

GIRL OF 15 ELOPES WITH MARRIED MAN

Mother Directs Police in Search and Flight of Couple Is Arrested.

ABDUCTION CHARGE MADE

Official of Western Asbestos Magnesia Company, Whose Wife Is Invalid, and Young Companion Are Locked Up.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—(Special.)—Bliss B. Bryant, vice-president and treasurer of the Western Asbestos Magnesia Company, whose offices are in this city, and Georgiana Nichols, the 15-year-old daughter of Mrs. Georgiana Nichols, a dancing teacher and physical culture specialist, are both held at Dunsmuir, charged with being elopers. Bryant is a married man, 35 years old, his wife, an invalid, lives in Berkeley. The couple have no children.

Captain Petersen, of the Oakland police, received word this morning that Bryant and Miss Nichols were in the custody of the authorities at Dunsmuir, having been taken from the train by the Town Marshal shortly after midnight. Petersen informed Mrs. Nichols in this city and the mother of the girl and the police officials held a conference this morning, the upshot of which was the issuing of a warrant by Mrs. Nichols charging Bryant with abduction.

Police Go After Bryant. Inspector Flinn, of the Oakland police department, left on an afternoon train today for Dunsmuir to bring Bryant home to answer the mother's accusation.

Bryant, according to Mrs. Nichols, had been for some time in the habit of calling on her and her mother, paying apparently but slight attention to the girl, whom he occasionally noticed with a box of candy. He used to take them out in his automobile and all three were greatly impressed by him. Last Friday night, after paying a call on them, he bade them good-bye, remarking that he intended "going north." Next morning when the mother awoke she found her daughter missing. Guessing that Bryant might know something of her disappearance, she communicated with the Oakland police, because Bryant lived on that side of the bay.

Kleppers Are Intercepted. Captain Petersen promptly made inquiries, with the result that he soon learned that the man and girl had left the Sixteenth-street station in Oakland, taking the Shasta Limited. Word was telegraphed up the line, the result being the arrest today. Miss Nichols is a tall brunette, who, though so young, has been prominent in amateur theatricals in San Francisco and has local reputation as a classical dancer.

OLIVER BERCHTOLD DIES

Son of Professor at O. A. C. Drowns at Duluth, Minn.

DULUTH, Minn., June 11.—It is believed by the Duluth police that O. W. Berchtold, thought to be a traveling salesman, lost his life last night in the ship canal. A body was found on the pier of the canal. A note inside the hatband read: "In case of my death, please inform my father, Professor Berchtold, 540 Tyler street, Corvallis, Or. My father: Miss Marabelle Jefferson, Kirkpatrick, Ind., in care of Charles Peterson, 1212 N. 1st street, Chicago, Ill. I am a member of Chicago. "O. W. BERCHTOLD. "May 18, 1912."

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Or., June 11.—(Special.)—Oliver W. Berchtold, who is reported as having been drowned at Duluth, Minn., was the son of Professor Frederick Berchtold, head of the English department of the Oregon Agricultural College. He was born in Corvallis and was 24 years of age when he entered the public schools in this city and was a student at the college for a short time. After leaving Corvallis, five years ago, he was in the employ of Tull & Gibbs, of Portland, and served for two years as mail clerk between Portland and Pocatello. About six months ago he went East and entered the employ of a Chicago firm as traveling salesman.

IOWA MURDERS UNSOLVED

Relatives of Slain Family Known to Be in Vicinity Suspected.

VILLISCA, Ia., June 11.—Almost no positive clues seem to have been brought to light as a result of the work of the detectives in Sunday night's murder case, wherein Joseph Moore and family and two visitors met death. Theory upon which the authorities are working now involves two men, relatives of the murdered family, both of whom are said to have held grudges against Moore and his wife, as a result of domestic troubles. One of these men, it is said, is known to have been in Villisca recently, and it is rumored that the other also has been here.

The bloodhounds which followed a trail from the Moore home to the river yesterday, losing it soon afterwards, again were used today.

Real Food of the Body.

Medical Journal. "The cells of our body never learn what the character of the food which we eat really is." With this sentence, delivered at a recent meeting of Swiss men of science, Professor Emil Abderhalden has concisely defined a modern viewpoint of nutrition which is rapidly becoming prominent. Before they leave the alimentary tract the foodstuffs which we eat are broken up into fragments that serve as the real food of the body. Complex carbohydrates are resolved into sugar; fats are split into glycerol and fatty acids; proteins yield an aggregation of characteristic substances. Indeed, the main function of digestion is to put these comparatively simple "building stones" at the disposal of the internal tissue cells so that they can select or further rearrange them as the special functions require. Whether it is meat or cereals that we eat is, after all, largely a matter of indifference, for they all furnish similar digestion fragments, so long as the digestive processes perform their duty.

WEDDING IS TODAY

Pittsburg Editor to Become Lillian Russell's Husband.

SECRECY TO BE OBSERVED

Actress Must Hasten From Wedding to Stage for Matinee—Trip to Chicago to Follow Soon After.

PITTSBURG, June 11.—(Special.)—The long-expected wedding of Lillian Russell, the actress, and Alexander P. Moore, Pittsburg editor, is scheduled for 10 o'clock tomorrow morning in this city.

Invitations were sent out today to a few friends of Miss Russell and Mr. Moore and with each card went an admonition against publicity. The marriage license was obtained this afternoon by Moore, who was accompanied to the courthouse by Mrs. Susan Westford, of New York, a sister of Miss Russell, who arrived here today. The ceremony will take place at the Hotel Schenley, after which there will be a wedding breakfast. Miss Russell will arrive here at 2 o'clock tomorrow on the Weber & Fields special train from Cincinnati. With the wedding at 10 in the morning, Miss Russell has promise of little time for rest. It was arranged today that Weber & Fields would play a matinee. This will rush Miss Russell from the wedding breakfast to the makeup. The company closes tomorrow night and goes from here to Chicago, Miss Russell going alone.

TWO AVIATORS ARE KILLED

Army Aeroplane Carries Army Officers to Death.

COLLEGE PARK, Md., June 11.—Lieutenant Leighton W. Hazelhurst, Seventeenth Infantry, U. S. A., of Macon, Ga., and A. L. Welch, of Washington, D. C., were killed here at 4:13 o'clock tonight when a new Army aeroplane, of the Wright type, in which they were flying, fell to the ground at the Army aviation school and was wrecked. Lieutenant Hazelhurst and Welch had just started on their trip and had reached an elevation of about 200 feet when the machine crashed to the ground. Death to both was instantaneous. The machine was wrecked. Welch was flying the machine and Lieutenant Hazelhurst was with him as a passenger.

Apparently the weight of the engine and the two aviators caused the collapse. The machine was brought to the Army aviation field three weeks ago by Orville Wright. Welch came with him from Dayton, Ohio, and intended spending the season here as a teacher for the Wright company. Fifteen flights had been made in the machine without accident since it was brought here. Both Lieutenant Hazelhurst and Welch had separately made successful trips in the machine earlier in the afternoon.

TACOMA MAN TAKES COIN

City Treasurer Confesses He Lived Beyond Means.

TACOMA, Wash., June 11.—Detected by his superiors after two sets of checkers, one representing the State Bureau of Inspection and another a private accounting concern, had failed to report any inaccuracies in his books, Harry A. Brinkoff, teller in the City Treasurer's office, today confessed to embezzlements aggregating \$15,000. Charges of embezzlement will be filed against him tomorrow. Brinkoff turned over an itemized list of his peculations. His method was to send bogus receipts to those who sent checks by mail to the office, and by depositing the checks in the drawer and withdrawing an equal amount of cash, keep his balance even. The arrest of Brinkoff, one of the most trusted employees in the City Hall and for nearly seven years teller in the

Treasurer's office, caused Commissioner of Finance R. Freeland to become so weak, when he entered the office where the prisoner was that Freeland nearly fainted. Deputy Treasurer White even sobbed when told the news.

Brinkoff told the police he did not have a cent of his stolen thousands left. He said he had given his wife \$12, his last money, today. His money had gone for gambling and high living, he said, adding that he had paid a \$400 gambling debt Monday with cash obtained from a false entry. He said he found on March 29 that he could not much longer cover his trail. The discovery of his thefts came through a check for \$70.50 which had been paid as a property improvement assessment by John Sayre last week. Today Sayre came to see record and it was discovered it showed no payment made. Inquiry at the Fidelity Bank showed the Sayre check had been endorsed by Brinkoff and paid. Then the whole story came out. Brinkoff frankly confessed. Brinkoff was born and brought up in Tacoma and is well known. He took his arrest pleasantly and made no protest when locked in the "bull pen" in jail. A most unusual feature of the case is Brinkoff's systematic blurring of every stolen item. CARD GAME BLOCKS PARTY PEACE PLAN

Woman Trying to Bring Harmony at Chicago, but Can't Find Wives.

BRIDGE HAMPER POLITICS

Names of Players Kept Secret. Also Winnings—Senator La Follette's Fair Admirer Falls to Interview Busy Spouses.

CHICAGO, June 11.—(Special.)—An enthusiastic woman, who is neither suffragist nor wife of a delegate, has undertaken a great big job at the National convention. She would reform the Republican party, unite its fighting factions and swing its full strength for the nomination of Senator La Follette. And all this is to be accomplished by influencing the wives of delegates and committee men.

Mrs. Frank Q. Janling, of Milwaukee, is the woman and the only thing that prevented her from launching her campaign of reform today was the fact that several of the delegates' wives were interested in a game of auction bridge and the others were out sightseeing.

Wives Can't Be Found. "You see, my husband isn't a delegate or anything like that," she said, "but I read all about this Roosevelt and Taft squabble in the papers and I thought I could just get hold of some of these wives, persuade them to unite for La Follette and settle all the trouble. The women really could run the whole convention if they wanted to. But I just can't find them and I've got to go home tonight. I'll try to come back tomorrow."

Attaches of the hotel said that she had telephoned to the rooms of several delegates after asking several questions concerning their accompanying wives. Mrs. Lafayette Gleason, of New York, wife of the temporary secretary of the convention, was the organizer of today's bridge party.

Names Secret; Also Winnings. "No, I won't tell you the names of all who were present. Some of them might not want their names in print as card players. We had a dandy game, but don't ask me about the winnings," she said.

Mrs. John Hutchinson, also of New York, whose husband is manager of the eastern branch of the Taft bureau, was one of the players. New Metal, Canadium.

Harper's Weekly. A Scotchman, A. G. French, has discovered a new element in the Nelson district of British Columbia. The new metal, to which the discoverer gives the name "Canadium," belongs to the group of elements of which platinum and palladium are members. It occurs comparatively abundantly in certain minerals in the form of grains of varying dimensions.

Various samples that have been assayed yielded from about one-sixth of an ounce to about 3½ ounces to the ton. The metal seems to be unaffected by moisture, and it is impossible to make it tarnish or oxidize even in the blow-pipe. It is more ductile and more malleable than lead, and its melting point is lower than that of this metal.

Scales of the new metal have been sent to the University of Glasgow for further study. The element seems to be quite distinct from platinum, palladium, ruthenium and osmium, and the reason from which it was taken appears to be rich in other metals of this group.

District Courts to Handle Cases. If the President signs the bill, the judges of the Commerce Court will resume work as members of the various circuit courts of appeal. If they are not dropped out of office altogether, Railroad cases will be handled by the district courts.

Senators Townsend and Burton defended the court as calculated to expedite business. Mr. Townsend denied that its decisions favored the railroads and said that cases previously requiring five years were heard now within as many months.

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COURT FUNDS ARE CUT

Senate Curtails Money Supply for Commerce Board.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Only the signature of the President is required now to abolish the Commerce Court. The legislating out of existence of that tribunal created only two years ago and which the Supreme Court of the United States recently asserted had exceeded its powers, was determined upon today when the Senate by a vote of 36 to 23 defeated an amendment to make provision in the legislative, executive, and judicial appropriation bill for maintaining the court.

This put both houses of Congress in accord on the question of abolishing the court. There is a likelihood, it is asserted in official circles, that President Taft will veto the bill.
