CHEERS PRINCESS

Beautiful American Encouraged to Believe Marriage Will Be Validated.

CARDINALS ARE FRIENDLY

Member of Rospiogliosi Family Once Was Pope and Others Now Are High in Church, but Relatives Oppose Sanction.

NEW YORK, May 30.—(Special.)—Princess Rospiogliosi, who at the time of her marriage was perhaps the most beautiful American girl who ever was married to a foreign nobleman, said today that she was encouraged by news she had just received from Rome concerning her efforts to secure the sanction of the Vatican to a religious ceremony uniting her in marriage to the Prince, whose wife she has been ever since that by virtue of a decree promulgated at Lemporechio, the Prince's estate, near Florence, Italy. Like her mother, the Prince is a Catholic, but the church has refused a decree permitting a second marriage because the Princess previously had divorced Colonel Frederick Parkhurst, to whom she was married, and granted a dispensation having been granted for that ceremony. Colonel Parkhurst was a Protestant.

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YUAN PLANS GREAT ARMY

Universal Conscription to Be Basis of Military Enterprise.

NEW YORK, May 30.—A declaration by Yuan Shi Kai, just received here from Peking, outlines the Chinese leader's plans for building up an army which will be equal to that of Germany. His plan is based on universal conscription. "In this twentieth century," says Yuan, "no great nation can maintain its independence. China is in a different position from England, and in an inferior position to the United States, alone in its undivided continent."

MRS. OLDS BREAKS

Young Wife Who Slew Husband Hysterical in Cell.

RELEASE ON BONDS ASKED

Grief and Injuries Said to Be Caused by Dead Man's Abuse Makes Physical Wreck of Woman in Jail. Speedy Trial Is Requested.

SPOKANE, Wash., May 30.—(Special.)—Fearing that she will collapse under the strain of confinement and believing that her physical welfare depends upon her immediate release from the County Jail, Attorney Robertson and Miller will demand that Mrs. Della Olds be arraigned in the Superior Court Friday for killing her husband, Dr. W. H. Olds, and that she then be released on bonds.

Arrangements have already been made for bondsmen for the accused woman, believing that no great amount will be demanded by the state, and also that the courts release on consent of the prosecutor. Mrs. Olds' attorneys declare that unless she is permitted to leave her cell in the County Jail she will become a physical wreck.

Mrs. Olds still bears marks of a severe beating on her body, said Mr. Miller today. She is suffering from a badly bruised knee as a result of the scuffle with Dr. Olds and bears other bruises on her body. When she was taken at her home by the officers blood was upon her hands and person from wounds inflicted by her husband.

SEVERE ORDEAL COMING

GRILLING OF FRANKLIN MAY CONSUME REST OF WEEK.

Darrow Himself Expected to Take Part in Cross-Examination of Accusing Detective.

LOS ANGELES, May 30.—The cross-examination of Henry H. Franklin planned by the defense in the trial of Clarence S. Darrow for alleged jury bribing will consume the greater part of the week, according to Chief Counsel Earl Rogers. It is generally expected that Franklin's grilling at the hands of the prosecution will be one of the most sensational features of the trial.

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BABE HAS THREE BODIES

SURGEONS SACRIFICE TWO TO SAVE NORMAL ONE.

If Infant Has Three Brains, as Is Believed, It Will Die From Old Age at 15.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., May 30.—(Special.)—The birth here of a child with one head and three bodies is said by physicians to be one of the greatest phenomena in the history of medical science. The child was born to Mrs. Joseph Muckenaupt, of this city.

Two of the bodies, males, had arms, but were minus legs. These were joined together and both were attached to a 15-pound normal baby girl. To save the girl surgeons severed the pipe which attached the males to the female and in so doing were compelled to remove a portion of the female child's tongue. The abnormal bodies attached to the normal child were alive and breathing, taking air through the tube which connected with the normal child's mouth.

To save the normal baby the surgeons sacrificed the others. The operation was performed on the kitchen table in the Muckenaupt home soon after birth. The physicians believe that the rescued child has three brains, in which event, they say, it will die of old age at 15 years. The child, now two days old, is fed by artificial means, but is thriving and the doctors believe that it will live.

The other bodies are to be sent to Johns Hopkins University.

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Tetiaff Jumps into Lead.

Tetiaff started out ahead in the race for the first lap which was traveled at a furious pace. Then DePalma overhauled him and bit by bit he widened the space between himself and his pursuers. Finally he lapped the others once, then again and again until he had established a six-lap lead at the 485-mile post. Dawson averaged 74.4 miles an hour, as compared with 74.51 miles an hour made by Ray Harroun, who won the race last year in his Mormon "Wasp."

Dawson pulled up at the National pit with a grin on his grimy face, when he was flagged as the winner, and jumped out of the car as if he had been through a short dash.
