He insisted that the only way to deal with the liquor question was to work for its absolute suppression. W. S. U'Ren, of Oregon City, fol-lowed Mr. Paget and gave a more de-tailed exposition of the provisions of the proposed constitutional amendment of the People's Power League which includes proportional representation. Mr. U'Ren accepted an invitation to ad-dress the Prohibition League Monday night, June 14, when he will explain the various provisions of the People's Power amendment.
