MURDER IS CHARGE

Poison Candy Case Similar to That of Richeson's.

ACCOMPLICE IS SOUGHT

Ray Weaver, Handsome, Athletic Prisoner and Former Wooer of Lena Speers Refuses to Talk. Self-Destruction Feared.

BOISE, Idaho, June 27.—(Special.)—Murder in the first degree is the charge that Ray Weaver, alias Wilson, the youth who courted Miss Lena Speers, of Rupert, Idaho, must answer in the District Court for Lincoln County when he is tried for sending poison through the mails to the girl he wooed and it is alleged by the state carried out a successful plot to kill.

Fearing that Weaver will resort to self-destruction, the authorities have him under a special guard in the County Jail at Shoshone. So far they have been unable to secure a confession from Weaver. Instead the prisoner asserts he is innocent and there must be some mistake. This charge was preferred today.

Oil of Tansy, Deadly Drug. Oil of tansy was the deadly poison used in the candy sent through the mail to Miss Speers. The poison had been placed in chocolates and mailed from the town of Buhl. It was received the next day in the rural mailbox by Miss Speers, close to her home, six miles from Rupert. She opened the box while walking home and ate some of the candy. Within an hour the poison had taken effect and she was dead. Weaver was a former sweet-heart and disappeared about this time. The police followed his trail to a small town near Walla Walla and there placed him under arrest, returning with him to Shoshone, where the charge was preferred.

It is now believed by the authorities there may have been an accomplice, some other than Weaver, who placed the poison in the candy on his direction. At least they are following this theory.

Case Similar to Richeson's. Prosecuting Attorney Richeson was in Boise today. "I consider the Speers murder case one of the most peculiar and I would ever say sensational in the history of the state," he said. "It is very similar to the Richeson case of Boston. We believe our charge good against Weaver."

While he shows signs of nervousness and is greatly agitated by his arrest, Weaver has little to say. He is a stout, physically, six feet in height, with clear blue eyes and the carriage of an athlete. In fact, he might be called handsome. He was employed as an express agent on the Minidoka line of the Oregon Short Line. It was while with the railroad he is said to have first met Miss Speers.

A homer pigeon dropped dead in R. H. Bitt's yard, at Humtulp, a small settlement in the woods near Hoquiam, last Saturday evening, June 22. No message was found on the bird, but two bands encircled one of its legs. One of these, a white metal ring, was marked with the inscription "V. H. C. 377, 1910" and the other, a red rubber band, bore the inscription "2446-H." There was nothing else to indicate whence the pigeon came.

HOQUIAM PLANT RESUMES

National Lumber & Box Company Starts 300 Men Monday.

HOQUIAM, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—After a shutdown of nearly two years, the National Lumber & Box Company's big plant here will resume operation Monday, employing a force at the very outset of about 300 men, and within a week nearly doubling that number, according to announcement of the company.

As a result of the shut down of the big plant a large number of families moved away from this city. Hoquiam held its own in population, but on account of so many with families seeking other fields in order to secure employment it was a serious drain on the population of the city. A large percentage of the former employees, especially the married men, are to return to the employ of the company. Efforts are being made, wherever possible, to secure men with families, and it is anticipated that the resumption of operations by the mill will add 100 persons to the population of this city.

With the starting of the National, every industrial plant of Hoquiam will be in operation, a number of them night and day. Conditions look brighter in Hoquiam than at any time in the past 18 months, and business men look forward to a period of activity and prosperity.

MEDFORD FOR THIRD PARTY

Supporters of Taft and Roosevelt Change Front.

MEDFORD, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—The bolt of Roosevelt has confused the political pool in Jackson County, and until feeling subsides it is difficult to determine just what the result will be. Two members of the county Republican committee, A. K. Ware and P. W. Mears, have resigned and others seem to be waiting to see how the wind blows. From present indications it seems probable that, though Roosevelt carried the county at the primary, with Taft a poor third to La Follette, there is a marked tendency to stay with the party organization. Many members of the county committee openly reject over the Colonel's defeat and predict that Taft will carry Jackson County in the Fall.

The Medford Sun, which supported Taft for the nomination, has withdrawn further support since the Chicago convention on the ground that the party openly allied itself with the forces of machine politics and reaction. There is considerable sentiment against both Taft and Roosevelt and a hope that when the so-called progressive convention is called a dark horse will be chosen who can receive the support of both factions.

SEATTLE BONDS VALID

SUPREME COURT HOLDS GOOD ISSUE FOR \$800,000.

Lower Court Affirmed in Suit Over Municipal Street Railway Election in 1911.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—The Supreme Court has held valid the \$800,000 bond issue voted by the citizens of Seattle to secure a municipally owned and operated street railway, and affirmed the King County Superior Court in the case of James Lulloch and wife, appellants, against the City of Seattle.

The action was brought to restrain the issuance of the bonds voted March 7, 1911, when the Seattle voters decided to either purchase or build an electric line, on the ground that the matter was not clearly presented. The lower court denied the restraining order and an appeal was taken. Judge

Morris wrote the opinion of the court, and it is concurred in by Judges Ellis, Fullerton and Mount.

The Supreme Court affirmed the conviction in the Pierce County Superior Court of W. H. Robinson, who was given a prison sentence of five months and ordered to pay a fine of \$250 for unlawfully, wilfully, falsely and fraudulently failing to correctly enter certain ballots on September 13, 1910, while a clerk of election.

The Lewis County Superior Court was affirmed by the Supreme Court in the case of Carl E. Harkins against the J. A. Vaness Lumber Company, in which Harkins recovered a judgment of \$4000 for injuries sustained while in the lumber company's employ which resulted in the loss of all the fingers except the little one upon his left hand.

The Supreme Court held in the Chehalis County case that a school district has the right to condemn land which is needed for playground purposes.

Ohio Surgeon Buys Orchard.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—C. R. Bone and James E. Montgomery have sold to Dr. J. H. McVay, a Toledo, O., surgeon, a 20-acre orchard in the Willow Flat district. The tract, set to trees ranging in age from those

just planted to 25-year-olds, adjoins the old Booth orchard, one of the oldest of the valley, and is in the district where Mr. Bone has developed several hundred acres of excellent orchard.

YOUTH CRUSHED BY ENGINE

Boy's Foot Slips While Trying to Board Logging Train.

CHEHALIS, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—Moose Hunt lost his life at the logging camp of the Coal Creek Lumber Company today when he fell between a moving engine which he attempted to board.

Hunt's foot slipped, he fell and was crushed, dying within a few minutes. Hunt was 20 years old and unmarried. His parents live near Mosby Rock.

Coroner Sticklin held an inquest, the jury holding the mill company and other employees blameless.

Ex-Senator Has Paroled Charge.

ALBANY, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—John M. Gearin, of Portland, ex-United States Senator from Oregon, has been given charge of a prisoner paroled in the State Circuit Court here. Gearin

was one of the attorneys for Harry Johnson, charged with robbing the store of the Blain Clothing Company in this city, and when the case was called for trial yesterday afternoon Johnson pleaded guilty and his attorney requested that he be paroled. Judge Kelly sentenced him to an in-

determinate sentence of from one to seven years and then paroled him in the custody of ex-Senator Gearin, with the direction that he report to the court on the first day of each regular term of court.
