Mrs. C. E. Pantone is the star exhibitor of this year's show, carrying off 12 first prizes and eight second prizes.

The special prize for a basket of cut roses, 50 blooms of any variety, went to Mrs. Pantone with a display of crimson blossoms that was one of the big features of the show.

Six roses, separate named varieties—First prize, Mrs. J. A. Keating; second prize, C. B. Frasier.

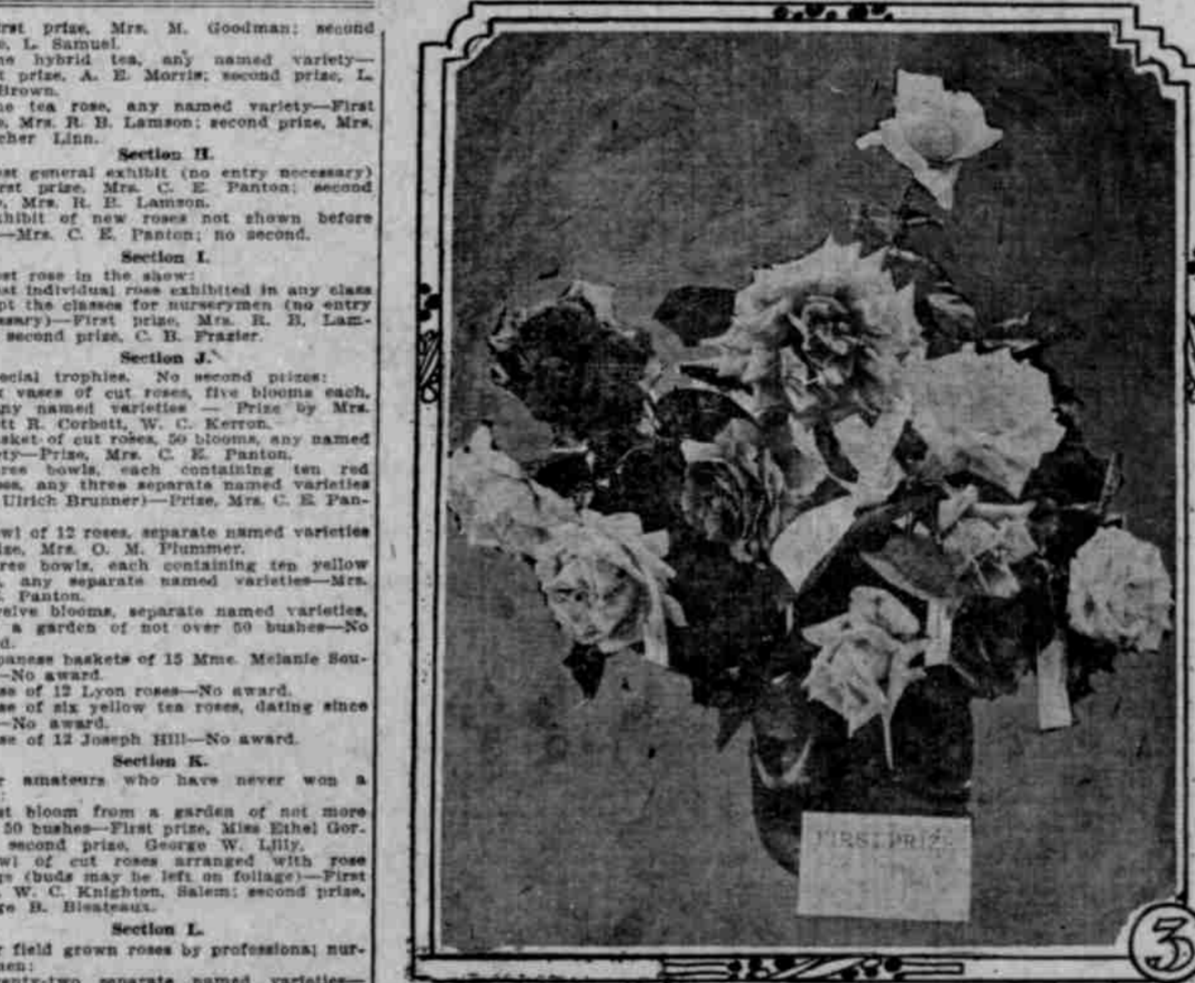
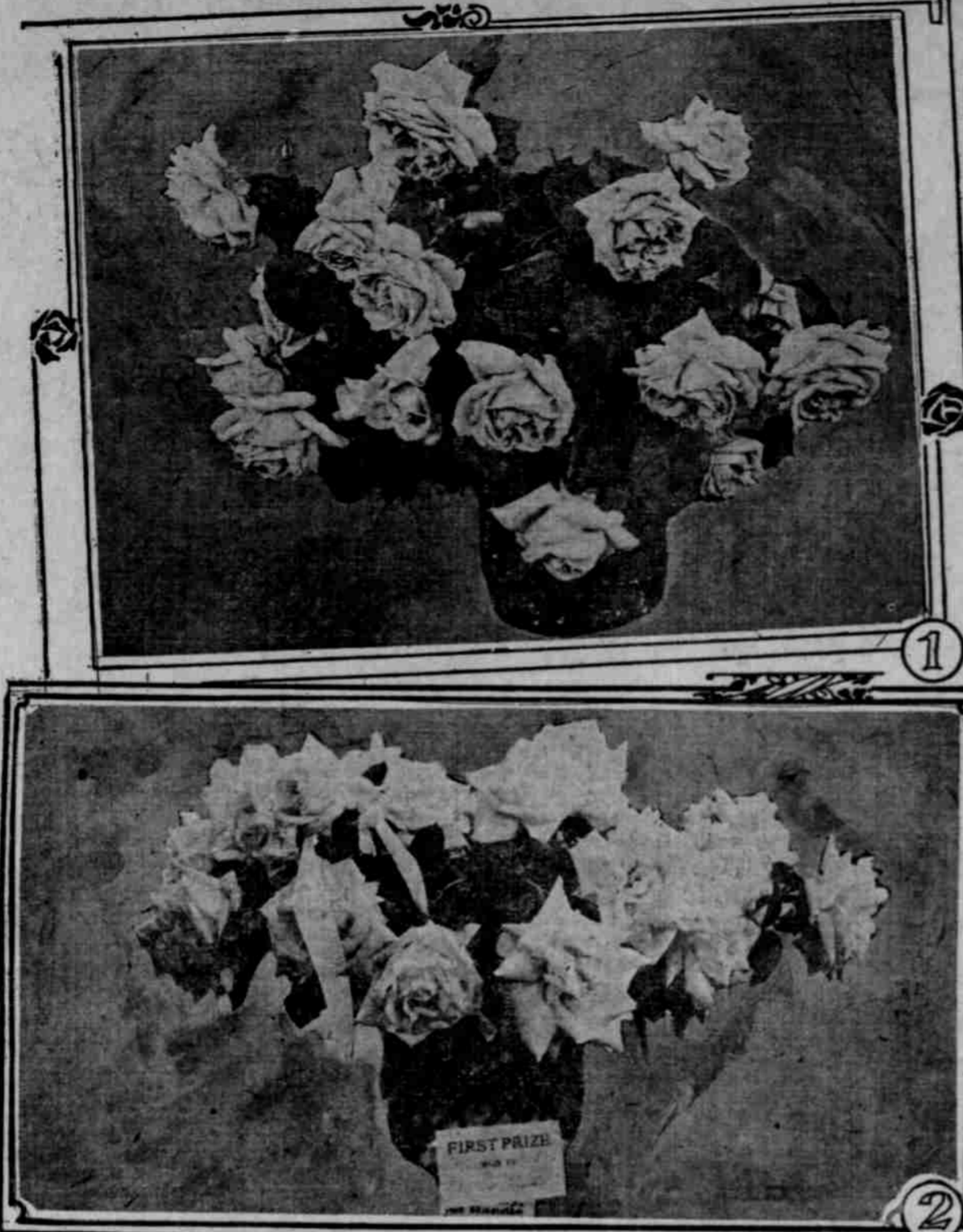
