

GILLIGAN IS TRADED

McCredie Gets Mahoney, Hard-Hitting Pitcher, in Exchange.

DEAL IS WITH O'Rourke

New Beaver to Be Used in Outfield Against Southpaws — No Man Yet in Sight to Take Lindsay's Place in Infield.

Walter McCredie, boss of the Portland cellar champs, pulled off another deal yesterday and one new pitcher and outfielder is today gracing the Beaver payroll.

Jack Gilligan, bridgeport pitcher for Chris Mahoney, Sacramento hurler and gardener, even up, in the latest in the kaleidoscopic switch that Manager Mac hopes will help him up the percentage column to the first division. Gilligan, who was a star at Fordham College, was left behind by the Senators when O'Rourke's men packed their grips and bats last night.

"Gilligan hasn't been able to finish a game for me," said McCredie. "I think I got the best of this deal for Mahoney simply murders a left-handed pitcher and I expect to use him in the outfield against southpaws. He is a college man, too, and a credit to the profession and a good, clean fellow. That's why I like him."

The new Beaver was the star twirler at Fordham College for four years, finishing in a blaze of glory by beating Yale, Princeton and Harvard in 1910. John L. Taylor, of Boston, then signed him and he pitched and lost one game for the Red Sox, and played one game in the outfield.

A year ago he was with the Red Sox on their spring training tour in California, a month later being turned over to Sacramento as an outfielder, hitting .347 in 146 games. Last in the season O'Rourke used him as a pitcher with great success, Chris winning three in four.

He has not had much of a chance so far in 1913, pitching two games for one victory and one defeat, and playing outfield in two more. He has batted .218 in 23 times up. A right-hander, 21 years old, weighs 165, is Irish, 26 years old and lives at Milton, Mass. Gilligan is the right-hand twirler given a free agency by the National Commission last winter, later claimed by Columbus and St. Louis, and finally awarded to Portland. He twirled for Milwaukee and Minneapolis in the American Association in 1911. Jack recently wedded Miss Veronica Bonetti, the daughter of a Santa Maria, Cal., millionaire, with whom he became acquainted at the spring training camp. He has been trying to get Hoot to purchase him from Portland but apparently is satisfied to get with Sacramento where he can get regular work. O'Rourke's twirlers are just beginning to round to form.

That the Oakland Commuters are still to be reckoned with is evidenced by the beating handed out to the Tigers in the series closed yesterday. Sharpe's men took five of the eight games and now have a lead of 11 games, thereby partially avenging themselves for a five out of seven bite munched off by Vernon on their initial meeting.

Los Angeles, too, forged ahead by taking six of eight from the Beas who are down in the subway doing a companion act with Portland. Both the Southern double-header Sunday were split affairs. No-Hit Toner won his game against Los Angeles, permitting only six hits in his record.

While McCredie has been pulling the wires in an endeavor to let go of infielder Lindsay he will have to get a better man in his place for the relegation of Ward McDowell to Nick Williams' team leaves the Beas only one Lindsay for extra infield purposes with Stone and Mahoney as secondary defenders in the garden.

McDowell, it appears, requested his switch to the Northwestern circuit, preferring to play steadily in class B to doing bench work in class AA.

Bill Rapp's work with the bloopgun during the past three weeks has been remarkable. Since May 10 at Sacramento Bill has mislaid only one day without at least one bingle and in the six games of the Portland-Sacramento series just concluded, the Missouri cyclone first-sacker has secured at least two hits every day for a fat average of .666—21 times at bat and 14 hits. In the three weeks he has come from an average of .208 to the fine height of .398. Bill expects to mount beyond the covered .390 mark this week against Los Angeles.

OUTLAWS PLAN TO REORGANIZE

PACIFIC UNIVERSITY, Forest Grove, Or., June 2.—(Special.)—Tomorrow Pacific University will hold her last and biggest track meet, when Archie Hahn's Whitman athletes come here. Archie Hahn was formerly Pacific's coach, so great interest is felt in the coming contest against the Sons of Marcus. The meet will be called at 2 o'clock. All the business houses of the town will be closed for two hours and business generally will be suspended for the occasion.

This is the first time in the history of the two schools that they have clashed on the track. Seven States to Be Represented in Convention.

CO-OPERATION WILL BE AIM

PASTOR TELLS OF GROWTH

Rev. John H. Boyd Closes First Year at First Presbyterian Church.

Northwest Development Congress

Convenes Wednesday and Delegations Will Go to Meeting on Special Trains.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 2.—Representatives of seven states and one territory will meet here Wednesday for a four days' session of the Northwest Development Congress.

The congress, which will complete the work undertaken at Helena, Mont., last year when the Northwest Development League was organized, was called by the Governors of Minnesota, South Dakota, North Dakota, Montana, Idaho, Oregon, Washington and Alaska to formulate a plan of co-operative development of the Northwestern states.

Delegations are expected from all the principal cities of the states interested in the movement, one of the largest since the war.

Mr. Boyd then suggested measures that would be advantageous in increasing the numbers of the congregation. Taking into consideration those who were non-resident, indifferent or inactive in their membership, he claimed that practically one-third took no active interest in the church. This, in his estimation, called for an aggressive campaign by members who would keep a watchful eye on the congregation, and help to create a social atmosphere, whereby different families could meet to improve acquaintance and friendship.

Owing to the fact that the Bible no longer had any place in school education, and still less in the home, there was, in his opinion, a growing need for religious training among children of the present generation. The Sunday school, in many cases, were not doing sufficient, but he was glad to state that, with the opening of their new church house shortly, religious education of the young would be given the prominence that it deserved.

PORTLAND TO GREET VISITORS

Commercial Club Makes Arrangements for Entertainment.

Committees from the Portland Commercial Club will make arrangements this week for the entertainment of the business men of Minnesota, who, as delegates to the Northwestern Development League convention, will come to Portland on their way from Seattle and will pass two days in this city. The Ad Club probably will assist in the entertainment of the visitors, as there are several prominent admen in the party.

Tactically outlined, the programme will include several excursions to points of interest in and about Portland. Several of the members of the visiting party will be asked to address the convention of the Pacific Coast Advertising Men's Association, which will be in session Monday, June 10, when they reach this city.

ness men will be to the city of Seattle, where they will arrive on Saturday morning, June 8, and will remain until Monday, June 10, when they will reach Portland.
