

ARREST REVEALS
PASCO MAN'S LOVEGossips Tie Prisoner Garry's
Name to Wife of Banker
Who Died of Poison.

\$32,000 INSURANCE NOTED

Home of Woman Loved by Garry Is
Watched by Police—Prosecutor
Said to Have Damaging In-
formation on Plot.

PASCO, Wash., June 11.—(Special).—It was because of widely circulated rumors that he had been intimate with Mrs. Henry Christensen, whose husband died of a Spokane, Portland & Seattle train en route to Spokane June 1, that Chief of Police Candler and Deputy Sheriff Hartung arrested Al R. Garry last night on a warrant charging him with murder of the banker. Tonight the police are guarding the home of Mrs. Christensen, who, it is expected, will be held in the case. The information against Garry charges him with having given to Christensen a flask of whisky impregnated with strychnine with murderous intent.

Thirty-two thousand dollars in life insurance policies carried by Christensen in favor of his wife is also a point which Prosecuting Attorney O'Brien will use to substantiate his charges. Garry was arrested at 1 o'clock this morning. He was taken to Ritzville at 10 o'clock at the request of the Prosecuting Attorney of Adams County, which has equal jurisdiction in the case, where he is wanted in the inquiry now in progress. Both counties have jurisdiction in the case as the poison was drunk in one county and had effect in the other.

As the basis for the arrest and charge of murder against Garry, gossip has it that it is because of the alleged intimacy with Mrs. Christensen which Garry has maintained for some time. He accompanied her to Spokane after the funeral of her husband and it is further alleged that the two were seen drinking heavily at the Silver Grill in that city.

PRISONER'S WIFE SURPRISED

Mrs. A. R. Garry Asserts She Cannot Believe Spouse Is Arrested.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., June 11.—(Special).—Mrs. A. R. Garry, wife of the Pasco contractor charged with murdering Henry E. Christensen, lives in Walla Walla and when informed today of her husband's arrest, said that she could not believe it. "The report must be incorrect," she said. "I received a letter from my husband this morning and there was nothing in it to indicate that any trouble was expected."

When asked regarding the reported trouble between her husband and the Pasco Council in regard to the building of the Pasco city hall, Mrs. Garry said: "It is generally understood that there was trouble in Pasco, but I know nothing directly of it. Mr. Garry knows that I am in bad health and never bothered me with his business affairs. All I know of his trouble in Pasco was what I have read in the newspapers and I know so little of his affairs now."

"In reply to a question regarding the relationship of Mr. Garry and Mr. Christensen, Mrs. Garry said: 'I thought they were as brothers from the way Mr. Garry always spoke. He always spoke of Mr. Christensen as if he was the best friend he had in Pasco.'"

According to Mrs. Garry, her husband, who is a carpenter and contractor, left Walla Walla for Pasco this summer and started in business in Pasco. The last time he was in Walla Walla was on Decoration day, she said. Mr. and Mrs. Garry have three children—Leonard, aged 7; Fay, aged 11, and Cal, aged 12.

DURBAR PICTURES VIVID

Kinacolor Process Brings Great
Event Near to the Real.

MANY SEE FIREWORKS

NIGHT SPECTACLES AT PARKS
ARE BRILLIANT.

Teddy's Hat in the Ring, Naval Battles, Flags and the Stork Are Pictured in Pyrotechnics.

The display of fireworks was evenly divided between the Oaks and Council Crest last night, and great crowds had collected to witness the entertainment. About 10,000 visited the Oaks and more than half that number were at Council Crest.

All the space on the Crest was occupied, while at the Oaks, beside the grounds, the Willamette River was dotted with canoes and launches, all brilliantly illuminated with their green and red running lights, making the river a living stream.

At 9 o'clock a few bombs at the Oaks announced that the pyrotechnical entertainment was to start, and a few minutes later the rest of the grounds was deserted, as the bombs exploded at great height the echoes from the west shore of the river came back with a terrible sound.

Other set pieces included a spring of roses entitled "Portland," an American flag, "Teddy's" hat in the ring and a stork. Skyrockets, water fireworks, bombardments of colored candles, red, green and white fire in great abundance, confounded the display, which will be repeated and enlarged on Wednesday evening.

The display at the Crest had its climax in a set piece called "Nyanza Falls," which was 50 feet high and 40 feet wide. "The Fountain of Youth" was another popular piece and there were many smaller pieces which were artistically arranged.

A thunder storm was represented by 15 specially made shells, which showered the entire crest with colored stars. Bombs, Roman candles, rockets, red and green fire beside the special electric illumination added to the enjoyment of the visitors. During the set piece of the falls the crest was so brightly illuminated that a photograph was taken. Similar displays with larger setpieces have been arranged for Wednesday and Friday evenings.

FIFTEEN RAIDS GET
35 IN POLICE NETChief Slover's Crusade Results
in More Than Score Being
Caught.

MANY EXPECTED TROUBLE

Plain Clothes Squad Under Sergeant
Harms Gets Busy and in Early
Evening and Up to Midnight
Secures Many-Ball Is Set.

The "go-at-'em" order issued Saturday night by Chief Slover was more noticeable in its effect last night than any time since it has been issued. Contrasted with the arrests of 10 women Sunday, 25 were arrested yesterday in the early evening and at night. The arrests included raids on 15 places and two cases of soliciting on the streets.

Three of the raids were in the so-called aristocratic resorts near the North End park blocks, known as parlor houses, which have heretofore been free practically from police molestation. In one of these so-called "parlor houses" only one woman was found. In another admittance was refused and entrance was gained through a window. The women said they were packing their trunks on the point of leaving.

"I've been expecting this for a week," said the landlady, May Reed, when brought to the station.

That the inmates of the houses, which occupy three-quarters of a block fronting on three streets, were anticipating police action is evidenced by the fact that all of those who were arrested, with the exception of one, were dark and to all appearances, deserted. One, fronting on Seventh street, near the corner of Davis, was, for some reason, not molested, although it was openly lighted and occupied.

Another development of the evening was the arrest again of "Mother" O'Casey and her tribe, at 25 North Second street. Her son, Frank, was also arrested on a vagrancy charge. This is the fourth time she has been arrested within the week. The first time she was dismissed by Judge Taxwell. In the second instance she was held to the grand jury by Judge Olson. Saturday, June 1, she was arrested for the third time. With her were taken Tootsie Roberts, Lorella Black and May Cunningham, all of whom have figured in previous arrests.

Mrs. O'Casey is the woman who is alleged to have given bribes to Captain Bailey, now under suspension. Aside from the fact that she is admittedly one of the worst in the city.

Plainclothes Squad Busy.

Most of the raids were conducted by Patrolmen Wardle, Long and Martin, under the leadership of Sergeant Harms, all of the plainclothes squad. A uniform ball of \$100 was set in every case, but in one instance where two women were arrested Judge Taxwell reduced it to \$75. In most instances the men taken with the women in the raids, where the police were satisfied they were not their followers, were released, with the agreement that they appear as witnesses for the city.

Chief of Police Slover was at the station until a late hour, and in several instances, in company with Captain Riley, and sometimes with other officers, held long conferences with those arrested, both men and women.

Early in the evening three colored places were raided, in which six women were taken. All of the other women arrested were white.

The colored resorts were at 347 Flanders street, where three women and two men were taken; at 341 Flanders, where two women were taken; at Third and Flanders streets, where Bessie Brown was arrested.

Wardle Busy Single-Handed.

At 22 North Fourth street, where Marie Lorton and Ruth Bourns were arrested, one of the women attempted to elude Patrolman Wardle, who made the raid single-handed, by jumping out of a window. She alighted on a shed and slid to the street, but was captured by Wardle. It was in these two cases that Judge Taxwell reduced the bail to \$75 each.

The parlor-house raids were at 65 North Seventh street, at 235 and at 329 Davis street. At the first place Jennie Phillips, George Champlin and Violet Graham were arrested. Beatrice St.

Claire, the landlady, was the only woman to be found at the second place, although three men were there. The third place was the one that was broken into. The women there were May Reed, Cleo Long and Madeline Shaw.

Mabel Thompson and Allen Back were arrested near Seventh and Washington streets by Patrolman Gill, after one of them had passed out her card to him and invited him to visit them at the York Hotel. Both girls displayed cards at the police station upon which the York Hotel was given as their address. Other arrests were as follows:
