

HITCHCOCK FAVORS PARCELS POST BILL

Legislation by Present Congress Regarded as Almost Certain.

MEASURE HELD SCIENTIFIC

Service on Rural and City Carrier Routes Fixed at Five Cents for First Pound and One Cent for Each Added Pound.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Legislation providing for a general parcels post throughout the United States and its possessions, except the Philippine Islands, virtually is certain to be enacted by the present Congress, perhaps before the conclusion of this session, in the opinion of Postmaster-General Hitchcock.

He has urged upon Congress the desirability of domestic parcels post because he believes it will add substantially to the solution of the problem of the high cost of living.

In a statement yesterday he expressed the hope that the measure recently introduced in the Senate might become law.

Bill Regarded as Scientific.
In the judgment of the officers of the postal service, the new bill represents the most scientific plan yet devised for a parcels post. It provides for a parcels service throughout the country both on rural routes and city carrier routes. It consolidates the third and fourth classes of mail matter and raises the weight limit of parcels to 11 pounds, which is the limit of the international parcels post.

The rate to be charged for articles carried in the rural route service and city carrier service is five cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and one cent for each additional pound or fraction of a pound. For the general parcels post service, which covers all mail transportation other than local delivery by rural or city carriers, graduated rates would be fixed based on distance.

Six Zones Provided.
Six zones of distance would be established. The first would have a radial distance of 50 miles from the point of mailing; the second would include the area lying between 50 and 100 miles; the third that between 100 and 200 miles; the fourth that between 200 and 300 miles; the fifth that between 300 and 400 miles; and the sixth distance beyond 400 miles. The rate for delivery within the first zone is six cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and one cent for each additional pound or fraction thereof. The rates would increase for each additional zone until the sixth, where they reach a maximum of two cents a pound, the rate now charged in the international parcels post. The rate on the consolidated third and fourth class mail matter is fixed at one cent an ounce for not more than four ounces. Distinctive parcels post stamps will be provided.

In a formal report forwarded yesterday to the Senate postoffice committee, Postmaster-General Hitchcock urges the passage of the measure.

LAUNCH BURNS ON SOUND

Students Have Narrow Escape When Pleasure Craft Flares.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 10.—(Special.)—Enveloped in flames originating in the gas tank, the launch Protection, which was carrying a party of 25 University and high school students, was rescued by boats hastily put out from the Seattle Yacht Club.

The party had made the trip to Olympia and had entered the bay, being about 250 yards from the yacht clubhouse when the gasoline tank burst into flames. Shouts for help were sent up and the flames attracted assistance from the shore.

The fireboat Duwamish arrived about 20 minutes after the accident happened and put out the blaze. The boat was practically destroyed. It is covered by insurance. It could not be decided tonight in what manner the gasoline ignited.

PENDER JURY DISMISSED

Twelve Men Unable to Agree After Long Deliberation.

ST. HELENS, Or., June 10.—(Special.)—The jury in the case of John Arthur Pender, charged with the murder of Mrs. Daisy Wehrman, was dismissed by Judge Campbell at 12:08 o'clock this morning without reaching a verdict.

The jury had been out since 3:40 P. M. Saturday. Although Judge Campbell had known for several hours that there could be no agreement, he could not legally discharge the jury on Sunday.

It is said that the jury stood six for acquittal and six for conviction.

FLAMES DESTROY BIG MILL

Timber Valley Property Loss Will Total \$12,000.

LILE, Wash., June 10.—(Special.)—The lumber mill owned by D. S. Clements of Timber Valley, 14 miles north of here, was totally destroyed by fire last night at a loss of \$7500 with little insurance.

The fire spread with great rapidity to the yards and burned all but a few thousand feet of shop lumber. The total loss will amount to about \$12,000, not counting several large orders. This is the second fire that has totally wiped out Mr. Clements, but he is in hopes of rebuilding a larger and more up-to-date plant in the near future.

ST. MARY'S 25 YEARS OLD

Portland Catholic Church Closes Week of Jubilation.

Jubilee week in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the dedication of St. Mary's Church, Williams avenue and Stanton street, closed Sunday morning with pontifical mass celebrated by Bishop pastor of St. Mary's parish, in the presence of a large congregation. A number of the charter members of the church attended the services. Rev. Father E. V. O'Hara delivered the sermon. Bishop O'Reilly, who has just returned from the East, was suffering from a severe cold, but love for his

former parish would not permit him to remain away, and hundreds of his old friends crowded the church. He was assisted in the services by Rev. Father Joseph Gallagher, president of Columbia University; Rev. Father O'Hara, of the Cathedral; Rev. Father Costello, Rev. Father Daly, pastor of St. Mary's Church, and other Portland priests.

Father O'Hara spoke of the 25th anniversary of St. Mary's Church as significant of progress in the community, not so much in a material sense, as in the progress of the church and its faith. He said that the captains of industry are not evidence of the progress of the country so the 25 years of St. Mary's Church as the real evidence of progress, as the years stand for progress of principle and Christian faith. He declared that the hope of the Nation is in the moral and religious faith of the church, which are its safeguards.

"And so the church and school stand together," said Father O'Hara, "one for Christian progress, the other for development of faith and morals in our young people. My dear brethren, this 25th anniversary is another milestone in the progress of Christian faith—the faith of the apostles."

Rev. Father Daly thanked Bishop O'Reilly and others who had assisted in the services. Special music was provided.

St. Mary's Church was dedicated Sunday, June 7, 1887, by Archbishop W. H. Gross. Rev. Father Van Lila was the first pastor, and on his death was succeeded by Rev. C. J. O'Reilly, who was appointed Bishop of Baker City in 1903. He was succeeded by Rev. W. A. Daly, the present pastor. St. Mary's Church is called the "Mother of Many Parishes," as several have been carved out of her territory. It ranks as one of the leading parishes in the Northwest.

BLUE SKY LAW IS UP

IMPORTANT MEASURE WILL COME BEFORE VOTERS.

Bill Is Designed to Protect Investors From Wiles of Unscrupulous Promoters.

SALEM, Or., June 10.—(Special.)—Complete and corrected drafts of the proposed "Blue Sky" law were completed Saturday by Secretary Olcott, the bill has gone into the hands of the printer and circulation of petitions will start the first of the week for the purpose of placing the measure in the ballot to go before the people in November.

The changes incorporated in the original draft effect a number of sections and are summarized as follows:

Section 1 has been modified so as not to include corporations dealing in obligations secured by mortgage upon real property within the state.

Section 2 has been inserted to meet the objection that it would be unlawful under the original draft, to take preliminary subscriptions for the formation of corporations prior to the actual filing of papers and organization of the corporation. Several minor changes have been made in sections 1 and 2 with the purpose of making the bill as liberal as possible without weakening it.

Section 7 provides a method of appealing to the circuit court from the decision of the board of directors in cases where the stock is held for an unpaid balance of stock subscriptions. It also provides that stock subscriptions which have been made in good faith.

Section 22, wherein the provision that the money in the corporation fund shall be used to defray the expenses of the fund, has been changed to provide that the money in the corporation fund shall be used to defray the expenses of the fund, whenever the amount in the corporation fund shall exceed \$20,000, leaving a balance of \$10,000 in the corporation fund to meet current expenses, and making all of the rest of the revenue of the corporation available for paying the general expenses of the state government.

Section 24, providing that the records of the Corporation Department shall be public records, has been modified by a provision that the records shall be public records, without information relating to private affairs of solvent corporations when, in his judgment, the board shall be required for the public welfare.

Secretary Olcott has expressed himself as satisfied with the working value of the proposed act and believes there will be no difficulty in securing a sufficient number of signatures.

COLONEL PASSES BUSY DAY BUT WILL NOT TALK.

Though He Has No Intention of Going to Chicago Now He May Change His Mind.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., June 10.—The telegraph wires between Sagamore Hill and the Roosevelt headquarters in Chicago were kept busy Sunday as Colonel Roosevelt went over plans for the contests before the National committee. Whatever was decided, the Colonel kept to himself. He said he would do nothing to his statement Saturday night in which he attacked the committee.

Colonel Roosevelt said he had been informed that in a probability, Congressman William A. Frenders, of New York, would be unable to make the nominating speech for him at the convention. In the event Mr. Frenders' health will not permit, the Colonel's name will be presented by Patrick W. Collins, of Oswego. A proxy has been arranged for Mr. Collins, should he require it.

The Colonel said that, while he had no present intention of going to Chicago, he might change his mind. He was told of a report that he had agreed to make an address there Thursday night.

"That is definite proof that I am going to Chicago," said the Colonel, testily. "Moreover, it shows my Machiavellian disposition, for I have concealed so well the fact that I am to make the address, that I have even concealed it from myself."

GIRL INVOLVES EMPLOYER

Runaway Tells Touching Story. Two Men in Custody.

LEWISTON, Idaho, June 10.—(Special.)—It was a touching story that Miss Neva Slusser, the 15-year-old runaway, related this afternoon to Chief of Police Masters upon her arrival from Dayton, Wash. After hearing the girl's story, Chief Masters swore to a complaint charging H. F. Lewis with a statutory crime. Lewis, who is a carpetmaker and former employer of Miss Slusser, already was under \$500 bond on a charge of contributing to her delinquency.

In connection with the affair, William H. Donnaway was brought here in custody of an officer and was served with a warrant charging him with contributing to the Slusser girl's delinquency. The girl says Donnaway advised her that the officers were searching for her in the train house at Walla Walla and told her to take a different course than she had intended.

EASTERN MEN VISITORS

DELEGATES TO SEATTLE CONVENTION IN PORTLAND.

New York and Boston Party Will Return Saturday for Electrical Parade and Banquet.

Twelve Pullmans, loaded with Boston and New York representatives of the electrical industry, forming the "Train de Luxe," on its way to Seattle to deliver its load to the annual convention of the National Electric Light Association, pulled into the Union Station at 7:15 Sunday morning. This train made the journey across the continent by way of Los Angeles and San Francisco. At both of these points the members of the party were entertained with Pacific Coast hospitality. The party was met at the station by a delegation of Portland representatives of the electrical industry supplied with dozens of boxes of roses for distribution. This attention was appreciated, and they announced the intention of coming to Seattle Saturday for the entertainment planned in their honor.

This train left New York City May 26 at 4:05 P. M. and arrived in Seattle yesterday at 2 P. M. It was under the general direction of G. W. Elliott, of New York City. At Kansas City the train was joined by the Boston delegates and representatives.

Yesterday afternoon E. W. Hild, general manager of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, accompanied by Mrs. Hild, left for Seattle to attend the convention of the National Electric Light Association. Mr. Hild is general superintendent of the light and power department of the same company, left for Seattle last evening. Mrs. Margaret Hawley also went to Seattle to take charge of the Portland booth, where Oregon and Portland literature will be distributed to the Eastern visitors.

The eastern delegates evinced considerable interest in the Rose Festival. The invariable question was, "Will Portland have its electrical parade Saturday when we are here?" and when told that it was the intention to have it for their special benefit were greatly pleased. Each day during the session roses will be shipped from Portland for distribution so that all will be well supplied. The consensus of opinion seems to be that the shipment of roses to the delegates is one of the most unique forms of advertising that has been so far devised.

The California "Fello" "Gypsy Special" which was due yesterday noon, is running behind schedule. It was announced it would reach Portland early this morning.

A. R. GAREY IS ARRESTED

PASCO CONTRACTOR CHARGED WITH MURDER.

Henry B. Christensen's Death Is Held Due to Poisoned Whisky Given by Wife's Friend.

PASCO, Wash., June 10.—(Special.)—A. R. Garey, prominent contractor of this city, was arrested tonight shortly after midnight by Chief of Police Claude E. Keogh, on a charge of murdering Henry B. Christensen, who died on a Spokane, Portland & Seattle train the morning of June 1, on his way to Spokane. The evidence in the case was furnished by the prosecuting attorney's office has convinced the officers that Christensen died from strychnine poisoning placed in his flask of whisky.

Important charges have been made in his flask of whisky. Rumors have been made in the past week since the shock of Christensen's death struck Pasco and the first report that he was a suicide soon lost all support. The charges on which Garey was taken into custody were issued last night after an all-day conference between prosecuting attorney O'Brien, Mayor E. W. Keogh, and other officials of the city. Garey was put on an early morning train and taken at once to Ritzville, where he will be held for safety. Rumors that reached the ears of the officials tonight caused them to take this precaution for safety, as it was expected that a sensational trial might be wrought up because of the popularity of Christensen.

The motive for the crime, according to the Prosecutor, was the relations of Garey with Mrs. Christensen.

CITY GREETED WARSHIPS

GERMAN VISITORS HAVE FREEDOM OF NEW YORK.

Free Rides for Thousands of Sailors and Free Autos for Officers Are Among Privileges.

NEW YORK, June 10.—Escorted by the second division of the United States Atlantic fleet, with Rear Admiral Winslow in command, the three visiting warships of the German navy—the Moltke, Stettin and Bremen—arrived yesterday and anchored in the Hudson River, where thousands viewed the companionable fighting craft stretched along the river for more than a mile.

There are 13 ships in all, including the United States torpedo-boat destroyers. Their arrival was heralded to the city by the exchange of salutes as the Moltke passed the colors at Fort Jay, on Governor's Island.

Each ship during the day will participate, as it is not the custom in the United States Navy to fire salutes on Sunday.

The distinguished German naval visitors, headed by Rear-Admiral Rebeur von Paschwitz, and including princely officers, were received by the municipality of which they will be official guests during a four days' visit. The freedom of the city extended to them included the free use of all the public transportation lines for the thousands of sailors, and automobiles for the use of every commanding officer.

The party is motoring to Portland for the Rose Festival.

Hugh E. Keogh, Writer, Is Dead.

CHICAGO, June 10.—Hugh E. Keogh, 48 years old, a well-known Chicago sporting writer, died at his home here tonight after a six weeks' illness. He had been engaged in newspaper work 31 years. For many years he acted as an official at race tracks in the Middle West.

HAZZARD CASE APPEALED

Convicted "Starvation Expert" Wants Supreme Court to Act.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 10.—(Special.)—The transcript on the appeal of Dr. Linda Burfield Hazzard was filed in the Supreme Court Saturday. Dr. Hazzard is the woman "starvation expert" who was convicted of manslaughter in the Superior Court of Kitsap County following the death of one of her patients. The Superior Court fixed her sentence at from two to 20 years in the State Penitentiary at Walla Walla.

HAY REPORTS GOOD CROPS

Washington Governor Says Eastern Part of State Is Prosperous.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 10.—(Special.)—Governor Hay, who has been in Eastern Washington, returned Saturday. He says prospects for a large grain crop was never better.

In the eastern section of the state the fields are in fine shape, an abundance of moisture having been provided by the early rains. He believes that unusually large crops will be harvested.

Tax on Public Franchises.

Springfield, Mass., Union. German cities make public service corporations pay heavily for their franchises. The Daily Consular and Trade Reports state that the city of Hanover has contracted with a gas company by which the company pays \$2,500,000 for the extension of its franchise to 1950, agrees to furnish all the public lighting free of charge, and the city may acquire 250 additional lights annually. The company also pays the city a royalty of about seven mills on every cubic meter of gas it sells, which is to be increased to nine and one-half mills after 1925, and as the amount consumed increases the royalty is increased.
