

LABOR HEADS, HELD GUILTY, WILL APPEAL

Gompers, Mitchell and Morrison Again Convicted of Contempt.

TWO GET OLD SENTENCES

Federation Leaders Will Try to Take Bucks Stove & Range Company Boycott Case to Highest Court of Nation.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Samuel Gompers, Frank Morrison and John Mitchell, the labor leaders, were held guilty today of contempt of court by the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia in connection with a court's injunction in the Bucks Stove & Range boycott case.

the Supreme Court of the United States, which reversed their former conviction.

Justice Wright announced the decision of the court. It covered 72 closely typewritten pages and took about two hours to read.

Bondsmen were on hand and attorneys for the labor men gave notice of an intention to file an appeal to have the Supreme Court review the judgment. In its previous review the Supreme Court reversed the conviction on the ground that the contempt proceedings had been improperly instituted. New proceedings were at once begun. The sentences under the first conviction were:

Gompers, one year; Morrison, six months; Mitchell, nine months.

Mitchell Sentence Deferred.

The charge was that the three men, as officers of the American Federation of Labor, through the organization's official publication, had disregarded Justice Gould's injunction against the publication of the Bucks Stove & Range Company's name in its "boycott list."

Justice Wright sentenced Gompers to one year and Morrison to six months, the same as under their first conviction.

John Mitchell was not present, and sentence upon him was deferred. His first sentence was nine months.

After Gompers had been sentenced he attacked the decision, declaring that while "Justice Wright lives in our time, his decision and sentences disclose a mental concept of more than two centuries ago, when the workman was either a slave or a serf."

"Information has just come to me that the decision was completed more than a month ago, but withheld until after the close of the Chicago Republican National convention. If true, the inference is obvious."

Court Explains Sentence.

In passing sentence on President Gompers the court said:

"For the ring leader and chief offender, the duty of the court as ascertained by its obligations to administer justice without respect to persons, requires it in determining a penalty appropriate for this, the most dangerous and destructive of contempts, at least to parallel the extreme penalty which is fixed by good precedents."

"The evidence shows for these respondents an assiduous and persistent effort to undermine the supremacy of the law by undertaking insidiously to destroy the confidence of the people in the integrity of the tribunals which maintain it by inoculating the minds of their followers and the people with a virus of mischievous falsehood and misrepresentation concerning the court and judges, seeking and hoping that the support of the people might be withdrawn from these tribunals and by this means their power undone, their judgment rendered valueless and worthless."

"The defendants are here at the court bar to answer. They have been afforded full opportunity to hear the evidence against them and to say what, if any reason, can exist against their punishment. Every part of their response, for they offer no defense, is measured by the words of their leader, Gompers: 'The things I am charged with I did. Go it with your injunctions.'"

ARMY AVIATOR IS INJURED

Carl Hamilton Falls From Aeroplane—Death May Result.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Carl L. Hamilton, of Connersville, Ind., an instructor at the Army aviation school, College Park, Md., was injured perhaps fatally this evening in an aeroplane accident.

Hamilton was flying alone in a biplane and was at a height of 100 feet when the machine suddenly fell to the ground and was smashed to pieces. The aviator was pinned beneath the wreckage, but was quickly extricated. He was hurried to a hospital, where it was said his injuries might prove fatal.

MOSQUITOS HIT CHURCHES

Comfort of Vancouver Pastors and Worshipers Invaded.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 24.—(Special.)—The pestiferous mosquito invaded the city at dusk Sunday evening, and followed the residents to their various places of worship. The pastors had

lighted small reading lamps by which to read the Scriptures, and these proved to be the beacons, or signal lights to the invaders.

The assault had two distinct and quick results. The minister, feeling the sting of the enemy, was in several cases inclined to cut his sermon short, while the congregation was fully awake every minute.

The ministers, in making gestures, did not always use them to illustrate a point in the sermon only—they also brought down the hand or arm on some vulnerable spot, which was at that particular moment being attacked by the besiegers. When the services were about completed, the short ritual being used, generally, the lights were turned on, and this had the effect of increasing the fury of the marauders in their quick but painful warfare. The season of prayer was noticeably disturbed.

Women and girls, clad in low necked gowns with Dutch collars, and silk stockings, suffered most, perhaps, but men were not immune.

The organists, in playing accompaniments, it is said, missed numerous runs in the offertory in bringing the hand quickly to some attacked point. The congregations were sympathetic, and the members looked at each other in kindly endurance.

Never before in the history of the city have the mosquitoes been so vicious, and it is a fact this year that they have lost their "hum" or "m-m-m-m," which is usually the signal before it is thought that a wind, which raised about 8 o'clock, coming from

the Columbia River, brought the army of pests. Many found relief by the use of pennyroyal oil and powder.

WOLLABER WILL RESIGN

EX-PORTLAND WEATHER FORECASTER TO QUIT JULY 1.

Los Angeles Official to Be Succeeded by Ford A. Carpenter, Also Former Oregonian.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 24.—(Special.)—After devoting 22 years to the weather bureau of the department of the United States Government, six years of which have been passed in charge of the Los Angeles office, Arthur B. Wollaber will resign July 1 to accept a position in the office of C. S. Walton, district agent of the Southern California Edison Company.

Mr. Wollaber will be succeeded by Ford A. Carpenter, who for the last 16 years has been in charge of the weather office in San Diego.

Mr. Wollaber began his service in the Weather Department at Portland, Or., May 17, 1890, coming to Los Angeles from that city. Mr. Carpenter began his work in the Weather Department in 1888, at Portland, Or., and after transfers to San Francisco and Carson City, went to San Diego.

Both Mr. Wollaber and Mr. Carpenter are remembered by B. S. Pague, formerly district forecaster of the Portland weather office.

"Mr. Wollaber was my chief clerk in 1900 and 1901. He came here from the weather office in Buffalo, N. Y.," said Mr. Pague. "In 1901 he was transferred to the Los Angeles office, which was under the San Francisco office, as Seattle's office is under Portland."

"Mr. Carpenter was my assistant in 1888-89. He was transferred to Fort Canby and later went to San Francisco. From there he went to Carson City and then to San Diego."

"Mr. Carpenter was assistant superintendent of the Taylor-Street Methodist Episcopal Church Sunday school."

REBELS PLAN RETREAT

5000 PRESENT FRONT TO FEDERAL, BUT BREAK IS NIGH.

Officers Imprisoned by Oroco at Chihuahua for Insubordination Are Released.

CHIHUAHUA, June 24.—Though at Bachimba, 48 miles south of here, the rebel forces of 5000 are assembled, presumably ready to confront the advancing Federal troops of General Huerte, in reality the last details of an elaborate retreat to the hills were decided upon today.

General Emilio Campa, Colonel Jose Alatorre and Captain Martin Salazar, imprisoned recently by General Oroco on a charge of insubordination, were released today from the Chihuahua penitentiary. They will be given work in the present campaign, but probably will not have their old commands.

Rainbow Trout to Be Planted.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 24.—(Special.)—In the month of July, 300,000 rainbow trout will be planted in streams leading into the Columbia River, the fry being hatched in the state hatchery at Basket Creek. L. C. Thomlinson, superintendent of the hatchery, has just received a shipment of 30,000 eggs, which will be hatched and ready to plant in July.

Man Drops Dead in Garden.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 24.—(Special.)—While working in his garden near the car barns this morning, Sidney Grant Updike dropped dead and he was found there by his wife, who was calling on a nearby neighbor. He was well enough to walk to church yesterday, and it was not known he was seriously ill.

JOINT MANEUVERS TO BE EXTENSIVE

Taft Asks Congress to appropriate \$1,500,000 for Guardsmen.

ASSURANCE IS GIVEN HIM

President Also Requests Money for War Department—Northwest Forces to Assemble at Grays Harbor July 21-30.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—President Taft sent a special message to Congress today recommending the immediate appropriation of \$1,500,000 for use of the War Department in the joint maneuvers of the regular army and the National Guard next month. The President also asked the appropriation of \$167,000 for urgent necessities of the War Department. Both items were in the general army appropriation bill, which the President vetoed.

The message was referred to the committee on military affairs after Chairman Hay indicated that action would be taken to enable the War Department and the National Guard to go ahead with plans for the maneuvers. The first will be at Manassas, Va., beginning July 5.

The projected maneuvers will be so much larger than anything of the kind ever attempted before in America as to equal in extent the annual maneuvers of the great European military powers. Western state organizations are to participate in the joint maneuvers with the regular army, in part, as follows:

Grays Harbor, Washington, July 21-30; Idaho, Washington, Oregon, San Francisco, August 10-23, California and Nevada, August 24-31; Fort William Henry Harrison, Montana, July 21-23, Montana.

Fort Huachuca, Arizona, month of September, Arizona.

The dates set for the joint coast exercises of the militia and regulars include Oregon, August 20-29.

Department Officials Worried.

The failure of Congress to pass appropriation bills is causing much concern to department officials.

Secretary Wilson has sent word to many of his field men not to incur any expense after June 30.

Secretary Stimson issued today a general army order similar to that issued last week to the Navy. It provides for feeding and clothing the troops, the continuation of enlistment and the continued employment of civil employees of the Army, but with the understanding that they as well as the line and staff of the Army must go without pay until Congress provides.

DOMESTIC NEEDS GREAT

Chautauqua Plans Big Kitchen as Science Demonstrating Room.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 24.—(Special.)—In order to accommodate the large number of pupils expected to attend the domestic science class at the Willamette Valley Chautauqua, which will convene at Gladstone Park on July 8, the management will erect a building with a classroom and a large kitchen. Work on the structure will be started at once, and a large range has been ordered. Miss Frances C. Gage, secretary of the Northwestern territorial committee of the board of Young Women's Christian Association of Idaho, Montana, Washington and Oregon, will be in charge.

The assembly has already erected homes for the Women's Christian Temperance Union, an art building, kindergarten and several other buildings. Secretary Cross said today that he had mailed about 10,000 programmes, and that they could be had on application to him, Gill's bookstore, the station at First and Alder streets and the Young Men's Christian Association in Portland, and at all the drugstores in Oregon City.

MAN DRAGGED BY HORSE

Narrow Is Pendleton Resident's Escape From Death.

PENDLETON, Or., June 24.—(Special.)—Ben F. Palmer, a resident of this city, had a narrow escape from being dragged to death yesterday when, after capturing a horse in his pasture, he carefully knotted the end of the halter rope to his foot before climbing into the saddle on the animal's back in order to avoid any possible danger which might follow should the animal commence to buck.

Not only did the horse show great ability in bucking, but also followed in the steps of every "outlaw" and followed the bucking by running away. Palmer was unable to release his foot from the rope and was dragged far before rescued. As a result of the accident he suffered three broken ribs and many severe cuts and bruises about the head and body.
