Mrs. Elwert Fails to Regain Title to Property Sold by Daughter.

Circuit Judge Gatens Wednesday decided in favor of the defendants in the case of Mrs. J. R. Elwert against M. W. Parelius and William Reid, in which the ownership of lot 5, block 2, East Portland, and a strip of land bordering on the Willametts River in front of it was involved. Mrs. Elwert, the plaintiff, is 33 years old.

She contended that Carrie Elwert, her daughter, acquired fitle to the property in controversy as her trustee in August, 1996, when it was transferred to M. W. Parelius It was conveyed by the latter to William Reid in 1905. The price paid by Mr. Parelius was \$3698, but the property, which is bounded on three sides by East Washington street, East Water street and the river, now is said to be worth in the river, now is said to be worth in the neighborhood of \$40,000.
