

GILL'S EFFORTS TO OUST COTTERILL

Beaten Candidate for Mayor Stops Seattle Recount With Gain of 34.

ATTORNEY ADMITS ERROR

Counsel Says Quo Warranto Proceedings Based on Misinformation—Illegal Voting Suspects Now Out of City.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 20.—Announcing that he had become convinced that the quo warranto proceedings by Hiram C. Gill against Mayor Cottrell were based on misinformation, George F. Vanderveer, ex-Prosecuting Attorney, today moved Judge Albertson that the case be dismissed. There being no objection on the part of the Cottrell forces, the court granted the motion.

Vanderveer told the court that the proceedings had been brought in entire good faith and upon information that had been investigated as far as possible and found trustworthy. The result of the recount to date, he said, had been disappointing and did not bear out the statements of his informants. "I fully believed we had a meritorious case," Vanderveer continued. "We were unfortunate in the beginning that the joining of issues was delayed until many of the university students had under surveillance for alleged illegal voting had finished their school year and left for their homes throughout the state and thus escaped service."

"While we have raised for Gill 35 or 40 votes there is not sufficient evidence that if the count proceeds through the 241 precincts there will be a change of the final result," he therefore advised, "wise and just to move at this time for a dismissal so as to save further cost both to ourselves and the taxpayers of King County."

SEVEN DEVILS LOOKS UP

Eastern Mine Owners Plan Operations on Larger Scale After Visit.

WEISER, Idaho, June 20.—(Special.)—Rapid development in the Seven Devils Mining district, north of Weiser, is promised as a result of the visit this week by E. Abbott of Boston, president of the Lander Copper Company, and Messrs. Plunkett and Edward Woodbury, of Leominster, Mass., who are associated with him in the enterprise.

Accompanied by Messrs. P. H. Miller and Franz Kleinschmidt, of the Blue and Red Mountain copper mines, the Massachusetts party visited the Seven Devils district. The company is shipping ore that averages 36 per cent copper and runs over \$2500 to the car. Dr. Abbott declares that this visit means that others in Massachusetts will be interested and the mines will be equipped and developed on a greater scale.

GRAZING LAND BILL FACES LONG DELAY

Opinions in and Out of Congress at Wide Variance on Lever Act.

DISTRICTS ARE PROPOSED

Measure Is Designed to Conserve and Restore Public Ranges and to Protect Bona Fide Settlers by Legislation.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 20.—(Special.)—Because of the differences of opinion that exist in and out of Congress there can be no legislation on a third session looking to the regulation of grazing on the public domain. This has been the first session when any serious effort has been made to passing a leasing bill and consideration of this subject was put off so long that no agreement is possible. Finally the whole question was involved in such bitter controversy that it became expedient to set it aside until next winter and possibly for another year after that.

A bill introduced by Representative Lever, of South Carolina, forms the basis of committee discussion this Spring and the bill has the hearty support of the Department of Agriculture, which is given control of all grazing on the public lands. In the course of the hearings Gifford Pinchot, a private citizen, appeared and recommended the passage of the Lever bill. At the same time Secretary Fisher, of the Interior Department, appeared in opposition to one phase of the Lever bill and suggested that the regulation of grazing should be left in the hands of the Interior Department, which now has jurisdiction over all unreserved public lands.

WESTERN MEN INTERESTED.

Inasmuch as this subject will be postponed until next session, and as the House committee on public lands intends to make the Lever bill the basis of its report, the provisions of that bill become of interest to Western stockmen. The bill is substantially as follows:

PENDLETON STORM SWEEP
