

BARNES BELIEVED TO HOLD CONTROL

New Yorker Expected to Throw All Strength to Taft to Prevent Stampede.

SOUTHERN STATES SHAKY

Roosevelt's Best Chance Thought to Lie in Proselyting Delegates in Democratic Territory—President's Forces Not Alarmed.

CONVENTION PRELIMINARIES AT A GLANCE.

Roosevelt gets one contested delegate—his first—in the Kentucky struggle, 17 others being awarded to Taft.

Roosevelt managers arrange for mass meeting Friday afternoon to protest against actions of the Republican National committee.

La Follette and Cummings, compromise candidates for Presidential nomination, throw open headquarters.

CHICAGO, June 11.—(Special.)—It was more evident than ever tonight that the nomination of the Republican candidate for President hinges on the ability of Taft forces to hold the Southern delegations intact or practically so, after the contests before the National committee are ended.

That the temporary roll of the convention will show a Taft majority on paper seems to be assured. In view of contest decisions already made by the National committee and expected results of cases to be heard.

William Barnes, Jr., of New York, who next to Senator Root and Cragg, is likely to be the most important figure on the Taft side in both the convention preliminaries and the convention itself, arrived on the scene today. Within a few hours it was indicated that Mr. Barnes had a grasp of the entire situation equal to that held by the other leaders who have been on the ground for a week. He declares that from the best information obtainable Roosevelt will lack 70 votes of a majority when the convention roll is made up and that the only Taft danger lies in the proselyting of delegates from Southern states by Roosevelt leaders.

Taft Sure of Paper Majority.

This statement coincides with views held by anti-Taft leaders. One of the most prominent anti-Taft leaders, however, made the assurance more interesting by declaring that enough contests would be decided in the President's favor to show a clear paper majority—that Taft would be nominated if Bill Barnes were to be.

The significance of this declaration will be apparent to all who recall rumors that have been afloat regarding the New York sentiment in favor of a dark-horse candidate. The truth is that the New York delegation, as a whole, is anti-Roosevelt, more than pro-Taft. Mr. Barnes, who controls the delegation, is going to play the game squarely in the President's interest, however, knowing that the first attempt to hold out with the idea of bringing a compromise candidate into the field will nominate Roosevelt.

Senator Borah, who has antagonized some of the Roosevelt leaders by voting many contests for convention seats in the Southern States, believing that the cases were absolutely without merit, declared tonight that outrages had been perpetrated in the National committee in the Kentucky cases.

Break by South Predicted.

That these alleged outrages will arouse indignation among the unconquered Taft delegates, especially in the Southern States, and cause a break in Roosevelt, is the contention of Senator Borah and other leaders on the same side.

Thus it will appear that the winning over of delegates who are nominally for Taft is the sole show of the Roosevelt cause at this stage.

The Taft leaders are not perturbed over the prospect of desertions from their ranks on account of the contest decisions, and are openly declaring that corruption is the only thing the opposition has to rely on to swing the delegates away from the column in which they are listed by instructions or pledges. They declare, however, that corruption cannot succeed.

Mississippi Real Test.

One point worthy of consideration at present is that made by the Roosevelt managers to the effect that the contests, however overwhelmingly decided against them thus far, do not affect the table the Roosevelt voters have been claiming from the outset.

In their table the Roosevelt managers have put all delegates thus far seated by the National committee in the contested and doubtful columns. The first action that will affect the Roosevelt claims of support as made public will be that section of the Taft delegates from Mississippi. The Roosevelt managers now admit they were misled as to the merit of the contests filed from this state.

So certain are the Taft leaders of controlling the convention organization that they have nearly completed their plans with respect to the important positions that are to be filled in committees and on the floor.

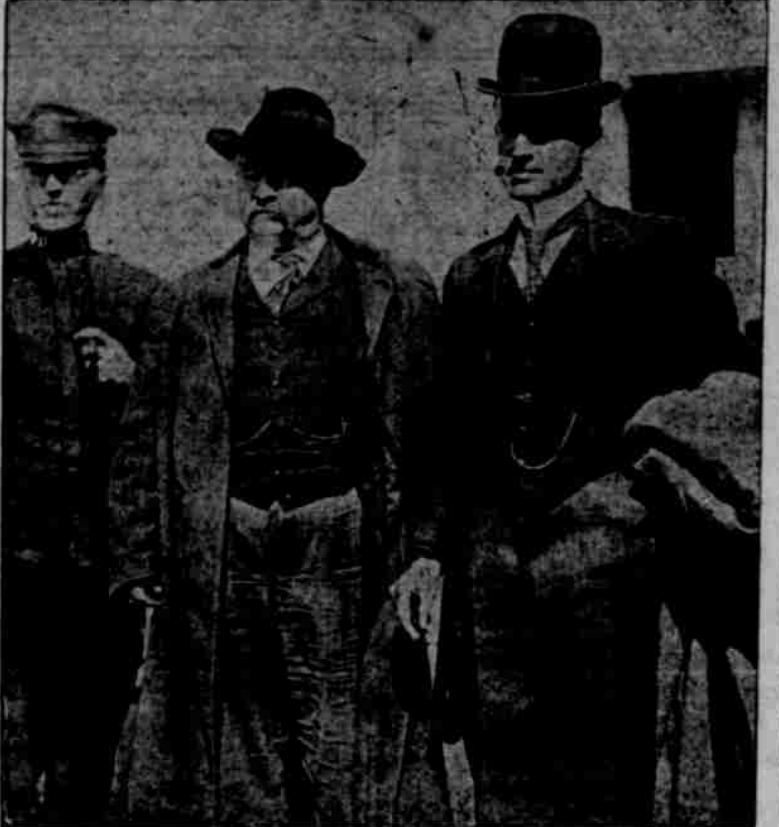

HADLEY NOT IN RACE

Missourian Says He Isn't Seeking Vice-Presidency.

FIREWORKS ARE EXPECTED

Governor Joins Francis J. Heney as Holder of Proxy in National Committee—Contests in "Show-Me" State Awaited.

CHICAGO, June 11.—(Special.)—"Are you a candidate for Vice-President?" This question was put to Governor Hadley, of Missouri, talked of running mate to Theodore Roosevelt, today.

"That's an easy ground," came back the Missouri executive in base ball parlance. "I am not."

Governor Hadley refused to discuss whether he would be in a receptive mood if the nomination were handed him. Four years ago, when his name was suggested, Missourians were aroused in wrath and demanded that he step out of the race. His friends said they wanted to save him for something bigger, which talk could only be construed as meaning the Presidency.

The Missouri Governor, who was one of the "original seven" state executives who demanded that Roosevelt be a candidate, sat on the National committee today with the proxy of Sidney Bieber, Roosevelt man from the District of Columbia.

His presence in the committee room as "company" with Francis J. Heney, who held the proxy of Thomas Thorson, committeeman of South Dakota, was taken as a direct warning of impending fireworks. This may come when the Missouri contests are reached.

In the "show-me" state the delegation-at-large, which is headed by Governor Hadley, is contested, as are the delegates from the First, Third, Fifth, Seventh and Fourteenth districts.

WIRELESS OPERATORS SAFE

Message Says Revenue Cutter Has Radiated Men Aboard.

VALLEJO, Cal., June 11.—The Radio station at Kodiak, Alaska, was destroyed by fire Sunday night. The wireless operators are safe on the revenue cutter Manning. This is the gist of a wireless message received today at Mare Island Navy-Yard from the Manning.

The Manning reports that she will carry the operators until the arrival of the collier Nero, now in northern waters with a party of wireless construction men from Mare Island. It is expected that the party will rebuild the Kodiak station.

GOVERNMENT PREPARES TO AID

Resolution to Appropriate \$50,000 for Relief Introduced.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—The Federal Government is moving swiftly for the relief of the volcano sufferers. Captain Berthold, commandant of the revenue cutter service, has issued orders to rush the cutter Tahoma or McCulloch to the assistance of the refugees.

Delegate Wickersham, of Alaska, and Senator Jones, of Washington, today both introduced resolutions for the immediate appropriation of \$50,000 for the relief of the volcano victims. The House adjourned before action on the Wickersham resolution could be taken.

MOUNT HAYES MAY BE ACTIVE

Fairbanks Is Being Showered With Volcanic Debris.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, June 11.—Persons arriving from the South bring reports of heavy cannoning in the foothills of the Alaska Range, and it is supposed that volcanoes are in action. The sounds come from the vicinity of Mount Hayes. Ashes are falling here, and the sun is obscured.

Mount Hayes is 13,800 feet high, and is situated 100 miles in a direct line southeast of Fairbanks. The same direct line continued would reach Mount Wrangell, which is a smoking volcano. The Mount Hayes district has not been looked upon as subject to volcanic eruptions. The cannoning of the Aleutian Range volcanoes could scarcely have been carried across the Alaskan Range, and the reports heard on the northern slope of that range must have been caused by volcanoes not yet identified. So far as known, Mount Wrangell has given no sign of anger during the present outbreak of the Aleutian peaks.

non-residents did not vote for the Roosevelt delegates," he added, turning to Judge O'Rear.

"Most of them had Taft badges on," replied the Kentuckian.

Appeal to Convention Promised.

Judge O'Rear declared that if the committee did not give fair consideration to the Kentucky case "our only choice will be to appeal to the National convention and its committee on credentials."

"If you insist on pinning me down," added O'Rear, "I'll admit that we have a mighty slim case here, but slim cases are sometimes won."

The Eighth Kentucky District contest was called. O'Rear said in this district the convention was held in the court-house yard. The two sides lined up for temporary chairman, and he said the chairman refused to count the delegates. More than 60 witnesses had sworn, said O'Rear, that the Roosevelt crowd was larger than the Taft crowd, but that the chairman declared the Taft chairman elected.

C. C. Wallace, one of the Taft delegates, said there had been no irregularity in the convention. He said the Taft forces had a majority of the uncontested delegates and that a fair hearing had been given all contestants.

William S. Lawwill interrupted from the Roosevelt table to say that he had tried to present the Mercer County contest at the district convention, but was prevented from doing so.

Committeeman Burnam, of Kentucky, said he lived in Madison County, where a much-discussed convention was held. He said the two factions had assembled in the courthouse yard; that the Taft men had refused a count on the selection of a temporary chairman, and that the Roosevelt men then organized their own convention and selected a Roosevelt delegate to the Eighth District convention. Mr. Vorys, of Ohio, moved the seating of the Taft delegates.

The Roosevelt men asked for a roll-call, which was granted, and the Taft delegates were seated, 35 to 12.

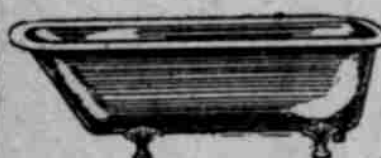
