Like her-self, the Prince is a Catholic, but the church has refused a decree permitting a second marriage he-same the Princess neeriously had divorced Colonel Fred-erick Parkhurst, to whom she was married to years ago, a dispensation having heen granted for that care-mony. Colonel Parahurst was a Prot-estant.

The Princess declined to divulge the The Frinces declared to average the precise nature of the news to which she alluded, but her demeaner plainly showed that she was happy over the prospect that her contest, which has been long continued, was about to be crowned with success.

The necessary permission for a religious deremony was refused by the late Pope Lee XIII, as has been told in the cable news, on the ground that the church could not recognize divorce, and that from its viewpoint the civil bride still was the wife of Colonel Parkhurst. The Princess, however, contended in her representations to Pope Plus X, the present pontiff, that her first husband had been a man of ne religion whatever, that he never had been haptised as a Christian, and that therefore her marriage from a Carholic standpoint, was lilegal, since the ordinances of the church forbid as allience with an unbeliever. The evidence she adduced in support of her petition was largely along these lines. Y., May 20 .-(Special.)-The birth here of a child with one head and three bodies is said by physicians to be one of the greatest phenomenons in the history of medical The child was born to Mrs. Joseph Muckenhaupt, of this city. Two of the bodies, males, had arms. but were minus legs. These were joined together and both were attached to a 12-pound normal baby girl, To save the girl surgeons severed the pipe which attached the males to the fe-

To save the normal baby the surgeons sarrificed the others. The operation was performed on the kitchen table in the Muckenhaupt home soon after hirth. The physicians believe that the rescued child has three brains, in which event, they say, it will die of old age at 15 years. The child, now two days old, is fed by artificial means, but is thriving and the doctors believe that it will live.
