CLACKAMAS CLUB GATHERS EXHIBIT.

The Clackamas Improvement Association, organized at Clackamas Station, will this week gather photographs of farms and farm displays of that neighborhood, which will be submitted with the statement of resources prepared by C. F. Clark, to Joseph H. Young, president of the Hill lines, about Friday, when he will be asked to investigate that section with a view to constructing an interurban line through that district. An audience will be asked with President Young by the improvement transportation committee and the East Side Business Men's Club, when the advantages of this route will be presented. C. F. Clark, who has advocated an electric line through Clackamas Station district, for the past six years, prepared a statement of the resources, which will be accompanied with photographs later. A series of clubs will be started through that section to promote this electric line.

WOMEN AMONG PALLADIANS—Three women, Mrs. Evelyn Larsh, Mrs. T. E. Young and Miss Mina Duncan, were among the pallbearers at the funeral of Mrs. Elizabeth Goetz yesterday. Others who assisted were: L. T. Bransen, R. A. Young and J. C. Johnson. All were members of the Eureka Council, No. 204, Knights and Ladies of Security, to which order Mrs. Goetz had belonged for 18 years. Mrs. Goetz, who died Friday after an illness lasting only three days, was born in Bavaria. She came to America at the age of 17, and to Oregon 34 years ago. Portland having been her home for the last 21 years. She was the mother of 10 children, four of whom, Frank, Ernest, Mamie, Lena and William, survive. Her husband died November 28, 1895, after many years' service with the O. W. R. & N.

Rose Festival Visitors Crowd Amusement Park All Day, Hear Good Music and See Variety of Attractive Features.

PEOPLE'S HAS GOOD SHOW

Star and Arcade Theaters Have Special Festival Attractions.

"The Lure of the Footlights" was the central film topic at the People's yesterday and was a splendid example of the photographer's art. It portrayed a fire scene that was vivid and thrilling. "A Husband's Awakening" taught a lesson in domestic ethics that pointed the way to save misery from creeping into happy homes. "The Piper" was one of those handsome Pathe hand-colored art films which charmed the eye and paid tribute to a high sense of the beautiful. "Half a Hero" is a Vitagraph of unusual merit and had a laugh-compelling quality that added just the right ingredients to the programme. Conner, Bauer and Wilson were greeted by a host of admirers.

The Star offered "Home Folks," a Biograph, as its feature. This film told graphically of a stern old man who lived by the strict rule of the Bible and was inconsiderate of the finer feelings of his family. This brought about woe and evil and true conditions were only restored after he had gone through heart-breaking experiences. As a war story nothing has ever excelled "The Drummer Girl of Vicksburg." "Billy Changes His Mind" was an uproarious farce comedy containing many a laugh; "Siberia" was descriptive and instructive. Princess Indietta and her Hawaiian Duo provided the music. Wednesday a two-section Biograph "A Temporary Truce," the greatest offering of the year will be the feature here for a four-day run. At the Arcade the big thing was

Logger at Jefferson Drowns. JEFFERSON, Or., June 9.—(Special.)—Matt Cunningham, one of the loggers working on the Spaulding drive, was drowned in the north fork of the Santiam, about 3 miles southeast of here, last night. The body has not been recovered.
