Ninth Stopped by Fast Double Play.

Victory With 2-1 Score Brought About by Fine Batting of Rappes, Burch and Bancroft, Koestner's Slab Work, Fielding.

Hostilities ceased with a score of 2 to 1, after a thrilling contest, marked by good pitching and a sensational ninth-inning rally by the Senators which sent chills coursing through the grandstand.

It was a grand climax and a joyous home-coming, with the boys once more playing in championship form. In the ninth inning Koestner did some tall mental juggling. And who wouldn't with two men on the bases, one out and Cy Swain in the batter's box. Swain, he it remarked, leads the league with batting average of .353.

But Silent Elmer threw four balls so wide that Catcher Burch had to fudge to reach them without stepping outside the box and balking. Fast Double Ends Game. Muscles tensed as Swain ambled to base. Many of the populace moaned aloud in the beholding of those three men on the sicks with two yet to be retired. But inside baseball had its vindication when Miller hit into a double play at short. Butler snapping to Rodgers, retiring Swain's understudy, and Captain Hill whizzing the pellet to Rappes in time to nab Miller.

Rappes' Headwork Saves Score. Sacramento trotted out the deadlocking score in the fourth inning, when a sensational inning by the Beavers and quick thinking on Rappes' part saved the day. O'Rourke's men made four hits and a sacrifice, one a double by Swain, yet one throw to Rappes, the only evident symptom of the apoplectic seizure.
