

TAFT GAIN IS SIX IN OPEN CONTEST

Eight More Delegates Added
by Settlement of Issues
Within Own Ranks.

ALASKA CASE IS REJECTED

Texas, Virginia and Washington to
Be Considered Today, When It
Is Believed All Cases Re-
maining Will Be Closed.

CHICAGO, June 14.—President Taft received today six delegates at the hands of the Republican National committee in contests with the forces of Colonel Roosevelt. To that number the committee added eight by the settlement of local fights between Taft rival delegates. Opposed to the day's gain of 14 by President Taft was another empty sheet for Colonel Roosevelt.

When the committee adjourned at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, the Texas, Virginia and Washington contests remained as the struggles in which the Roosevelt leaders are to center their strength tomorrow.

In the three districts where Roosevelt contestants appeared today the Colonel's partisans on the committee voted against settling the Taft delegates, but the only strong comment was on the decision of the Ninth Tennessee case, which Francis J. Heney said was a "clean steal."

Alaska Contest Not Considered.
The contest from Alaska was disposed of without argument, just before adjournment. Credentials from a contesting delegation elected at Valdez, May 29, had been received by Secretary Hayward, but the committee declined to consider them.

The early termination of the day's proceedings resulted in the desire of President Taft's attorneys for more time to prepare the cases involving the 30 contested delegates from Texas, Colonel Cecil Lyon, the Texas committee man, said the Roosevelt forces were prepared and desired to continue, but ex-Senator Dick asked a continuance until tomorrow.

An attempt to take up the Virginia and Washington cases met similar opposition from the other side. Ormsby McHarg, the Roosevelt contest leader, said his side was prepared to present the Texas cases, but would not argue the others.

End May Be Reached Today.
By an agreement to consolidate the Virginia contests and to attempt a consolidation of the Washington cases, it may be possible to present all the remaining contests tomorrow.

The remaining contests comprise those of Texas, Virginia, Washington, the District of Columbia and the Third District of North Carolina.

In Virginia the chief issue is whether the convention electing Taft delegates were held in districts or buildings from which negroes were excluded. The Washington contests center about the control of the Washington state convention. The contested delegates in Texas number 30, in Virginia 20, in Washington 14, in the District of Columbia two and in the District of Columbia two and in the District of Columbia two.

Heney Cries, "Plain Stealing."
Tarrant and Brown, the Taft delegates from the Ninth Tennessee District, were seated by the committee without a roll call, the Roosevelt members shouting "No."

"This is a case of plain stealing," shouted Mr. Heney, when the Ninth District was decided.

Members of the committee shouted: "Sit down" and "order."

"Plain stealing, plain stealing," shouted Heney again.

"We can't be scared by the hooting of an owl," shouted a member.

"Tell us about Al Ruff," called another.

Heney continued to shout "plain stealing" and was answered with catcalls and derisive laughter.

Mr. Heney's remarks were made when he said he wanted to "explain his vote" against seating the Taft delegates in the Ninth Tennessee case.

Ruff Comes In for Mention.
"Al Ruff would be ashamed to do what you are doing here," Mr. Heney said, replying to a remark by Committee Chairman Chubb of Florida.

"Give us some more," called one member.

"I'll give you another when I have the chance," declared Heney.

While the Tennessee District case was pending, postponement of the Texas cases until tomorrow was formally asked by Senator Dick, the Taft contest manager, Cecil Lyon, the Texas committee man, objected to the delay.

"Our contests were prepared in Texas, not in Chicago," said Lyon.

The committee continued until tomorrow the Texas, Virginia and Washington contests. The contest attorneys agreed to consolidate the Virginia contests into one case and the Washington contests into another. Under this plan it is expected all remaining contests can be disposed of tomorrow.

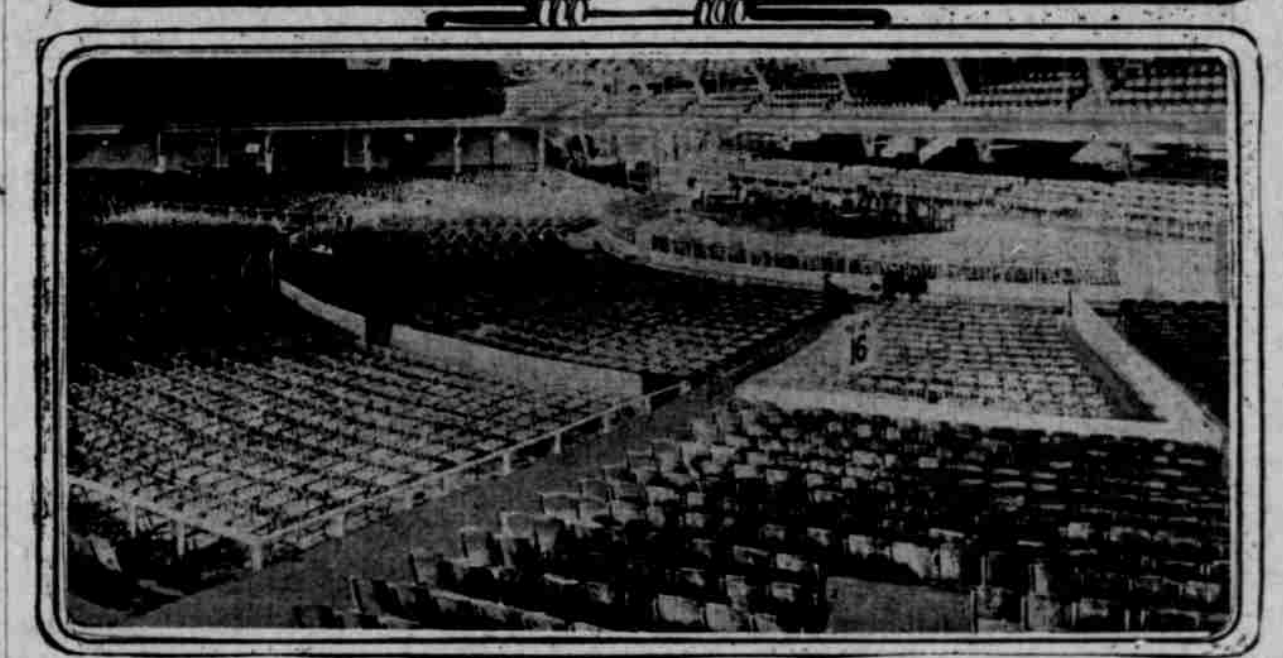
No Roosevelt Contest Involved.
The National committee seated True and Church, Taft delegates, in the Tenth Tennessee District. No Roosevelt contest was involved.

Credentials from a mass convention in the Eighth Alabama District, received by Secretary Hayward yesterday naming two contesting delegations from this district, were tabled by the committee without further debate. Similar action was taken on two contests just received from Alaska and the Philippines, which did not come within the contest time limit fixed by the committee last December.

The committee adjourned at 2:30 to meet at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Free Dock Is Accepted.
MARSHFIELD, Or., June 14.—(Special.)—McArthur Brothers and the Perkins Company, the contractors having the contract for building the Southern Pacific Railroad from Eugene to Coos Bay, have accepted an offer made at North Bend for a free dock and warehouse site. The contractors are expected to have large shipments of machinery and material to Coos Bay and the North Bend people offered a free dock, provided that the contractors would make that city their headquarters. According to a telegram received at North Bend, this offer is accepted and assurance is given that activities in the construction line will start soon.

STONE MAKES PLEA

Clark Men, Says Senator, Will
Oppose Two-Thirds Rule.

SYSTEM CALLED FOOLISH

Nine-Tenths of Democrats of Coun-
try Declared to Favor Repeal.
Defeat of Van Buren Pur-
pose of Adoption.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 14.—Senator Stone declared today that friends of Speaker Clark will support a resolution before the Democratic National convention abolishing the two-thirds rule and providing that whenever any candidate receives a majority of the votes cast he shall be declared the party nominee.

Senator Stone said the two-thirds rule is not looked upon with favor by Democracy and that an effort will be made to get other Democratic Presidential possibilities to ask its abolition in the convention.

Rule Opposed by Democrats.
"The consensus of Democratic opinion is, and has been for years," he said, "that the two-thirds rule, so-called, is absolutely without reason or justification on any basis that ought to underlie the procedure of Americans in dealing with great public questions. I do not hesitate to say that nine-tenths and more of the Democrats of the country do not believe in this so-called two-thirds rule."

"Nearly three-fourths of a century ago, when President Martin Van Buren was a candidate for re-nomination to the Presidency, the Democratic party in the National convention, by a not wholly creditable political preference, was induced to adopt a resolution providing that no man should be declared the nominee of the convention until he had received the vote of at least two-thirds of the accredited delegates to the convention. RENO, Nev., June 14.—George Wingfield, who was appointed United States Senator Wednesday by Governor Oddie, of Nevada, has neither refused nor accepted the appointment as yet, according to a statement made by him this morning.

Wingfield has sent a letter to Governor Oddie asking for a few days in which to consider. He says: "I am loath to accept a public office without feeling assured of my ability to give it an attention, untrammelled by personal concerns, which the public has a right to expect. It so happens that my business entanglements are many. Associates in business, who in many cases are men of large affairs, have, on the strength of their confidence in me, invested heavily in enterprises with which I am identified."

"Another phase of the question which demands serious thought on my part is the consideration as to whether I can serve the state as well in official capacity in Washington as by private business activity within its borders."

TAFT IS CONFIDENT

No Compromise Considered, Is
Last Word to Hillies.

EARLY VICTORY EXPECTED

Friends Say That President, If He
Had to Choose Third Candidate
Would Favor Someone Like
Root or Fairbanks.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—President Taft sent the following telegram tonight to C. D. Hillies, his secretary, who is directing the President's personal interests in Chicago:

"The report that I am in any way considering the possibility of a compromise candidate is wholly unfounded and you are authorized officially to deny the report. With confidence I abide in the judgment of the convention."

The President today answered a visitor who asked his attitude toward a compromise candidate by saying: "There will be no third candidate. All the information I get is that I will be nominated on the first ballot with votes to spare."

Friends of the President here said that if he were not nominated, he decidedly would oppose either Senator Cummins or Senator La Follette as compromise candidates. The President's opposition, his friends said, would be based on their attitude toward the courts and the recall of judges and decisions.

Some of Mr. Taft's friends said if he were confronted with the necessity of naming his preference for a compromise candidate, they believed he would turn to some man like Senator Root of New York, or ex-Vice-President Fairbanks, of Indiana.
