WORK WILL BE RUSHED

General Traffic Manager Tells of Extension Being Made Now on Omaha-San Francisco Line, Preparatory to Fair.

Double-tracking of all its lines leading from the Eastern part of the country to the Pacific Coast will be an early completed project by the Harriman System, was the announcement made yesterday by L. J. Spence, general traffic manager, who is in the city on a three days "get-acquainted" visit. Mr. Spence said that the material advancement of the Pacific Coast states and the steady increase in traffic are of such a pronounced character that the system would be justified in making its operative department as highly efficient as possible.

"We are now double-tracking our lines between Omaha and San Francisco," said Mr. Spence. "This work will be completed before the Panama-Pacific Exposition opens. A large part of the Union Pacific project is double-tracked. The time will not be far distant when the O.-W. R. & N. will be double-tracked between Portland and Huntington.
