AGITATION FOR UNION HIGH SCHOOL.—There is some agitation for the organization of a union high school among the Mountain, Hurburt, Springdale and Pleasant Valley districts on Columbia Heights, east of the Sandy River, and it will be matter of consideration at the various school meetings in these districts today. However, no definite action has been taken as yet through the office of County School Superintendent Robinson. Several petitions for such union high school. All that can be done will be a general discussion of the feasibility of such high school in these districts at the meetings. The matter has been agitated for several years at that portion of the county.

REV. R. N. McLEAN'S SECOND ANNIVERSARY.—Rev. Robert N. McLean, pastor of the Anabel Presbyterian Church, yesterday celebrated the second anniversary of his pastorate of that church. The church has attained so great prosperity that plans are being considered for enlarging by the erection of an auditorium that will seat 600 people and that will cost approximately \$40,000. The building will be 50x100 feet with the new addition, and the structure will be modern in all lines. Funds are now being raised for the erection of the new building. Anabel Presbyterian Church stands in the Southeast Side and is one of the first to be built there. It was organized in April, 1906.

MONEY FOR WOODLAWN EXTENSION RAISED.—All the money for the extension of the Woodlawn carline to East Thirtieth street on Dekum avenue has been raised. The bank ready to be used. A revocable permit was obtained under which the track may be laid. So far nothing has been done toward the construction of the spur, and there remains about 60 days more in which to build under the conditions of the subscriptions. Charles Clark, president of the Woodlawn Improvement Club, said yesterday that he had no doubt but the track will be laid in time.

For the extension of East Seventh street between Summer street and Roselawn avenue the award of damages and benefits is \$7375. The damages are assessed to a wide district so that the cost to the individual is not heavy.

 THAT top-notch of mixups in the calm serenity of a peaceful household, "The Blue Mouse," frisked onto the Baker stage at a matinee yesterday and kept everybody happy for the whole afternoon.

Alice Fleming was the Blue Mouse and she played it with an enchanting little rodent she made. The role is a far cry from any of the others which Miss Fleming has portrayed. She is a young woman who could be a better medium for displaying versatility than this same semi-naughty Blue Mouse woman.

The play has only lately been released for the stage. When it appeared first, the public and critics howled themselves blue in the face about its lax morality, and the irreverent attitude it bore to the sanctity of wedded life. Since then this same public and most of the critics have changed their verdict. Whether this is due to the decadence of drama in general and consequent sort of hopeful feeling that maybe the next one will be worse than its precedent, or whether the senses of the theater-going public have dulled as one naughtily production follows on the heels of another, or whether after all it was ever in the first argument that the play was really a matter for discussion by those who like to discuss.

As entertainment almost pure and simple, "The Blue Mouse" gets by with the goods. Without exception the Baker cast lends individually and collectively just the types required for the presentation. Alice Fleming is lovely. Her girlish charm and fascinations of voice and manner have never been better in evidence than as the slinky, saucy and general trouble-maker, Paulette, the Blue Mouse.

Decidedly handsome and a splendid villain and melver is Harry Hillard as Rollett. One of the great big tricks of the show is Hillard's merry and unaffected laughter, and the natural comedy he puts into the part.

To J. Frank Burke as Lewellyn, the elderly and susceptible employer, goes thanks for one of the most pleasurable and humorous character studies he has given us in a long time. He fairly makes the old man real.

Marie Baker is a prolonged triumph of comedy as the plump and palpitating Mrs. Rollett. Her performance makes an attractive Mrs. Rollett and plays with sincerity.

One of the magnificent comedy hits is Ronald Bradbury as Rollett's pal-in-law from the country. Bradbury makes the part breathe. Fanchon Everhart is a blonde piece of bric-a-brac with true life and German accent and before the Ark clothes in the role of Lizzie, Richard Vivian as the agitated Scardale, and the fliriting Maude, is excellent. Mary Edgett is on again in the role of a French maid, a part she enacts with dash and a fine flashing of big dark eyes. Neil McKinnon grows old and stooped as a clerk, and Walter B. Gilbert is the auctioneer, loud-voiced and humorously quiet.

The production is handsomely staged. Particularly good looking is the apartment of the Blue Mouse and also the Rollett living-room. Miss Fleming's gowns are beautiful, each a creation in blue. The bill will be the same all week, with a matinee Saturday.

POLICE BOARD WILL PROBE

May Grand Jury Charges to Be Investigated Next Week.

Owing to the fact that Municipal Judge Taylor has all the time this week taken up by jury trials, the special meeting of the police committee of the Executive Board, which is to be called by Mayor Rushlight to investigate the cause of vice conditions, as discovered by the May grand jury, will not be held until next week.

The Mayor said yesterday that the stenographer who took down in shorthand the declarations of about 20 officers to the effect that they are hampered in their work of fighting vice by the failure of the Municipal Court and the District Attorney to properly prosecute cases brought before them, has finished the work of transcribing the statements and everything is ready for the meeting of the committee as soon as Judge Tawell can get time to attend.

The Mayor says the meeting probably cannot be held until next week, although it will be sooner if possible.

SCHOOL BOY HURT BY CAR

George L. Norman Has Thigh Fractured by Collision With Motor.

George L. Norman, a student at the Clinton Kelly School, who lives at 734 East Forty-first street, sustained a fractured left thigh and was considerably bruised yesterday afternoon when he was struck by an automobile driven by Dr. F. J. Riesland, at the intersection of Hawthorne and Grand avenues. The boy had just stepped from a Russell-Shaver car, and was crossing the street to get a Sellowood car, when the accident happened. He says he saw no machine nor heard no horn. Dr. Riesland, who was going west on Hawthorne, says the boy was loitering at the corner with a can and string with which he was playing, and failed to heed the car.

Dr. Riesland offered to take him to charge after the accident, but he was removed to St. Vincent's Hospital in the Red Cross ambulance. In addition to the fracture he has a slight scalp wound and a number of bruises.

ELECTION IS TODAY

School Board Member to Be Named in Four Hours.

BEACH AND PLUMMER OUT

Whether Re-Elected or Not, Incumbent Will Be Succeeded as Chairman of Board by H. C. Campbell as Head.

The taxpayers of the Portland school district, between 2 and 3 o'clock this afternoon, will elect a member of the Board of Education to succeed the retiring chairman, J. V. Beach, for a term of five years. The candidates are Mr. Beach, who is seeking re-election, and O. M. Plummer. Whether re-elected or not, Mr. Beach will be succeeded as chairman of the Board by H. C. Campbell.

Interest in today's contest is keen and an unusually heavy vote is assured. The friends of both candidates have been conducting quiet but thorough campaigns, when the activity of numerous clubs and other organizations in supporting the candidacy of one or the other of the candidates will bring out a record vote. Many women will take part in the election, several of their clubs being actively at work to get their members to the polls.

The Board of Education will meet tonight and canvass the returns preliminary to announcing the result at the taxpayers' annual meeting, which will be held in the Tilford building, Tenth and Morrison streets, at 8 o'clock. No business will be transacted at this meeting, which will adjourn until January, when the school officers again gather to fix the tax levy for school purposes for the school year.

Charge of Disorderly Conduct Is Placed Against Henriette Jameson and Fay Johnson.

Forty-five cents' worth of talcum powder will be "Exhibit A" against Henriette Jameson and Fay Johnson, school students in Municipal Court today, if they appear to answer a charge of disorderly conduct placed by Patrolman Abbott, who arrested the girls with their escort at Third and Washington streets Saturday night. The young women were engaged in refreshing the complexions of all and sundry about them to end the Rose Festival in an antiseptic and deodorant blaze of glory.

Nice blue serges that the swains from as far up the Willamette Valley as Albany had worn to the Rose City had been liberally sprinkled with the white powder, when the policeman hove in sight and demanded that the warfare cease. By this time Miss Jameson was somewhat white-livered with the powder, and the policeman started to brush off her shoulders.

"He brushed me rudely and quite roughly," quoth Miss Jameson to Captain Riley when the two and their escort, a laundress named Edward Base, were taken to the police station. "His hands were hard and he abused me shamefully. Then I put a wee dab of powder on his face, because he needed it."

"That ain't so, Captain," answered the policeman. "I tried to brush her off and she spat me with the whole can." The remains of the fragrant aid to beauty lay thick on his blue uniform.

Captain Riley released the two on their own recognizance to appear in court this morning.

"Helen—um—er, Smith," answered the young woman, without more than a blush to indicate that she had given a false name.
