

COMMITTEE FEARS CONVENTION RIOTS

Officials Appeal to Mayor Harrison for Adequate Police Protection.

RUMORS OF "MOB" HEARD

New Heads Delegation Which Says It Knows Plans Are Afoot to Rush Meeting and Try to Force Adjournment.

CHICAGO, June 14.—(Special.)—Declaring that "disquieting rumors" of an organized attempt to disrupt the proceedings of the convention have reached them, officials of the National committee who have the arrangements at the Coliseum in charge, today appealed in person to Mayor Harrison for sufficient police protection to prevent riots.

The delegation, which was headed by Harry E. New, chairman of the committee on arrangements, told the Mayor that its members believed the rumors true and that they had information that already a "mob" had been formed to descend upon the convention, break in the doors and force an adjournment.

FATHER AND SON ARE SHOT

Holdup Artist Fires Twice When Cornered in Seattle Store.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 14.—Carl Kruger, 18 years old, and his father, Charles R. Kruger, 48 years old, were shot and severely wounded tonight by Lawrence Dye, a laundry wagon driver, who attempted to hold up Kruger's grocery store at Sixth avenue and Union streets. Dye was captured and held in the city jail.

Willamette Graduates Addressed by Dr. Dyott.

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem, Or., June 14.—(Special.)—The sixty-eighth annual commencement exercises of the College of Liberal Arts, Willamette University, will be held this evening in the First Methodist Episcopal Church of this city.

at these exercises, 15 receiving the degree of Bachelor of Arts, two Master of Arts. Three were awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity and two Doctor of Laws.

The Rev. Luther R. Dyott, D. D., delivered the principal address of the evening. POWDER TRUST DIVIDED

COURT TELLS HOW PROPERTY SHALL BE DISPOSED OF.

Schedule of Capital of New Corporation Is Given, and Plaintiffs Are Ordered Separated.

WILMINGTON, Del., June 13.—The final decree was entered today in the United States Circuit Court by Judges Gray, Buffington and McPherson in the Delaware case against E. du Pont de Nemours & Co. et al., providing for the dissolution of the alleged "powder trust."

The decree directs that the following concerns be dissolved and the property distributed among their stockholders: E. I. du Pont de Nemours & Co., 1902 Delaware; Hazard Powder Company, Delaware; Delmar Powder Company, Delaware; Investment Company, Eastern Dynamite Company, California Investment Company and Judson Dynamite & Powder Company.

The order of the court directs the organization of two corporations, in addition to the E. I. du Pont de Nemours Powder Company (1912), which shall be capitalized according to a schedule given, or reorganized; the Laffin & Rand Powder Company and the Eastern Dynamite Company, or either of them to be used instead of one or both of the two corporations, and in case the Eastern Dynamite Company is selected, then it need not be dissolved.

WINLOCK TROUBLE OVER DIFFERENCES WITH RAILWAY COMPANY SETTLED.

Act of Congress Will Be Necessary to Validate Agreement Which Gives Town Room for Street.

CHEHALIS, Wash., June 14.—(Special.)—After many years of dispute, the differences between the Northern Pacific and the citizens of Winlock over right-of-way through that city have been satisfactorily adjusted. The agreement is the result of a recent meeting of railroad and town officials. The cause of the dispute was the question of the ownership of land lying on each side of the Northern Pacific right-of-way. The land grant received by the railway company from the Federal Government by act of Congress originally entitled the company to a strip 200 feet wide for right-of-way.

Winlock property owners have built to within 50 feet of the center of the railway's right-of-way on the west side and to within 70 feet on the east side. Under the agreement that has been concluded, the railway company accepted a strip of land 100 feet wide. This leaves the City of Winlock 20 feet on the east side on which to build a street, and on the west side the owners will have to build sidewalks on their own property.

Some settlement of the dispute has been talked of for years, but it was not until recently that matters were brought to a focus. In 1908 the city made plans to improve the road west of the track. An injunction that followed prevented and nothing was done. Later Charles Blum began erection of a warehouse on property claimed by the Northern Pacific, and this was also stopped by an injunction. These cases will now be dismissed, and by an act of Congress, which it is stated, will be necessary to validate the agreement as to right-of-way, the matter will be finally ended.

AUTHOR SHUNS SOCIETY

World Famous French Writer Is Tired of Being Lionized.

PARIS, June 15.—(Special.)—Tired of being lionized, Pierre Loti has decided to live in retirement, and in future will only be seen in Paris on election days at the Academy. The penalty of world-wide fame has been oppressing the distinguished French author for some time. Excitingly sensitive, he shrinks from the social attentions with which he is pestered, and has been heard to sigh for the days when, as a Lieutenant in the navy, he lived in comfortable obscurity aboard ship.

BILL IS THREATENED

House Dislikes Senate Amendments to River Measure.

CELILO CANAL IS ISSUE

If Larger Appropriations Are Not Cut Members of Lower Body Declare They Will Vote Against Final Passage.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 14.—The conference committee on the river and harbor bill is tightly deadlocked and after a spirited row today adjourned for a week. Threats are being made by House members that the whole bill will be defeated unless the Senate recedes on some of its larger amendments.

One amendment which brought about a serious disagreement was the Senate's increase in the appropriation for the Celilo Canal from \$600,000 to \$800,000.

The House conferees are insisting that they will not stand for this increase, but Senate members of the conference insist that this and all other increases are justified by the recommendations of the Army engineers and that no increases have been made that were not recommended by the War Department.

In regard to the Celilo Canal, the engineers specifically said that if they could have \$800,000 this year and a like amount in 1913, they could complete it thereafter, they could hasten the completion of this project and effect a substantial saving in cost. It was on this report that the Senate increased its appropriation to the figure named.

Senators on the conference committee declared today's meeting that they will not recede from their more important amendments and House members threatened to defeat the entire bill rather than permit it to pass with the Senate amendments attached. It is understood that none of the other Northwestern amendments is attacked by the House, Celilo being the largest increase made in that section.

HOUSE BEGINS PROBE

GRAHAM OF ILLINOIS HEADS HANFORD SUBCOMMITTEE.

Lower Body of Congress Directs Investigators to Visit Seattle and Other Places.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—By unanimous vote the House has directed a sub-committee of the judiciary committee to go to Seattle, Wash., and other places in the Northwest to investigate charges against Judge Hanford, of the Federal bench, which have arisen through his decision in the Olson Socialist citizenship case.

Chairman Clayton named the following sub-committee to go to Seattle: Representatives Graham, Illinois, chairman; Higgins, Connecticut, and McCoy, New Jersey.

SOCIALISTS BEGIN ACTION

Leaders to Tell of Judge's Life While Committee Is in Session.

SEATTLE, June 14.—The Socialist and labor union leaders are considering the holding of a large mass meeting in Seattle when the Congressional committee is in session in Seattle. This meeting, according to the plans, will be addressed by speakers who will review Judge Hanford's private life and his judicial decisions.

In the preparation of the case against Judge Hanford, special attention is being given to the case of Melovich, whose verdict of \$12,000 damages against a large power company for loss of a hand, was set aside by Judge Hanford on the ground that he had inadvertently "from weariness" inserted the word "any" in his charge to the jury.

It is taken for granted that all the hearings of the sub-committee will be held in Seattle and that the Leonard Olson case will occupy only a small portion of the time.
