

WOMEN SAID TO BE GROWING LAWLESS

Honorary President of Federation Says Uneducated Classes Dangerous.

LABOR CONDITIONS BLAMED

Reference to Suffragettes in England Brings Burst of Cheers. Speaker Urges Need of Teaching Sewing in Schools.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—The surprise of today's session of the eleventh biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs was the declaration from the platform of Mrs. Dimas T. E. Denison, of New York, honorary president of the federation, that lawlessness among women has arisen.

"Our greatest danger," said Mrs. Denison, "is from the uneducated and unassimilated. In my own city I have seen women who could not understand when prices rose that it was not the butchers, their neighbors, who were responsible. They stormed the butcher shops, beat down the stalls and poured kerosene on the meat."

Labor Troubles Blamed.
"I think I am right when I say that the differences between capital and labor are most acute in New England, in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and here in California and that these differences more than anything else have brought out these expressions of lawlessness."

"If there is any one thing we stand for, it is law and order," Cheers interrupted the speaker.

"For this reason," she continued, "we cannot afford to ignore two men of England, who have been guilty of malicious mischief."

This reference to the militant campaign of the British suffragettes brought out another round of applause. Mrs. Elmer Blair, of Albany, N. Y., chairman of the committee on membership, reported that the greatest handicap to recruiting was the lack of unity in the federations of the state federations officers. She therefore recommended that the general federation appoint its own secretaries in the several states for territorial division under the term of the federation administration.

Many Clubs Join Bodies.
New clubs enrolled in the last two years and new members not included in the state federations were given respectively at 254 and 17,572.

Charles C. Moore, president of the Panama Pacific International Exposition, told the women that they had decided the city in which the exposition should be held because their representatives in Congress had so declared. There were smiles at the compliment.

Although no formal choice for the next biennial has been made, Mrs. Frederick H. Cole, of Nebraska, in mentioning Mrs. Granger, of Chicago, added:

"Whose hospitality we are to accept next. There was applause from the Illinois delegation at the mention of Mrs. Frank White, of North Dakota. In speaking on Junior citizenship, said: "When the average girl of 10 can not make a dress for a doll, then it is time for the public schools to step in and teach her."

Other speakers dealt with play and the playground. Play was described as not a problem of congested districts merely, but a race problem. In a California reformatory 75 per cent. of the inmates might have been saved from the institutional life if their play had been normal, and a strange thing was 50 per cent of the inmates were country boys.

TWO PETITIONS COMPLETE

Total of 11,162 Signers Recorded on Papers Reaching Secretary.

SALEM, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—Two completed initiative petitions were received at the office of the Secretary of State yesterday. One is to be before the people of the state at large and provides for the creation of Cascade County out of a portion of Clackamas County, and the other is a measure providing for a National bank in Jackson County to take care of the flotation of \$1,500,000 worth of bonds for road purposes. The latter has 289 signers.

The petition carrying the bill to create Cascade County has 10,773 signers. It was filed by Claud W. de Vore, chairman of the Cascade County committee. Among other provisions it places the county seat temporarily at Estacada until the people of the new county have an opportunity to vote on the question. It also makes provision for representative purposes the new county will be made a part of the 17th Representative District, formerly Clackamas and Multnomah Counties, and a part of the 12th Senatorial District, formerly Clackamas County. It also provides that it will be attached to the first horticultural district.

In the argument which was also filed in favor of the measure the committee says in part:

1. Clackamas County is too large and unwieldy.
2. The people of Eastern Clackamas County, with few exceptions, are united in wanting a division and a large part of the people of Western Clackamas County feel that such a division will benefit both the old and new county.

3. The 1910 census gives a population of the proposed Cascade County of 6500, being from one to three times larger than that of the present counties of the state. The balance of Clackamas County will be left a population of 24,300.

4. The 1911 assessment gives the valuation of the proposed Cascade County of \$1,000,000, being equal to seven of the present counties in the state. The balance of Clackamas County will be left a valuation of \$21,000,000.

5. The improvements now in course of construction in the proposed Cascade County will increase the valuation of said County to at least \$3,000,000 before the 1915 assessment is made.

6. The proposed Cascade County at its beginning will be a wealthy county, with a per capita valuation of over \$1000.

7. The proposed Cascade County will be a taxing area because from 90 to 95 per cent of its voters are landowners.

8. The proposed Cascade County is too far from its county seat, a large majority of its residents having to pass through Multnomah County and the City of Portland to get to said county seat, with average mileage of 40 miles, and a centrally-located county seat in the new county would be about 12 miles from its furthest point.

9. The located interests of Clackamas County have been respected. The lines are drawn fairly and according to the topography of the country. The dividing line follows a watershed.

10. The proposed Cascade County can be operated by its own taxpayers more economically and for its better interests.

11. The proposed Cascade County will be more compact and more vital interests will be taken by its inhabitants in its operation and growth, more and better roads and schools will be made possible.

12. There are no trade relations between the inhabitants of the proposed Cascade County and the present county seat.

BRIDAL TOUR IN AIR

Aviator and Bride Leave Church in Airship.

GUESTS ATTEND ON WINGS

Grahame-White Claims Dorothy Taylor, of New York, at Essex, England, and Begins Honey-moon in Aeroplane.

LONDON, June 27.—(Special.)—For the first time in history a bridal procession of aeroplanes wended its way to the church door and later, after the ceremony, again mounted into the air and successfully accompanied the flying couple away from the church, honeymoon bound, when Claude Grahame-White, premier British aviator, and Dorothy Taylor, of New York, were married at Widdford, in Essex, near here, today.

Arranged in a brand new aviator's garb, both the bride and bridegroom appeared at the altar after the bridegroom had flown to the church in his machine. Many of the attendants and witnesses of the simple English church ceremony, who came in similar vehicles, were likewise garbed.

When the hour for the arrival of the bridal party approached a throng gathered at or near the church and awaited the aerial procession, which alighted in the broad fields of Essex near the church. Every one of the several who came by air craft alighted successfully.

Girl Brave in Flight.
Although the young and fair bride once failed in courage when she was about to essay a flight across the English Channel with her husband-elect in May, she was undaunted today, when she flew toward London with her husband.

While the annals of romances in England have been filled with odorous courtships and marriage ceremonies, it remained for the aviator and his bride to affix the last word in modern aviation-marital science.

Mrs. Grahame-White is a popular New York girl. It has often been reported that her husband was engaged to Eleanor Sears, athletic girl and philanthropist, and to Pauline Chase, actress of "Pink Pajama" fame. The bride is the daughter of R. L. Taylor, of New York, and is a keen enthusiast of horsemanship, swimming and automobilism.

Bride Is Flower's Niece.
She is also noted as being one of the most graceful dancers in the smart set of New York and vicinity. She is the niece of Roswell E. Flower, once Governor of New York. Frequently she, too, has been reported engaged to Scott, the famous singer, and to Ralph Boomer, well known Yale football star. None of the reported engagements ever was confirmed by them.

Claude Grahame-White is one of the most advanced aviators of England, if not of the world. It was he who carried Miss Davis, another American girl, across the English channel when his fiancée failed courage.

He was born in England in 1878 and was educated at the Bedford Grammar School. He was one of the first owners of an automobile in England and is a crack yachtsman, cricket player and sharpshooter, and has written several books on engineering and flying.

AFFINITY FIGURES IN CASE

State Will Try to Prove Mrs. Olds Had Young Sweetheart.

SPokane, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—That the elopement of a young "affinity" for Mrs. Della Olds led to the trouble between the woman and her husband which ended in the shooting of the latter is what the state will attempt to prove, according to the

opening statement of Prosecutor John L. Wiley to the jury this afternoon.

Wiley declared he would show that a young man repeatedly came to the Olds home in the morning after the aged doctor had left for his office and remained with the young wife until noon and that this practice had extended through the Fall, Winter and Spring. He stated that he would show, moreover, that Mrs. Olds had still an other sweetheart and that her relations with these two men had led to talk of divorce between herself and her husband. He declared Mrs. Olds had stated to him that she "had stood for the doctor's beatings for seven years and intended to fix him."

Attorney Robertson, for the defense, made four objections during the prosecutor's statement, was overruled in all of them and took an exception in each case.

MEDFORD HAS ART EXHIBIT

Church Women Gather Interesting Objects Valued at \$6000.

MEDFORD, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—The efforts of the women of the Episcopal Church to build a new edifice have led to the unearthing of many valuable works of art in the Rogue River Valley.

Under the direction of the members of St. Mark's Guild an art loan exhibit was launched and all possessors of interesting objects were asked to contribute.

As a result there is an Andrea Del Barto, an original Hogarth, several water colors by the Japanese artist Yoshida, the first table made in Southern Oregon, a collection of old engravings from the Pierre Lorillard collection, and many other valuable objects of art, curios and relics, the total being insured for \$6000.

The exhibition has been open a week now and the patrons have been so successful they have decided to extend the time another week. The proceeds, which promise to reach \$200 to \$300, will be added to the church building fund.

SCALY TREES CUT DOWN

Hood River Fruit Inspector Will Take No Chance.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—To rid the valley of the menace from the San Jose scale, which is seriously infesting a number of abandoned trees in vacant lots in the western part of the city, the County Fruit Inspector has been busy this week with an ax, felling the trees and burning them.

The trees were not sprayed in accordance with a recently enacted city ordinance and the state law governing infested trees. "They are literally loaded with the tiny pests," says Professor Lawrence, "and there is danger of the wings and birds scattering the scale over the whole valley. Some of the apples that I have plucked from the trees are worthless because of the inroads of the scale, and there are enough of the bugs to render unsalable many dollars' worth of fruit. The trees that are not too badly affected we will spray now and later in the year. By this means we can rid the valley entirely of the scale."

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ENOCH ARDEN OF TODAY ENTANGLED

Husband Thought Dead Returns to Wife—Another Says She Is Wife No. 2.

SECOND BRIDE OF 5 WEEKS

Warren Wade May Wish He Had Stayed in Alaska If Young Girl Who Tells of Recent Wedding Proves Story.

LOS ANGELES, June 27.—(Special.)—The role of Enoch Arden, transplanted from the poetic world to the world of today is decidedly unsuccessful and even dangerous if the actor fails to drop the curtain and go away to forget.

This will be proved beyond a doubt if the statement of pretty Mrs. Elizabeth Wade, made today, is found correct upon investigation by Deputy District Attorney Asa Keyes.

Warren Wade returned recently as one from the dead to find that his wife had been remarried in his absence in Alaska. In the belief that he had perished in the frozen North. Upon learning this, Wade, unlike Enoch Arden, did not let matters rest as he found them.

Woman Says She Is Wife No. 2.
Mrs. Elizabeth Wade says Wade is the husband who deserted her five weeks ago and an investigation by the District Attorney's office is the result. Her story seems to fit into the life of Wade, who is a resident of Bishop, Cal.

If this be so, Wade has two wives, one of whom today secured an annulment decree dissolving her marriage to George M. Ormsby. The matrimonial tangle alleged is as complex as ever coming to the attention of the county authorities.

Mrs. Susie M. Wade-Ormsby, according to her story, related in court that she was married to Wade in Seattle in 1905. Shortly afterward Wade left for Alaska. After many months, she testified, she heard not word from her absent husband. Then came advice that he had perished.

Wade Appears as From Grave.
For a year she mourned, then was married to George M. Ormsby. The marriage took place in Tacoma and the couple moved to Los Angeles. A few months ago Wade suddenly appeared in the land of the living and Mrs. Wade-Ormsby asked Presiding Judge Willis to annul her marriage to Wade, so that she can be legally freed from Wade to remarry Ormsby.

While Judge Willis was planning the decree the young woman who believed herself to be wife No. 2 of the modern Enoch Arden was telling to District Attorney Keyes her story. She declared that she married Warren Wade in Los Angeles December 26, 1909 and that five weeks ago he deserted her. She declared she believed the Warren Wade, of Bishop, and the real life actor who played the character of Enoch Arden, with trills, to be her Warren Wade.

Deputy District Attorney Keyes took the case under advisement and will investigate the claims of Mrs. Wade, who lives here with her parents.

Railroad Suit Complicated.

EUGENE, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—

Free Thomas, receiver of the Lane County Asset Company, was granted leave today by Judge Harris to intervene as party plaintiff in the suit of George Perry, a contractor, to have the sale of the Asset Company holdings to the Southern Pacific Company set aside as having been made for the purpose of defrauding contractors and others holding judgments against the interests of stockholders, which were

not fully safeguarded when the directors sold certain rights of way to the Southern Pacific Company.
