

BRYAN DISSIPATES ALL HOPE OF PEACE

Appeal Against Selection of Judge Parker Causes General Alignment.

NEW YORK IS FOR CLARK

Report That Speaker's Supporters Are in Alliance With Parker Forces Credited—Taggart Pleads for Harmony.

BALTIMORE, June 21.—William J. Bryan's telegram to five candidates for the Presidential nomination—Speaker Clark, Governor Wilson, Governor Foss, Governor Baldwin and Mayor Gaynor—asking them to join him in opposition to the selection of Alton B. Parker, of New York, as temporary chairman of the Democratic National convention on the ground that he was a conservative, dissipated tonight the faint hope of leaders here that a fight at the opening of the convention might be avoided. The selection of Judge Parker yesterday sounded a call to arms and today Mr. Bryan's note caused a general alignment. National committeemen were waiting tonight to hear what the replies of the five candidates would be to the Bryan inquiry before making any further move.

Parker and Clark Allied. Charles F. Murphy, with other Tammany chiefs, arrived tonight from New York and quickly conferred with National committeemen who had voted for Parker.

No denial that the leaders of the movement for Speaker Clark's nomination had joined with the Parker forces was forthcoming today and the report generally was accepted. This alliance, it was reported, would result in New York's 30 votes being cast for Clark. National committeemen standing by Parker said Bryan would be defeated in the National committee, even though he accepted a proxy from some committeeman and appeared in opposition to Judge Parker.

Representative Henry, of Texas, who was regarded as the Wilson candidate for temporary chairman, issued the following declaration:

"This is not a personal fight of mine but a contest for progressive Democratic principles. The progressive cannot and will not agree to the selection of Judge Parker, a known reactionary, for temporary chairman to preside over a convention in which a large majority of delegates are genuinely progressive."

"Progressives" Fight Parker. "Progressives have won their fight in the Democratic party and must control the organization and the convention."

"We will not support Judge Parker, but fight his selection before the full committee and if necessary carry the contest into the convention."

"It may be stated as certain that an overwhelming progressive majority will not tolerate a reactionary making the keynote speech, after he and those agreeing with him have lost in the primaries and conventions."

"Mr. Bryan is right and I shall be found fighting in the front with him." There was no end of conferences today between the various National committeemen to discuss the situation and prepare for a fight. Former National Chairman Taggart, of Indiana, declared for harmony and hoped that everything could be settled satisfactorily. To his friends he said:

"We voted for Parker with no intention in front of Mr. Bryan or any man. Mr. Parker is a good Democrat, a former nominee of the party, and has been always loyal. He stumped the country for Bryan from Maine to California four years ago and paid his own expenses."

Bryan Could Have Been Named. "We had hoped that the present party harmony would be maintained and no one would disturb it."

"Mr. Bryan could have been named temporary chairman, but he said he did not want it. He can be named permanent chairman or head of the resolutions committee if he desires. Mr. Bryan can have anything he wishes, for he is a great Democrat."

John T. McGraw, National committeeman from West Virginia, said the putting of the temporary chairmanship proposition up to the candidates was not fair.

What could Speaker Clark say? asked Mr. McGraw. "What could Governor Wilson say? Just what he said before—that he had no candidate for temporary chairman and that any fair man would suit him."

Judge Hudsouth, National committeeman from New Jersey, said Governor Wilson had no candidate and that any fair-minded man would be named. Judge Hudsouth said he had hoped the convention would designate a progressive to represent the spirit of the country.

South's Attitude Not Known. Mr. Parker's friends kept in close touch with the progress of affairs throughout the day and said there was no doubt that the fight had come from Mr. Bryan, and that he would be beaten.

Just what the attitude of the Southern delegates would be over the fact that Mr. Bryan did not send his note to Representative Underwood caused much speculation among the leaders. Underwood's candidacy, favored by several Southern delegations and caucuses here are awaited with interest.

National committeemen favorable to Wilson's candidacy said they were positive Speaker Clark and his friends had joined with the Parker people, but confidently asserted that Mr. Clark could not swing the delegates with him when it came to an open fight on the floor of the convention between what Mr. Bryan had called "reactionaries" and "progressives."

FIRST ADD DEMOCRATS. BRYAN WANTS "PROGRESSIVE"

Nebraska Brands Judge Parker as "Conspicuous Reactionary."

CHICAGO, June 21.—Branding Judge Alton B. Parker a "reactionary," William Jennings Bryan today telegraphed to many prominent Democrats throughout the country appealing to them to join with him in preventing the selection of Judge Parker as temporary chairman of the National Democratic convention at Baltimore. The telegram was addressed to Speaker Clark, Governor Wilson, Governor Foss, Governor Baldwin, of Massachusetts; Governor Foss, of Connecticut; and Mayor Gaynor, of New York City.

Bryan said that he would start tomorrow for Baltimore. Colonel Bryan's appeal follows: "In the interest of harmony, I suggest to the subcommittee of the Democratic National Committee the advisability of recommending as temporary chairman

CLARK WOULD COMPROMISE Speaker Says His Friends Agree That Harmony Is Essential.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Speaker Clark tonight telegraphed William J. Bryan that if all joined in an appeal to the Democratic National Committee to avoid controversies in organization of the Baltimore convention the committee would so arrange as to leave the platform and the nomination of candidates as the only real issues on which delegates need divide.

STEPHALI RECITAL GOOD Speaker Explains Power of Music to Express Many Things. An interesting musical event was the lecture-recital given last night by Madame Sofia Stephali in Ellers hall under the auspices of the Woman's Relief Corps. Madame Stephali is a student of music, as a mode of emotional expression, and in her introductory lecture she made a plea for music of a higher standard. She pointed out the

power of music to express varied emotions and declared that there is no greater force in intellectual and spiritual culture. Madame Stephali's voice is a clear, high soprano, which she uses with artistic effect.

The programme last night showed her ability to interpret the most difficult arias and ballads with equal excellence. Her most pretentious number was the "Scene, Cavatina and Aria," from Meyerbeer's "Le Prophète," which she gave with much dramatic feeling. "When Daffodils Unfold" (Dicks), "A Perfect Day" (Bond), "Summer" (Chaminade), "Gaily Chant the Summer Birds" (De Pina), were all sung charmingly. Other songs which pleased were: "Ever on Earth" (Just), "Speak Walter" (Arditi), "Song of the Valkyr" (Van Eyken), "Oh, Dry Those Tears" (Riego).

Much of the charm of the entertainment was due to the sympathetic accompaniments of Miss Berenice Lathrop. These and her playing of Liszt's transcription of the march from "Tannhauser" showed her to be a musician of exceptional gifts.

The artist was introduced by Mrs. Rose Bloch Bauer, who explained that Madame Stephali, who in private life is Miss Myrtle Lee, is a grand-niece of the Rev. Jason Lee, the famous Oregon pioneer.

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HARVARD SHELLS DISTANCE OLD ELI

Crimson Wins Varsity Race, Freshman Event and Four-Oared Contest.

MAIN RACE IS WALKAWAY

Yale Loses by Six Lengths With Victor Rowing Easily—Blue Captain Collapses as Boat Crosses Finish Line.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 21.—For the fifth successive year Harvard demonstrated today her rowing supremacy over Yale by winning not only the varsity race with six lengths to spare, but capturing the freshmen event by a length, and the four-oared contest by ten lengths.

A Yale victory in the freshmen substitute four-oared race yesterday afternoon prevented a complete Crimson sweep of the river for 1912.

There never was a doubt of the varsity race with six lengths to spare, 20.3 seconds in time between the boats at the finish. The official time of the three races was:

Varsity race, four miles—Harvard, 21:43.4; Yale, 22:04.

Freshmen, two miles—Harvard, 10:52; Yale, 10:54.4.

University four, two miles—Harvard, 11:34; Yale, 11:55.

Each Has Won 23 Races. Harvard's victories today brought the long series of aquatic contests with Yale to a tie for the first time since 1892, as both universities have won 23 contests.

Five successive Harvard victories over Yale have not been achieved by the Crimson since 1870.

The varsity race was late in starting and it was toward 6 o'clock when the two crews lined up. Yale cut the water first and for two or three strokes shot out. Then Harvard overtook her and steadily forced to the front. When the half-mile was reached Harvard was nearly a length ahead, while at the mile there was open water between the boats. The time at the mile was: Harvard, 5:15; Yale, 5:18.4.

Yale Spurt Answered. Yale tried spurring, so the Harvard stroke was increased slightly and a greater lead gained at the two-mile flag, where the time was: Harvard, 10:50; Yale, 10:58.

Harvard seemed content with keeping the Yale boat three or four lengths astern and had the struggle well in hand when the three-mile post was reached. Here the time was: Harvard, 16:14; Yale, 16:20. The rest of the race was a Crimson ovation. There seemed to be sufficient life, power and endurance in the Harvard shell in the last mile to make the victory as overwhelming as last year, when Harvard won by 19 lengths. So it seemed as if Harvard at the three and a half mile flag was waiting for Yale.

In the last half mile Yale tired rapidly and when the blue shell darted over the line six lengths behind Harvard, Captain Romeyn wilted beneath the responsibility and physical strain.
