BENBOW FILMS REPORTS—Deputy City Attorney Benbow, resigned, yesterday filed with City Attorney Grant reports on the Broadway bridge litigation cases, the Hawthorne-avenue bridge mix-up, the Inman-Poulsen fight and the Southern Pacific controversy. He charges his former chief with neglect of duty in all of these, in not having them properly tried out before the courts and evincing little or no interest in them. The litigants have never paid the costs of the Broadway bridge cases, he says, although decided against them. The Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, he says, should be forced to accept a new franchise on the bridge named; the railroad company should pay for the public levee and the Inman-Poulsen cases should be fought, says Mr. Benbow. —STREAMER GOING TO ASTORIA NIGHTLY.—Arrangements have been completed by the O. W. R. & N. Co. to run the steamer T. J. Potter to Astoria every night excepting Sundays and Mondays during the excursion season, making two boats operated daily by the company to that point. The Potter will leave at 10:30 P. M. arriving at Astoria at 6 o'clock the following morning. It will leave there at 7 A. M., arriving back in Portland at 4 P. M. On Sundays the boat will leave at night, arriving here the following morning. The Hassalo will be operated to Astoria every morning at 8 o'clock excepting Saturdays and Sundays. Saturdays it will urday and Sunday. It will leave Portland at 1 P. M. —GRAND PASSES OUTGOING.—City Attorney Grant yesterday filed a report to the City Council on the proposed franchise for the Hill lines on the East side, and for the Southern Pacific Company on Fourth street and on Jefferson street, to be used in electrifying its valley line. The Council, he says, has no power to enforce common users on private rights of way, but can grant them on lines not running over private property. Some of the Councilmen wished to know about the hill tracks, as the proposed Hill tracks cross private property a good deal. Under this opinion, no use could be made of the Hill tracks by other roads. —CHAPMAN WILL MANAGE TRIP.—C. C. Chapman, of the Portland Commercial Club, will manage the second excursion to Tillamook Bay, June 25, 26 and 27. Caribaldi Beach, Bay Ocean, Sealabie Mountains, Nehalem, Salmonberry, Wilson and Trask rivers and Tillamook will be included in the itinerary. Reservations are coming rapidly at the Commercial Club. The trip is made to satisfy many who were unable to obtain reservations on the first excursion made some time ago. CLINTON CHURCH TO BE DEDICATED

Rev. C. O. McCulloch, pastor, has completed arrangements for the dedication of the Clinton Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church next Sunday. The services will take up the main portion of the day. G. F. Johnson, who has charge of the afternoon laymen's meeting. The church was organized about five years ago and has a membership of 100. Work commenced on the new building three years ago. John B. Kelly gave the lot on which it stands. It has cost \$10,000 and was named for Clinton Kelly, a pioneer of the church. The auditorium will seat 500 people. Provisions were made for a gymnasium in the basement.

COURT PROTECTS GREY

Wife No. 2 Spurns Mother's Hand and Stands by Husband on Trial for Double Marriage. Preparations were made yesterday to avert another shooting affray in the Municipal Courtroom, when the clerk called the case of Avery J. Grey, who a few days ago escaped three shots from a revolver in the hands of his mother-in-law, in the presence of the court and 50 others. Attorney Long, who appeared for the young man, demanded that before his client was brought from the box, Mrs. Anna Johnson, the mother-in-law, be searched for weapons. The attorney represented that Mrs. Johnson had been in the custody of her Lola G. Baldwin and had been permitted to come and go at will. He also said she sat in a room where a revolver could be had for the taking. The court ordered that Mrs. Johnson be kept in another room while Grey was in court. Documents showing that Grey was wedded to Mabel Johnson and also to a woman in Colorado were all the evidence offered at the preliminary hearing and on this Grey was held to answer. Wife No. 1 has been sent for to appear at the trial, preceded by wife No. 2, who has spurned her mother and stood by Grey, was with him in court and embraced him before he was led away. The case of Mrs. Johnson, charged with an assault with a dangerous weapon, was then called and she was bound over without a hearing. "Can't get back to my dying child," she pleaded. "Officer Vessey," said the court, "I want you to deliver this woman forth with to the custody of the Sheriff; not to Mrs. Baldwin." She was led away weeping, and in the door of the courtroom passed her daughter, to whom she turned out her hands, but the girl turned away.

ROCKPILE AWAITS SHARPER

Steamship Gambler Must Serve if He Returns to Portland. If C. H. Perry, alias John Brown, experienced steamship gambler, ever comes back to Portland, he will go automatically to the Linton rockpile for 90 days. He would have made the trip yesterday, but took the precaution to let a bail of \$50 and an attorney appear in his stead. Perry was arrested by Detectives Coleman and Snow at the beginning of the Rose Festival week, as a bunco man and when questioned at detective headquarters, admitted that he followed the vocation of riding between Portland and San Francisco on the big steamers, playing cards with the unwary or overconfident. Perry said he and nine others paid well for the privilege. Among those who have lost money on this trip is Primrose, the mistress of the detectives. One "killing" of \$2700 is credited to the gang.
